The MYC gives teens the opportunity to have fun, make new friends, plan events, and get involved in their community. Members have the chance to get hands-on experience in local government by working with the City Council while learning leadership and organizational skills. This is civic training at its best, giving kids the outlets and tools they need to increase their understanding of how to run a municipal body and make a difference.

HOW WAS MYC ESTABLISHED?

The Council was officially established by city ordinance in the year 2001

**CITY OF FARMINGTON HILLS
OAKLAND COUNTY, MICHIGAN**

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND THE CITY CODE OF THE CITY OF FARMINGTON HILLS CHAPTER 8A, TO PROVIDE FOR THE CREATION OF A MAYORS' YOUTH COUNCIL IN COOPERATION WITH THE CITY OF FARMINGTON.
THE CITY OF FARMINGTON HILLS ORDAINS:

Section 1.

The City Code, Chapter 8 A, Children, Youth & Families, of the City of Farmington Hills, is hereby amended to add a new Article to read as follows:

CHAPTER 8A
ARTICLE II
MAYORS' YOUTH COUNCIL

8-600. Established.

There is established a Mayors' Youth Council, whose mission is to serve as a conduit between the local governments and their younger constituents. Voice will be given to teenagers to bring all issues, great and small, to the forefront. Conversely, the Youth Council will bring the government's voice to teenagers, showing all the opportunities to enrich the teenagers of Farmington Hills/Farmington. Bringing youth and the government together gives both more power to better the community.

8-601. Authority; Duties.

The Youth Council is charged with the authority and responsibility of making recommendations to the Cities concerning the needs and concerns of youth and the community and the appropriate means by which public and private agencies in cooperation with volunteer efforts may address such needs and concerns. All programs and activities will be sent to the City Councils for approval.

8-602. Members; Appointment.

The Youth Council shall consist of thirteen (13) members who shall be selected from the high school age students who reside in Farmington Hills and Farmington. Eleven (11) members shall be appointed by the Mayor of Farmington Hills subject to the approval by a majority vote of the members of the Farmington Hills City Council. Two (2) members shall be appointed by the Mayor of Farmington subject to the approval of a majority vote of the members of the Farmington City Council.

8-603. Terms of Office.

Members of the Youth Council shall hold office for a one-year term and until their successors are appointed and qualified; however, members may serve for more than one term. Appointments shall be made to coincide with the academic calendar in order to facilitate greatest student involvement.

8-604. Organization; Meetings.

(a) The Youth Council shall conduct the election of a chairperson, vice chairperson and secretary from among its members. The terms of the chairperson, vice chairperson and secretary shall be one (1) year with eligibility for reelection; however, a member shall not be eligible to serve more than two (2) successive terms as chairperson. The chairperson shall preside at all meetings but shall have no other duties not in common with other members. The Youth Council may create and fill such other offices as it may deem necessary or expedient.

(b) The Youth Council shall meet regularly as necessary to conduct business and shall keep a record of its resolutions, transactions, findings and determinations. Three (3) unexcused absences in the course of a term shall subject a member to removal from office in the sole discretion of the Mayor. The Youth Council may appoint high school students as associate members to serve on committees advising it on various matters. Associate members may participate in all discussions but shall not have a vote.

Section 2.Repealer.

All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance are repealed only to the extent necessary to give this ordinance full force and effect.

Section 3.Severability.

Should any section, subdivision, clause, or phrase of this ordinance be declared by the courts to be invalid, the validity of the ordinance as a whole, or in part, shall not be affected other than the part invalidated.

Section 4.Savings.

All proceedings pending and all rights and liabilities existing, acquired or incurred at the time this ordinance takes effect are saved and may be consummated according to the law in force when they were commenced.

Section 5.Effective Date.

The provisions of this ordinance are ordered to take effect twenty-one (21) days after enactment.

Section 6.Enactment.

This ordinance is declared to have been enacted by the City Council of the City of Farmington Hills at a meeting called and held on the 16th day of April, 2001, and ordered to be given publication in the manner prescribed by law.
