EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS COMMISSION TIP OF THE MONTH

The following Tip of the Month was read by Emergency Preparedness Commission Vice-Chair, Tim Tutak:

**EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS COMMISSION
TIP OF THE MONTH**

This month the Farmington Hills Emergency Preparedness Commission is emphasizing knowledge, understanding and preparedness for chemical and biological hazardous events.

Every year, the Farmington Hills Fire Department responds to a number of situations involving hazardous material spills. Most of these are a result of vehicle accidents involving automotive fluids such as gasoline, diesel fuel, oil and antifreeze.

During a hazardous material incident involving danger to the public, an order may be given to evacuate. Be sure to have all-hazards supply (72 hr.) kit, family communication plan, and stay tuned to local radio or television station for information and instructions from local health officials. Every situation can be different, so local emergency coordinators might have special instructions for you to follow. Listen carefully to radio or television emergency alert stations (EAS), and strictly follow instructions. Be prepared to act quickly and follow official instructions, your life could depend on it.

Chemical exposures are not always large events and often happen at home. Fertilizers, cleaners, and other household toxins can result in accidental exposure. If you come in contact with a hazardous chemical:

- Quickly remove clothing that has a chemical on it. Any clothing that has to be pulled over your head should be cut off instead of being pulled over your head.
- As quickly as possible, wash any chemicals from your skin with large amounts of soap and water.
- If your eyes are burning or your vision is blurred, rinse your eyes with plain water for 10 to 15 minutes.
- Call 911 and seek medical attention.

If you witness (or smell) a hazardous materials accident, please call 9-1-1 immediately. Stay away from the incident site. Try to stay upstream, uphill and upwind from the accident, and evacuate the danger area. If you are in a car, keep car windows and vents closed and shut off the air conditioner and heater.

PROCLAMATION RECOGNIZING APRIL 28, 2017 AS ARBOR DAY

The following proclamation was read by Councilmember Knol and accepted by Charmaine Kettler-Schmult, Community Development and Special Projects Coordinator:

**Arbor Day
April 28, 2017**

WHEREAS, in 1872, politician and journalist J. Sterling Morton proposed to the Nebraska Board of Agriculture that a special day be set aside for the planting of trees; and

WHEREAS, now called Arbor Day, this holiday was first observed with the planting of more than a million trees in Nebraska and is now observed throughout the nation and the world; and

WHEREAS, trees can reduce the erosion of topsoil by wind and water, cut heating and cooling costs, moderate the temperature, clean the air, produce life-giving oxygen, and provide habitat for wildlife; and

WHEREAS, trees are a renewable resource giving us paper, wood for our homes, fuel for our fires, and countless other products; and

WHEREAS, trees in our City increase property values, enhance the economic vitality of business areas, beautify our community, and promote the well-being of current and future generations.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that I, Ken Massey, Mayor of the City of Farmington Hills, on behalf of the City Council, do hereby proclaim April 28, 2017 as **Arbor Day** and encourage all citizens to celebrate by planting a tree, by going for a walk in the woods or just by taking the time to appreciate trees and all the benefits they provide.

PROCLAMATION RECOGNIZING APRIL 24, 2017 AS ARMENIAN GENOCIDE REMEMBRANCE DAY

The following proclamation was read by Councilmember Lerner and accepted by Ara Topouzian:

**Armenian Genocide Remembrance Day
April 24, 2017**

WHEREAS, between 1915 and 1923, Armenians were subjected to mass murder and exiled from their historic homeland, with over 1.5 million Armenian people losing their lives in the genocidal campaign of the Turkish government; and

WHEREAS, the Armenian Genocide of World War I, now classified as the “First Genocide of the Twentieth Century,” represented a deliberate attempt by the Ottoman Empire to eliminate all traces of a thriving, noble civilization; and

WHEREAS, agents of the Turkish government and military personnel utilized some of the cruelest methods ever seen to destroy Armenian men, women and children, as well as Greeks and Assyrians; and

WHEREAS, the Armenian Genocide became a watershed event in the development of international intervention principles and human rights awareness; and

WHEREAS, the Armenian Genocide led to the emigration to America of hundreds of thousands of Armenians who have made important contributions to communities across the country, including Farmington Hills.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that I, Ken Massey, Mayor of the City of Farmington Hills, on behalf of the City Council, do hereby proclaim April 24, 2017 as **Armenian Genocide Remembrance Day** in memory of the victims of the Armenian Genocide and in honor of their descendants, and encourage all citizens to strive to overcome intolerance and indifference and reaffirm our commitment to acceptance of all people.

Mr. Topouzian thanked the Mayor and Council for again offering tribute to this dark time in history that affected the Armenian people and his family and he provided some history on the Armenian Genocide and effect on the Armenian people.

PRESENTATION OF BEAUTIFICATION COMMISSION 2016 ANNUAL REPORT

Carol Posby, Co-Chair provided the City Council with the Beautification Commission 2016 Annual Report. She thanked staff liaison Charmaine Kettler-Schmult and Council liaison Knol for their assistance with the Commission.

Councilmember Knol mentioned that there were openings on the Commission and that anyone interested should contact the City Manager's Office.

PRESENTATION OF POLICE DEPARTMENT 2016 ANNUAL REPORT

Police Chief Charles Nebus presented City Council with the Police Department's 2016 Annual Report.

Councilmember Bridges applauded Chief Nebus' leadership and efforts in creating a diverse work force and for the community outreach.

Councilmember Knol inquired if alcohol was a factor in the fatal accidents mentioned in the report and if distracted driving played a part in the overall reported crashes that were up significantly. Police Chief Nebus stated that alcohol was a factor in all of the fatal accidents mentioned and that distracted driving plays a major factor in car crashes as well as drugs and alcohol.

Councilmember Lerner mentioned the statistics regarding car larceny and commented that this is one area where residents can help by locking their door and not leaving valuables in their car.

Mayor Massey thanked Chief Nebus and his entire team for their efforts in keeping the community safe.

PRESENTATION OF FIRE DEPARTMENT 2016 ANNUAL REPORT

Fire Chief Unruh presented City Council with the Fire Department's 2016 Annual Report.

Councilmember Lerner inquired if there would be a need for a 3rd station to remain open in the evenings. Chief Unruh responded that he feels the city is well covered at this time with two full-time stations.

Councilmember Bridges also inquired about the number of fires being lower than the national average but the continual increase in runs and asked if the number of runs had to do with an aging population.

Chief Unruh responded that he would hope the fires are lower due to the continual education and tips that are provided. He attributed the increase in runs to an aging population as well as a transient population during the daytime hours.

Mr. Bridges also commended Chief Unruh for his leadership and feels that many residents come to this community because of the great public safety efforts that both Chiefs provide.

Councilmember Knol felt that runs compared to neighboring communities based on the percentage of population would be an interesting statistic to include.

Councilmember Rich inquired if there were concerns with recruitment. Chief Unruh responded that recruiting and retaining Paid-On-Call (POC) members is difficult and is a nationwide issue.

Mayor Massey commended Chief Unruh for his leadership commenting that he has received positive feedback from the members of the department and feels that morale is very good.

PUBLIC HEARING

PUBLIC HEARING AND CONSIDERATION OF APPROVING THE COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT BLOCK GRANT (CDBG) 2017/2018 PROJECTED USE OF FUNDS. CMR 4-17-

39

Charmaine Kettler-Schmult, Community Development and Special Projects Coordinator, explained that federal regulations require that the city hold a public hearing to receive comments and to approve the CDBG funds. Last year the city completed the 5-year consolidated plan that analyzes the needs of the community and provides a projection on what the community will spend on CDBG funds to accomplish the established objectives. Based on the 5-year plan, annual plans are developed and the objectives for this year include suitable living environments and providing decent housing. She stated that this is proposed to be accomplished through two activities including the Housing Rehabilitation Program and by way of several non-profit public service organizations. Eligible persons must be low or moderate income as defined by Housing and Urban Development (HUD).

Coordinator Schmult mentioned that HUD has not yet informed the city of the budget for FY 2017/18, but the city is expecting funding to remain same as last year. Staff is also anticipating approximately 35,000 in program income for repayment of home repair loans. She discussed the estimated funding for

each activity that included the Housing Rehabilitation Program, Program Administration and Non-Profit Public Service Organizations and noted that if funding were to be at a different level than anticipated then staff would proportionately change the amount provided for each activity.

Mayor Massey opened the public hearing at this time. There being no further comments, the public hearing was closed.

MOTION by Bridges, support by Lerner, that the City Council of Farmington Hills hereby approves the Five Year Consolidated Plan and Community Development Block Grant Program Year 2017/2018 budget to include: 1) \$291,503 for Housing Rehabilitation, 2) \$15,500 for Public Service Organizations, and 3) \$35,500 for Program Administration and authorizes the City Manager to prepare and submit an application for Community Development Block Grant funds to the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development within sixty days of the date allocations are announced but no later than August 16, 2017.

City Clerk Smith explained that before Council is a request to transfer ownership of a 2016 Class C license with various permits and for a new Sunday Sales (AM) permit to be located at 32350 W. 8 Mile Road. The new owners intend to operate the business under the current name of Detroit Burger Bar at the same location. Clerk Smith stated that this is a city quota license and the City is requiring a city agreement to be signed by the new owners.

City Clerk Smith explained that before Council is a request to transfer ownership of a 2016 Class C with permits to be located at 27847 Orchard Lake Road. The new owners intend to operate the business under the current name of Kabuki Japanese Restaurant at the same location. Clerk Smith stated that this is not a

city quota license and was transferred in from the City of Southfield originally so a city agreement would not be requested.

CMR 4-17-40

Fire Marshal Jason Olszewski explained that the Michigan Building Code was recently updated to the 2015 version, which happens automatically. The Fire Code has to be adopted by ordinance and the city attempts to stay in line with the building codes so staff is working from the same set of standards. He highlighted some of the proposed amendments for Council.

TRANSMITTAL AND ACCEPTANCE OF THE CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS PLAN (CIP) FOR FISCAL YEARS 2017/2018 - 2022/2023.

City Planner Mark Stec stated that the preparation for the Capital Improvement Plan (CIP) is an annual process to coincide with the city budgeting process. He noted that the CIP is not a budget but a culmination of city projects identified by the various departments as needing the most attention in those next 5 years. He explained that preparation of the CIP is mandated by the Michigan Planning and Enabling Act that requires the Planning Commission to prepare the plan and hold a public hearing and then to forward the plan to City Council for acceptance. The Planning Commission held their public hearing on March 23, 2017, at which time they approved the plan and transmittal to Council and included in their motion to encourage city council to consider approval of the non-motorized master plan as part of

FY 2017/18 budget. This evening Council is being asked to consider and accept the plan. Mr. Stec summarized the projects proposed under the CIP plan.

Director of Planning and Community Development Ed Gardiner explained that that the consent judgment before Council would provide resolution to litigation between the City and Lamar Advertising. The lawsuit was a result of the city not approving 3 sign permits submitted by Lamar Advertising for freeway signs along M-5 and I-275. He noted that the consent judgment would permit construction of two of the freeway signs as described in the consent judgment. The city's Planning Consultant Rod Arroyo, staff and Attorneys Steve Joppich and Lisa Anderson negotiated the terms of the consent judgment.

Attorney Joppich stated that this is the item that was previously discussed with Council in their closed session as pending litigation and is being presented after negotiating the details as discussed with Council at that time.
