### RESOLUTION ESTABLISHING THE FARMINGTON HILLS INNOVATION, ENERGY AND ENVIRONMENTAL SUSTAINABILITY COMMITTEE

WHEREAS, in 2008, the City of Farmington Hills established the Green Efforts Committee as a temporary committee to study issues pertaining to the environment and explore efforts the City may be able to undertake in order to help sustain and protect the environment;

WHEREAS, in 2011, City Council adopted an ordinance establishing the Commission for Energy and Environmental Sustainability ("CEES") as a standing committee based on the work, reporting, and recommendations of the Green Efforts Committee;

WHEREAS, in 2017, City Council completed an extensive review of all the standing boards and commissions throughout the City and decided that it would be best, at that time, to discontinue the CEES and have the Parks and Recreation Commission undertake its work;

WHEREAS, in 2021, City Council received an update on the status of the City's efforts and achievements toward environmental sustainability and decided that it would like to enhance its support for and build upon those efforts through the establishment of a temporary committee to explore such matters and to also include innovation in its work and undertake such other objectives as are set forth in this Resolution; and

WHEREAS, City Council wishes to extend an offer to the City of Farmington to participate in and establish this as a joint committee for the benefit of the entire Farmington Hills-Farmington community.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT IS HEREBY RESOLVED by the City Council of the City of Farmington Hills as follows:

1) The Innovation, Energy and Environmental Sustainability Committee ("IEESC") is hereby established. The IEESC is established for the purpose and with the objective of researching, studying, and reporting to City Council on the following:

- (a) The past efforts, undertakings, and achievements of the City through the work of City Council, the City Administration, the CEES, and the Parks and Recreation Commission with innovation, energy and environmental sustainability;
- (b) Potential opportunities, resources, programs, projects, practices, educational efforts, and actions that will enhance, advance, and further develop innovation, energy and environmental sustainability within the community; and
- (c) Possible sources of funding or financing and potential public-private partnerships and interlocal partnerships for innovation energy, and environmental sustainability.
- 2) On or before \_\_\_\_\_\_\_, 20\_\_\_\_, the IEESC shall issue a report to City Council containing its findings and 2-3 attainable goals based on the above-stated purpose and objectives of the committee.
- 3) The IEESC shall consist of up to eleven (11) persons, including, to the extent possible, Farmington Hills residents, representatives of businesses located in the City of Farmington Hills, a member of the City's Broadband Task Force, a member of the City's Economic Development Corporation, a student who is engaged in high school or higher-level coursework, technical/subject matter experts, and up to \_\_\_\_ individuals from the City of Farmington. With the exception of the City of Farmington members, all persons on the IEESC shall be appointed by the Mayor of Farmington Hills, subject to approval by a majority vote of City Council. The Mayor of Farmington Hills is directed to communicate an offer to the Mayor of the City of Farmington for it to appoint individuals from the City of Farmington to participate on the IEESC as indicated above.
- 3) The IEESC shall, at its first meeting, choose a chairperson and secretary from among its members. The IEESC shall hold its first meeting promptly after at least \_\_\_\_\_ members have been appointed and approved, and shall meet regularly thereafter as necessary to complete its tasks within the time frame established under this resolution. The IEESC shall, with the assistance of the City Administration, keep a record of its meetings, information, findings, and determinations.
- 4) The provisions of City Code, Chapter 2, Article IV, Division 1 shall apply to the IEESC, except to the extent the City Code may conflict with the provisions of this Resolution and except for the following sections and subsections of said Code: 2-130(b), 2-131, 2-134, and 2-141.
- 5) The IEESC shall expire on \_\_\_\_\_\_, 20\_\_\_, unless its term is extended by City Council, or if the IEESC includes members appointed by both City Councils then both City Councils must agree to extend the term.
- 6) Given the temporary duration, membership, nature, purposes, and objectives of this special committee, City Council hereby finds and declares that the IEESC does not fall into the category of a board or commission contemplated under or for purposes of Section of 3.12 of the City Charter.

WHEREAS, throughout 2020, the State of Michigan and the City of Farmington Hills has issued various emergency declarations, resolutions, orders, and rules relating to the Coronavirus pandemic, some of which included temporary restrictions on the use of places of public accommodation in the City; and

**WHEREAS**, at one point in time during 2020, the state relaxed its restrictions and allowed places of public accommodation, such as bars and restaurants, to partially re-open, at which time the City adopted Resolution R-108-20, dated June 8, 2020, temporarily authorizing the extension of certain permitted uses into outdoor spaces not otherwise allowed to be used for such businesses, because of — and only because of — the occupancy limitations and social distancing requirements necessary to respond to the COVID-19 pandemic; and

WHEREAS, in November, 2020, the State of Michigan experienced a high and rapidly increasing rate of spread of COVID-19, and the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services ("MDHH") issued an order that implemented state restrictions that resulted in restaurant and bar businesses in the City to again either close their business or be open only for limited outdoor service and carry-out service and also affected the operations of other businesses in the City; and

WHEREAS, on January 22, 2021, the Director of the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services issued an order that relaxed the restrictions on food service establishments again permitting the gradual and partial reopening of food service establishments within the City subject to limitations on occupancy, requirements for social distancing, and other restrictions; and

**WHEREAS**, based on the above developments since the adoption of Resolution R-108-20 and the reasons and explanations provided in said Resolution, the City Council adopted Resolution R-17-21, which renewed and re-adopted the temporary authorizations provided under Resolution R-108-20 for the extension of certain permitted uses into outdoor spaces not otherwise allowed to be used, because of — and only because of — the occupancy limitations and social distancing requirements necessary to respond to the COVID-19 pandemic, and for no other purpose or duration; and

WHEREAS, subsequent to R-17-21, vaccinations for COVID-19 were deployed and have been distributed and administered across the country, including Michigan and Farmington Hills, but a new and more contagious and deadly variant of the COVID-19 virus has since spread across the country causing extreme public health concerns especially among the unvaccinated, the elderly, persons at increased risk of severe illness from COVID-19 due to health conditions, and population under 12 years of age who cannot be vaccinated;

WHEREAS, based on the above developments since the adoption of Resolution R-17-21 and recognizing that the temporary authorizations provided under that Resolution have expired, and also recognizing that the CDC and MDCH have issued guidelines calling for restaurants and other indoor establishments open to the public to provide for masks, social distancing and other spacing protections, and further recognizing that restaurants may be concerned and want to cater to customers who are either not vaccinated or who would not patronize an establishment with indoor-only service due to health concerns, the City Council wishes to renew and re-adopt the temporary authorizations provided under Resolution R-17-21 for the extension of certain permitted uses into outdoor spaces not otherwise allowed to be used, because of — and only because of — the occupancy limitations and social distancing requirements necessary to respond to the COVID-19 pandemic, the above considerations, and for no other purpose.

**NOW THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY RESOLVED** that City Council renews, restates, and re-adopts paragraphs 1-8 of its Resolution R-108-20 herein by this reference and as if fully set forth herein, except it shall not apply to barber shops and beauty salons and except for subparagraphs 4.b.ii and 4.d and paragraph 5 which are amended and restated to read as follows:

4.b.ii. Compliance with any and all Center for Disease Control (CDC) and Michigan Department of Community Health (MDCH) COVID-19 guidelines and recommendations for social distancing, party size limitations, spacing, and masking in bars/restaurants and retail businesses (this requirement applies regardless of the fact that the CDC and MDCH recommendations and guidelines are not legally mandated).

4.d. A license approved under this Resolution shall expire and the permitted temporary outdoor business uses shall immediately cease and be

discontinued on the same date that the authorizations set forth in this Resolution are no longer effective or are revoked (see paragraph 5).

5. The authorizations set forth in this Resolution shall remain effective until the earlier of the following: (a) October 31, 2021; (b) the City adopts an ordinance or ordinances relating to the subject matter of this Resolution; or (c) the City Council revokes or amends this Resolution.

The following preamble and resolution were offered by Councilperson Knol and supported by Councilperson Massey:

WHEREAS, on March 10, 2020, the Governor issued Executive Order 2020-4, declaring a State of Emergency across the State of Michigan relating to the novel Coronavirus 19, or COVID-19; and

WHEREAS, throughout 2020, the State of Michigan and the City of Farmington Hills has issued various emergency declarations, resolutions, orders, and rules relating to the Coronavirus pandemic, some of which included temporary state restrictions on the use of places of public accommodation, which resulted in the closure of restaurants and bars across the state, including in the City; and

WHEREAS, at one point in time during 2020, the state relaxed its restrictions and allowed places of public accommodation, such as bars and restaurants, to partially re-open, at which time the City adopted Resolution R-108-20, dated June 8, 2020, temporarily authorizing the extension of certain permitted uses into outdoor spaces not otherwise allowed to be used for such businesses, because of—and only because of—the occupancy limitations and social distancing requirements necessary to respond to the COVID-19 pandemic; and

WHEREAS, in November, 2020, the State of Michigan experienced a high and rapidly increasing rate of spread of COVID-19, and the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services ("MDHH") issued an order that implemented state restrictions that resulted in restaurant and bar businesses in the City to again either close their business or be open only for limited outdoor service and carry-out service and also affected the operations of other businesses in the City; and

WHEREAS, on January 22, 2021, the Director of the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services issued an order that relaxed the restrictions on food service establishments again permitting the gradual and partial reopening of food service establishments within the City subject to limitations on occupancy, requirements for social distancing, and other restrictions; and

WHEREAS, based on the above developments since the adoption of Resolution R-108-20 and the reasons and explanations provided in said Resolution, and also recognizing that the temporary authorizations provided under that Resolution expired just prior to the November, 2020 MDHH order referenced above, the City Council wishes to renew and re-adopt the temporary authorizations provided

under Resolution R-108-20 for the extension of certain permitted uses into outdoor spaces not otherwise allowed to be used, because of—and only because of—the occupancy limitations and social distancing requirements necessary to respond to the COVID-19 pandemic, and for no other purpose or duration.

**NOW THEREFORE, IT IS THEREFORE RESOLVED** that City Council renews, restates, and re-adopts paragraphs 1-8 of its Resolution R-108-20 herein by this reference and as if fully set forth herein, except it shall not apply to barber shops and beauty salons and except for subparagraph 4.d and paragraph 5 which are amended and restated to read as follows:

- 4.d. A license approved under this Resolution shall expire and the permitted temporary outdoor business uses shall immediately cease and be discontinued on the same date that the authorizations set forth in this Resolution are no longer effective or are revoked (see paragraph 5).
- 5. The authorizations set forth in this Resolution shall remain effective until: (a) the State of Michigan discontinues occupancy limitations and social distancing requirements relating to the pandemic conditions in Michigan as to all of the businesses listed in paragraph 4 of this Resolution; (b) the City adopts an ordinance or ordinances relating to the subject matter of this Resolution; or (c) the City Council revokes or amends this Resolution. If the State of Michigan discontinues occupancy limitations and social distancing requirements as to some, but not all of the types of businesses listed in paragraph 4 of this Resolution, then this Resolution shall only remain effective as to those businesses that remain subject to such State restrictions.

### RESOLUTION REGARDING TEMPORARY OUTDOOR SALES EVENT LICENSE AUTHORIZATION AND REQUIREMENTS FOR REOPENING CERTAIN RETAIL, BARBER, BEAUTY SALON AND RESTAURANT/BAR BUSINESSES IN LIGHT OF COVID-19 PANDEMIC

At a regular meeting of the City Council of the City of Farmington Hills, County of Oakland, State of Michigan, attended remotely and held electronically from the City Council Chambers on June 8, 2020, at 7:30 o'clock p.m., with those present and absent being:

PRESENT: BARNETT, BOLEWARE, BRIDGES, KNOL, MASSEY, NEWLIN AND STECKLOFF

ABSENT: NONE

The following preamble and resolution were offered by Councilperson Bridges and supported by Councilperson Massey:

WHEREAS, on March 10, 2020, the Governor issued Executive Order 2020-4, declaring a State of Emergency across the State of Michigan relating to the novel Coronavirus 19, or COVID-19; and

WHEREAS, on March 16, 2020, the Governor issued Executive Order 2020-9, imposing "Temporary Restrictions on the Use of Places of Public Accommodation," which resulted in the closure of restaurants and bars across the state, including in the City, effective March 16, 2020, at 3:00 p.m.; and

WHEREAS, on March 23, 2020, the Governor issued the first "Stay at Home" Order, Executive Order 2020-21, which ordered non-essential businesses, including retail businesses in the City, to close to the public; and

WHEREAS, since their initial issuance, those Orders have been extended on various dates for various lengths of time, and as of the date of this Resolution remain generally in full force and effect; and

WHEREAS, as a result of these orders, many retail and restaurant bar businesses in the City have been either closed or open only for restricted hours or purposes for well over two months; and

WHEREAS, on June 1, 2020 and June 5, 2020, the Governor issued Executive Orders 2020-110 and 2020-114, which permit the gradual and partial reopening of retail businesses, restaurants/bars, barber shops, and beauty salons within the City; and

WHEREAS, under EO 2020-110 and EO 2020-114, the reopening of such businesses is subject to limitations on occupancy, requirements for social distancing and other restrictions. In other words, those reopening businesses are not permitted to reopen at full capacity and are not able to use all their existing space as it was before the Orders described above. Consequently, as those businesses seek to reopen, the City Council expects that they will contemplate alternative means to provide goods and services to the public, but will find that there are complexities and limitations imposed by the City's Zoning Ordinance and other City Code or land use regulations that might affect or limit their ability to take advantage of those alternatives. By way of example only, these could include limitations on the use

of adjacent sidewalks and parking areas for outdoor sales and services and/or outdoor seating for food and beverage service, limitations on the number of days and hours of operation for such sales and services events, and limitations on zoning districts in which such events are permitted; and

WHEREAS, while there are options available to reopening businesses to seek interpretations of, relief from, and/or approvals under those regulations, those procedures typically take a significant amount of time to complete, or might not fit the technical requirements for relief, and also require the use of substantial City resources. For example, requests to the Zoning Board of Appeals for relief from Zoning Ordinance regulations require publishing and mailing public hearing notices, and the scheduling and conducting of public hearings before the Board, and many of the types of temporary uses may require an additional hearing before City Council for approval. Absent some sort of broad relief, the City believes that a significant number of reopening businesses in the City can be expected to seek relief from the ZBA, City Council, or otherwise; and

WHEREAS, the City Council seeks to avoid overwhelming the ZBA – as well as the City's administrative staff and possibly City Council – with individual applications for temporary relief that is needed due to the current pandemic circumstances and emergency orders, and with individual notice and review requirements. The Council has therefore investigated options for temporarily addressing these issues on a City-wide and expedited basis; and

WHEREAS, the City Council acknowledges that it has in place a Local Declaration of a State of Emergency, effective March 23, 2020, that can be utilized, under the Emergency Management Act, MCL 30.401 et seq, to waive certain ordinance requirements, but it further acknowledges that the duration of that Local Declaration has not yet been determined by the City Council and might not cover the entire period of limited occupancy for restaurant, barbershop, beauty salon and retail businesses; and

WHEREAS, the City Council also acknowledges the concept of the "moratorium" under which the City can potentially and temporarily suspend enforcement of provisions of an ordinance, and

WHEREAS, the City Council finds that the most appropriate way to avoid overwhelming the ZBA, City Council, and City staff and to address the health, safety, and welfare issues caused by the COVID-19 pandemic in a manner that is not detrimental to the public nor contrary to the overall purpose and goals of the City's existing ordinances is to temporarily consolidate under and utilize the provisions of the City's Code provisions relating to temporary outdoor sales events for purposes of temporarily authorizing the extension of certain permitted uses into outdoor spaces not otherwise allowed to be used, because of—and only because of—the occupancy limitations and social distancing requirements necessary to respond to the COVID-19 pandemic, and for no other purpose or duration.

#### NOW THEREFORE, IT IS THEREFORE RESOLVED:

- 1. City Council affirms its existing zoning and land use regulations as reasonable and appropriate in furtherance of the public health, safety, and welfare of the City, its residents, and businesses.
- 2. City Council finds, however, that the 2020 COVID-19 pandemic represents an unusual and unprecedented event that has caused an interruption in the typical operation of businesses within the City, but particularly the operation of retail businesses, barbershops, beauty salons, and restaurants/bars in the City that rely upon visitors and in-person customers.
- 3. City Council finds that a temporary relaxation of certain regulations with respect to the operation of those businesses, or aspects of those businesses, is an appropriate response to these current

unprecedented conditions within the City, state, and country, and further finds that such temporary relaxation, if properly administered, will not adversely affect the public health, safety, and welfare and will in fact benefit both the businesses and the members of the public affected given COVID-19's wideranging effects.

- 4. City Council hereby determines that it is appropriate to establish, and it hereby does establish, a city-wide Temporary Outdoor Sales Event License Authorization (referred to hereafter as "the License Authorization") for (i) certain outdoor sales by retail businesses, (ii) certain outdoor barber shops and beauty salons (not including massage, ear piercing, waxing/hair removal, tanning, or tattoo services), and (ii) certain outdoor seating and food and beverage service by restaurants/bars, in reliance on Chapter 22, Article V of the City Code, relating to Temporary Outdoor Sales Events, and also in reliance upon other authorities referred to above, as applicable, and subject to the following requirements:
  - a. The provisions of this Resolution and the License Authorization are limited to restaurants/bars, barber shops and beauty salons (not including massage, ear piercing, waxing/hair removal, tanning, or tattoo services), and retail businesses, that can meet the requirements of this Resolution and Sections 22-103, 22-104, 22-117 and 22-118 of Chapter 22, Article V of the City Code;
  - b. The City Administration shall establish, by no later than June 12, 2020, an initial set of written standards and procedures for receiving and reviewing applications for issuance of licenses for temporary outdoor retail sales by retail businesses, temporary outdoor seating and food and beverage service by restaurants/bars, and temporary outdoor barber shop and beauty salon services (not including massage, ear piercing, waxing/hair removal, tanning, or tattoo services). Such standards and procedures shall, at a minimum, address and include:
    - Operation as part of an existing business with a valid certificate of occupancy adjacent to or on the same property as the outdoor area.
    - ii. Compliance with any and all applicable state and local orders related to COVID-19, including social distancing, party size limitations, masking, etc.
    - iii. Area and location limitations.
    - iv. Required demonstration that, upon installation of the proposed temporary outdoor sales by retail businesses, temporary outdoor barber shop and beauty salon services, or temporary outdoor seating and food and beverage service by restaurants/bars, there will remain ample space for parking, vehicular (including emergency vehicles) and pedestrian ingress, egress and circulation, and any other use on the subject site
    - v. Spacing limitations for tables, chairs, registers, and the like.
    - vi. Hours of operation.
    - vii. Temporary structures, such as tents, canopies/umbrellas, fencing, railings, and the like.
    - viii. Separation from parking/vehicular traffic.
    - ix. ADA compliance.
    - x. Compliance with building and fire codes.
    - xi. Provision for litter and waste.

Such standards and procedures may be amended from time to time, as deemed necessary by and with the approval of the City Manager.

- c. The procedures and requirements for submission and review of applications and for the approval of licenses authorized under this Resolution shall include, without limitation, the following:
  - i. The application shall be filed with the Planning and Community Development Department with a copy to the City Manager and City Clerk:
  - ii. The application shall be on a form provided by the Planning and Community Development Department, and shall include such information as the Community Development Department determines, including, at a minimum, the information listed in City Code Section 22-112(a);
  - iii. The application shall include an accompanying plan, with the information on the plan to include (in addition to the plan information required under Section 22-112(a)(10)):
    - 1. a scaled layout of premises, any existing outdoor seating areas and expansion area;
    - 2. location and clearances to maintain access to any fire hydrants and Fire Department connections;
    - dimensioned access to means of egress and barrier free entrance routes, locations and sizes of any temporary canopies, umbrellas or tents:
    - 4. locations and description of any fencing or seating area enclosures and egress;
    - 5. location of any relocated barrier free parking; and
    - 6. facilities for waste and trash.
  - iv. Review and approval of the license application and accompanying plan shall be by the Director of Planning and Community Development (or designee), with a copy to the City Clerk, the Police Department, the Fire Department, and the City Manager's Office. The application and plan shall be approved if it provides all of the information and meets the requirements provided herein and under the standards and procedures established under subsection b. above, and shall be denied if it does not.
- d. A license approved under this Resolution shall expire and the permitted temporary outdoor sales by retail businesses, temporary outdoor barber shop and beauty salon services, and outdoor seating and food and beverage service by restaurants/bars, shall immediately cease and be discontinued, on the same date that the authorizations set forth in this Resolution expire, are revoked, or become null and void under paragraph 7 of this Resolution.
- e. A license approved under this Resolution may be revoked by the Director of the Planning and Community Development Department (or designee) if the applicant fails, neglects, or refuses to fully comply with any and all provisions and requirements set forth in or established under this Resolution, any applicable Executive Order issued by the Governor of Michigan, or any and all provisions, regulations, ordinances, statutes, or other law referenced in this Resolution or otherwise applicable to the business undertaken.
- f. Restaurant/bar uses must comply with requirements of the Oakland County Environmental Health Department and the Michigan Liquor Control

Commission. Barbershop and beauty salon uses must comply with all requirements of the Oakland County Health Department.

- g. Temporary outdoor restaurant/bar uses that involve the sale or consumption of alcoholic beverages:
  - i. shall comply with all requirements of the Michigan Liquor Control Act and related laws, including administrative regulations adopted thereunder;
  - ii. shall comply with all requirements of Chapter 4 of the City Code; and
  - iii. may require additional review by City staff and consultants, and may require approval by City Council
- 5. The authorizations set forth in this Resolution shall become effective immediately and shall expire on October 31, 2020, unless extended by the City Council, subject to the following:
  - a. If the Governor revokes the Stay at Home Order, or the Stay at Home Order is otherwise revoked by operation of law or by court order, and the occupancy limitations and social distancing limitations are no longer in force and effect, this authorization shall be null and void, and any activities authorized shall cease immediately.
  - b. If the City adopts an ordinance or ordinances relating to the subject matter of this Resolution, this Resolution shall be considered revoked upon the effective date thereof.
  - c. The City Council may revoke or amend this Resolution at any time, and such revocation or amendment shall be effective immediately.
- 6. There shall be no fees charged for the submission of the application or the City's review of the application.
- 7. The City Administration is directed to review and evaluate the City's zoning ordinance and City Code provisions in light of the recent events related to COVID-19 and the various orders and limitations imposed in response and report to the City Council any recommended changes thereto as a result of its evaluation.
- 8. Violation of the requirements of this Resolution and/or any permit authorized hereunder shall be considered violations of the City Code.

WHEREAS, throughout 2020, the State of Michigan and the City of Farmington Hills has issued various emergency declarations, resolutions, orders, and rules relating to the Coronavirus pandemic, some of which included temporary restrictions on the use of places of public accommodation in the City; and

WHEREAS, at one point in time during 2020, the state relaxed its restrictions and allowed places of public accommodation, such as bars and restaurants, to partially re-open, at which time the City adopted Resolution R-108-20, dated June 8, 2020, temporarily authorizing the extension of certain permitted uses into outdoor spaces not otherwise allowed to be used for such businesses, because of — and only because of — the occupancy limitations and social distancing requirements necessary to respond to the COVID-19 pandemic; and

WHEREAS, in November, 2020, the State of Michigan experienced a high and rapidly increasing rate of spread of COVID-19, and the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services ("MDHH") issued an order that implemented state restrictions that resulted in restaurant and bar businesses in the City to again either close their business or be open only for limited outdoor service and carry-out service and also affected the operations of other businesses in the City; and

WHEREAS, on January 22, 2021, the Director of the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services issued an order that relaxed the restrictions on food service establishments again permitting the gradual and partial reopening of food service establishments within the City subject to limitations on occupancy, requirements for social distancing, and other restrictions; and

**WHEREAS**, based on the above developments since the adoption of Resolution R-108-20 and the reasons and explanations provided in said Resolution, the City Council adopted Resolution R-17-21, which renewed and re-adopted the temporary authorizations provided under Resolution R-108-20 for the extension of certain permitted uses into outdoor spaces not otherwise allowed to be used, because of — and only because of — the occupancy limitations and social distancing requirements necessary to respond to the COVID-19 pandemic, and for no other purpose or duration; and

WHEREAS, subsequent to R-17-21, vaccinations for COVID-19 were deployed and have been distributed and administered across the country, including Michigan and Farmington Hills, but a new and more contagious and deadly variant of the COVID-19 virus has since spread across the country causing extreme public health concerns especially among the unvaccinated, the elderly, persons at increased risk of severe illness from COVID-19 due to health conditions, and population under 12 years of age who cannot be vaccinated;

WHEREAS, based on the above developments since the adoption of Resolution R-17-21 and recognizing that the temporary authorizations provided under that Resolution have expired, and also recognizing that the CDC and MDCH have issued guidelines calling for restaurants and other indoor establishments open to the public to provide for masks, social distancing and other spacing protections, and further recognizing that restaurants may be concerned and want to cater to customers who are either not vaccinated or who would not patronize an establishment with indoor-only service due to health concerns, the City Council wishes to renew and re-adopt the temporary authorizations provided under Resolution R-17-21 for the extension of certain permitted uses into outdoor spaces not otherwise allowed to be used, because of — and only because of — the occupancy limitations and social distancing requirements necessary to respond to the COVID-19 pandemic, the above considerations, and for no other purpose.

**NOW THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY RESOLVED** that City Council renews, restates, and re-adopts paragraphs 1-8 of its Resolution R-108-20 herein by this reference and as if fully set forth herein, except it shall not apply to barber shops and beauty salons and except for subparagraphs 4.b.ii and 4.d and paragraph 5 which are amended and restated to read as follows:

4.b.ii. 4.d. A license approved under this Resolution shall expire and the permitted temporary outdoor business uses shall immediately cease and be

discontinued on the same date that the authorizations set forth in this Resolution are no longer effective or are revoked (see paragraph 5).

5. The authorizations set forth in this Resolution shall remain effective until the earlier of the following: (a) October 31, 2021; (b) the City adopts an ordinance or ordinances relating to the subject matter of this Resolution; or (c) the City Council revokes or amends this Resolution.

ABSENT: NONE

The following preamble and resolution were offered by Councilperson Knol and supported by Councilperson Massey:

WHEREAS, on March 10, 2020, the Governor issued Executive Order 2020-4, declaring a State of Emergency across the State of Michigan relating to the novel Coronavirus 19, or COVID-19; and

WHEREAS, throughout 2020, the State of Michigan and the City of Farmington Hills has issued various emergency declarations, resolutions, orders, and rules relating to the Coronavirus pandemic, some of which included temporary state restrictions on the use of places of public accommodation, which resulted in the closure of restaurants and bars across the state, including in the City; and

WHEREAS, at one point in time during 2020, the state relaxed its restrictions and allowed places of public accommodation, such as bars and restaurants, to partially re-open, at which time the City adopted Resolution R-108-20, dated June 8, 2020, temporarily authorizing the extension of certain permitted uses into outdoor spaces not otherwise allowed to be used for such businesses, because of—and only because of—the occupancy limitations and social distancing requirements necessary to respond to the COVID-19 pandemic; and

WHEREAS, in November, 2020, the State of Michigan experienced a high and rapidly increasing rate of spread of COVID-19, and the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services ("MDHH") issued an order that implemented state restrictions that resulted in restaurant and bar businesses in the City to again either close their business or be open only for limited outdoor service and carry-out service and also affected the operations of other businesses in the City; and

WHEREAS, on January 22, 2021, the Director of the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services issued an order that relaxed the restrictions on food service establishments again permitting the gradual and partial reopening of food service establishments within the City subject to limitations on occupancy, requirements for social distancing, and other restrictions; and

WHEREAS, based on the above developments since the adoption of Resolution R-108-20 and the reasons and explanations provided in said Resolution, and also recognizing that the temporary authorizations provided under that Resolution expired just prior to the November, 2020 MDHH order referenced above, the City Council wishes to renew and re-adopt the temporary authorizations provided

under Resolution R-108-20 for the extension of certain permitted uses into outdoor spaces not otherwise allowed to be used, because of—and only because of—the occupancy limitations and social distancing requirements necessary to respond to the COVID-19 pandemic, and for no other purpose or duration.

**NOW THEREFORE, IT IS THEREFORE RESOLVED** that City Council renews, restates, and re-adopts paragraphs 1-8 of its Resolution R-108-20 herein by this reference and as if fully set forth herein, except it shall not apply to barber shops and beauty salons and except for subparagraph 4.d and paragraph 5 which are amended and restated to read as follows:

- 4.d. A license approved under this Resolution shall expire and the permitted temporary outdoor business uses shall immediately cease and be discontinued on the same date that the authorizations set forth in this Resolution are no longer effective or are revoked (see paragraph 5).
- 5. The authorizations set forth in this Resolution shall remain effective until: (a) the State of Michigan discontinues occupancy limitations and social distancing requirements relating to the pandemic conditions in Michigan as to all of the businesses listed in paragraph 4 of this Resolution; (b) the City adopts an ordinance or ordinances relating to the subject matter of this Resolution; or (c) the City Council revokes or amends this Resolution. If the State of Michigan discontinues occupancy limitations and social distancing requirements as to some, but not all of the types of businesses listed in paragraph 4 of this Resolution, then this Resolution shall only remain effective as to those businesses that remain subject to such State restrictions.

# RESOLUTION REGARDING TEMPORARY OUTDOOR SALES EVENT LICENSE AUTHORIZATION AND REQUIREMENTS FOR REOPENING CERTAIN RETAIL, BARBER, BEAUTY SALON AND RESTAURANT/BAR BUSINESSES IN LIGHT OF COVID-19 PANDEMIC

At a regular meeting of the City Council of the City of Farmington Hills, County of Oakland, State of Michigan, attended remotely and held electronically from the City Council Chambers on June 8, 2020, at 7:30 o'clock p.m., with those present and absent being:

PRESENT: BARNETT, BOLEWARE, BRIDGES, KNOL, MASSEY, NEWLIN AND STECKLOFF

ABSENT: NONE

The following preamble and resolution were offered by Councilperson Bridges and supported by Councilperson Massey:

WHEREAS, on March 10, 2020, the Governor issued Executive Order 2020-4, declaring a State of Emergency across the State of Michigan relating to the novel Coronavirus 19, or COVID-19; and

WHEREAS, on March 16, 2020, the Governor issued Executive Order 2020-9, imposing "Temporary Restrictions on the Use of Places of Public Accommodation," which resulted in the closure of restaurants and bars across the state, including in the City, effective March 16, 2020, at 3:00 p.m.; and

WHEREAS, on March 23, 2020, the Governor issued the first "Stay at Home" Order, Executive Order 2020-21, which ordered non-essential businesses, including retail businesses in the City, to close to the public; and

WHEREAS, since their initial issuance, those Orders have been extended on various dates for various lengths of time, and as of the date of this Resolution remain generally in full force and effect; and

WHEREAS, as a result of these orders, many retail and restaurant bar businesses in the City have been either closed or open only for restricted hours or purposes for well over two months; and

WHEREAS, on June 1, 2020 and June 5, 2020, the Governor issued Executive Orders 2020-110 and 2020-114, which permit the gradual and partial reopening of retail businesses, restaurants/bars, barber shops, and beauty salons within the City; and

WHEREAS, under EO 2020-110 and EO 2020-114, the reopening of such businesses is subject to limitations on occupancy, requirements for social distancing and other restrictions. In other words, those reopening businesses are not permitted to reopen at full capacity and are not able to use all their existing space as it was before the Orders described above. Consequently, as those businesses seek to reopen, the City Council expects that they will contemplate alternative means to provide goods and services to the public, but will find that there are complexities and limitations imposed by the City's Zoning Ordinance and other City Code or land use regulations that might affect or limit their ability to take advantage of those alternatives. By way of example only, these could include limitations on the use

of adjacent sidewalks and parking areas for outdoor sales and services and/or outdoor seating for food and beverage service, limitations on the number of days and hours of operation for such sales and services events, and limitations on zoning districts in which such events are permitted; and

WHEREAS, while there are options available to reopening businesses to seek interpretations of, relief from, and/or approvals under those regulations, those procedures typically take a significant amount of time to complete, or might not fit the technical requirements for relief, and also require the use of substantial City resources. For example, requests to the Zoning Board of Appeals for relief from Zoning Ordinance regulations require publishing and mailing public hearing notices, and the scheduling and conducting of public hearings before the Board, and many of the types of temporary uses may require an additional hearing before City Council for approval. Absent some sort of broad relief, the City believes that a significant number of reopening businesses in the City can be expected to seek relief from the ZBA, City Council, or otherwise; and

WHEREAS, the City Council seeks to avoid overwhelming the ZBA – as well as the City's administrative staff and possibly City Council – with individual applications for temporary relief that is needed due to the current pandemic circumstances and emergency orders, and with individual notice and review requirements. The Council has therefore investigated options for temporarily addressing these issues on a City-wide and expedited basis; and

WHEREAS, the City Council acknowledges that it has in place a Local Declaration of a State of Emergency, effective March 23, 2020, that can be utilized, under the Emergency Management Act, MCL 30.401 et seq, to waive certain ordinance requirements, but it further acknowledges that the duration of that Local Declaration has not yet been determined by the City Council and might not cover the entire period of limited occupancy for restaurant, barbershop, beauty salon and retail businesses; and

WHEREAS, the City Council also acknowledges the concept of the "moratorium" under which the City can potentially and temporarily suspend enforcement of provisions of an ordinance, and

WHEREAS, the City Council finds that the most appropriate way to avoid overwhelming the ZBA, City Council, and City staff and to address the health, safety, and welfare issues caused by the COVID-19 pandemic in a manner that is not detrimental to the public nor contrary to the overall purpose and goals of the City's existing ordinances is to temporarily consolidate under and utilize the provisions of the City's Code provisions relating to temporary outdoor sales events for purposes of temporarily authorizing the extension of certain permitted uses into outdoor spaces not otherwise allowed to be used, because of—and only because of—the occupancy limitations and social distancing requirements necessary to respond to the COVID-19 pandemic, and for no other purpose or duration.

#### NOW THEREFORE, IT IS THEREFORE RESOLVED:

- 1. City Council affirms its existing zoning and land use regulations as reasonable and appropriate in furtherance of the public health, safety, and welfare of the City, its residents, and businesses.
- 2. City Council finds, however, that the 2020 COVID-19 pandemic represents an unusual and unprecedented event that has caused an interruption in the typical operation of businesses within the City, but particularly the operation of retail businesses, barbershops, beauty salons, and restaurants/bars in the City that rely upon visitors and in-person customers.
- 3. City Council finds that a temporary relaxation of certain regulations with respect to the operation of those businesses, or aspects of those businesses, is an appropriate response to these current

unprecedented conditions within the City, state, and country, and further finds that such temporary relaxation, if properly administered, will not adversely affect the public health, safety, and welfare and will in fact benefit both the businesses and the members of the public affected given COVID-19's wideranging effects.

- 4. City Council hereby determines that it is appropriate to establish, and it hereby does establish, a city-wide Temporary Outdoor Sales Event License Authorization (referred to hereafter as "the License Authorization") for (i) certain outdoor sales by retail businesses, (ii) certain outdoor barber shops and beauty salons (not including massage, ear piercing, waxing/hair removal, tanning, or tattoo services), and (ii) certain outdoor seating and food and beverage service by restaurants/bars, in reliance on Chapter 22, Article V of the City Code, relating to Temporary Outdoor Sales Events, and also in reliance upon other authorities referred to above, as applicable, and subject to the following requirements:
  - a. The provisions of this Resolution and the License Authorization are limited to restaurants/bars, barber shops and beauty salons (not including massage, ear piercing, waxing/hair removal, tanning, or tattoo services), and retail businesses, that can meet the requirements of this Resolution and Sections 22-103, 22-104, 22-117 and 22-118 of Chapter 22, Article V of the City Code;
  - b. The City Administration shall establish, by no later than June 12, 2020, an initial set of written standards and procedures for receiving and reviewing applications for issuance of licenses for temporary outdoor retail sales by retail businesses, temporary outdoor seating and food and beverage service by restaurants/bars, and temporary outdoor barber shop and beauty salon services (not including massage, ear piercing, waxing/hair removal, tanning, or tattoo services). Such standards and procedures shall, at a minimum, address and include:
    - i. Operation as part of an existing business with a valid certificate of occupancy adjacent to or on the same property as the outdoor area.
    - ii. Compliance with any and all applicable state and local orders related to COVID-19, including social distancing, party size limitations, masking, etc.
    - iii. Area and location limitations.
    - iv. Required demonstration that, upon installation of the proposed temporary outdoor sales by retail businesses, temporary outdoor barber shop and beauty salon services, or temporary outdoor seating and food and beverage service by restaurants/bars, there will remain ample space for parking, vehicular (including emergency vehicles) and pedestrian ingress, egress and circulation, and any other use on the subject site
    - v. Spacing limitations for tables, chairs, registers, and the like.
    - vi. Hours of operation.
    - vii. Temporary structures, such as tents, canopies/umbrellas, fencing, railings, and the like.
    - viii. Separation from parking/vehicular traffic.
    - ix. ADA compliance.
    - x. Compliance with building and fire codes.
    - xi. Provision for litter and waste.

Such standards and procedures may be amended from time to time, as deemed necessary by and with the approval of the City Manager.

- c. The procedures and requirements for submission and review of applications and for the approval of licenses authorized under this Resolution shall include, without limitation, the following:
  - i. The application shall be filed with the Planning and Community Development Department with a copy to the City Manager and City Clerk:
  - ii. The application shall be on a form provided by the Planning and Community Development Department, and shall include such information as the Community Development Department determines, including, at a minimum, the information listed in City Code Section 22-112(a);
  - iii. The application shall include an accompanying plan, with the information on the plan to include (in addition to the plan information required under Section 22-112(a)(10)):
    - 1. a scaled layout of premises, any existing outdoor seating areas and expansion area;
    - 2. location and clearances to maintain access to any fire hydrants and Fire Department connections;
    - dimensioned access to means of egress and barrier free entrance routes, locations and sizes of any temporary canopies, umbrellas or tents:
    - 4. locations and description of any fencing or seating area enclosures and egress;
    - 5. location of any relocated barrier free parking; and
    - 6. facilities for waste and trash.
  - iv. Review and approval of the license application and accompanying plan shall be by the Director of Planning and Community Development (or designee), with a copy to the City Clerk, the Police Department, the Fire Department, and the City Manager's Office. The application and plan shall be approved if it provides all of the information and meets the requirements provided herein and under the standards and procedures established under subsection b. above, and shall be denied if it does not.
- d. A license approved under this Resolution shall expire and the permitted temporary outdoor sales by retail businesses, temporary outdoor barber shop and beauty salon services, and outdoor seating and food and beverage service by restaurants/bars, shall immediately cease and be discontinued, on the same date that the authorizations set forth in this Resolution expire, are revoked, or become null and void under paragraph 7 of this Resolution.
- e. A license approved under this Resolution may be revoked by the Director of the Planning and Community Development Department (or designee) if the applicant fails, neglects, or refuses to fully comply with any and all provisions and requirements set forth in or established under this Resolution, any applicable Executive Order issued by the Governor of Michigan, or any and all provisions, regulations, ordinances, statutes, or other law referenced in this Resolution or otherwise applicable to the business undertaken.
- f. Restaurant/bar uses must comply with requirements of the Oakland County Environmental Health Department and the Michigan Liquor Control

Commission. Barbershop and beauty salon uses must comply with all requirements of the Oakland County Health Department.

- g. Temporary outdoor restaurant/bar uses that involve the sale or consumption of alcoholic beverages:
  - i. shall comply with all requirements of the Michigan Liquor Control Act and related laws, including administrative regulations adopted thereunder;
  - ii. shall comply with all requirements of Chapter 4 of the City Code; and
  - iii. may require additional review by City staff and consultants, and may require approval by City Council
- 5. The authorizations set forth in this Resolution shall become effective immediately and shall expire on October 31, 2020, unless extended by the City Council, subject to the following:
  - a. If the Governor revokes the Stay at Home Order, or the Stay at Home Order is otherwise revoked by operation of law or by court order, and the occupancy limitations and social distancing limitations are no longer in force and effect, this authorization shall be null and void, and any activities authorized shall cease immediately.
  - b. If the City adopts an ordinance or ordinances relating to the subject matter of this Resolution, this Resolution shall be considered revoked upon the effective date thereof.
  - c. The City Council may revoke or amend this Resolution at any time, and such revocation or amendment shall be effective immediately.
- 6. There shall be no fees charged for the submission of the application or the City's review of the application.
- 7. The City Administration is directed to review and evaluate the City's zoning ordinance and City Code provisions in light of the recent events related to COVID-19 and the various orders and limitations imposed in response and report to the City Council any recommended changes thereto as a result of its evaluation.
- 8. Violation of the requirements of this Resolution and/or any permit authorized hereunder shall be considered violations of the City Code.

SUBJECT: AWARD OF PURCHASE OF IDEMIA LIVESCAN SYSTEM FOR THE POLICE DEPARTMENT

#### **ADMINISTRATIVE SUMMARY**

- The City of Farmington Hills Police contract with the Oakland County Courts Law Enforcement Management Information Systems (CLEMIS) for criminal justice and public safety applications. By serving as a technical link among multiple agencies, CLEMIS promotes communication and sharing of criminal justice information. The key principle of CLEMIS is securely sharing data between law enforcement agencies in a County-operated and maintained regional database.
- The LiveScan System software & equipment is the tool that CLEMIS utilizes to report information and
  communicate with agencies. Functionality includes: Automated Fingerprint Identification System
  (AFIS) interface for records submission to the State, certification to the FBI's Electronic Fingerprint
  Transmission Specifications, "Hit/No Hit" response from the State AFIS search, automatic fingerprint
  sequencing and duplicate print checking ensuring data integrity, quick check, and review and edit
  performed on each print.
- The current LiveScan System used by the Police Department is at end of its life & no longer supported by CLEMIS and therefore is in need of a new solution. Oakland County and The State of Michigan have contracted with a new company, IDEMIA and are mandating this upgrade to ensure secure, accurate information sharing. The contract pricing terms & conditions with IDEMIA (which were extended to the City as a CLEMIS member) includes on-site installation, training and a one (1) year on-site warranty.
- Funding for this purchase is available in the Police Department Professional & Contractual Data Processing fund.

#### RECOMMENDATION

In view of the above, it is recommended that City Council authorize the City Manager to issue a purchase order to Idemia to purchase the Software for integrating LiveScan solution software and services in the amount of \$30,222.00.

#### SUBJECT: AWARD OF AGREEMENT FOR POLICE VEHICLE ACCESSORIES

#### **ADMINISTRATIVE SUMMARY**

- The Farmington Hills Police Department purchases equipment for installation in new vehicles to convert them from civilian to police use. Equipment purchased includes light bars, sirens, partition screens, transport seats, push bumpers and miscellaneous mounting racks for Police gear.
- Once delivered, the equipment will be installed by Oakland County as part of our service agreement with them; approved by City Council in June 2021.
- Sealed bids were solicited by Oakland County for the purchase of various police vehicle accessories on an "as needed basis" in July of 2018. The existing contract with Oakland County is for two (2) years with two (2) additional one (1) year options. Winder Police Equipment Inc. was awarded the contract for said bid. The awarded contract is offered to the City by extension as part of the MITN Purchasing Cooperative. Participating in a cooperative purchase provides cost savings for the City of Farmington Hills due to the buying power of the cooperative.
- Winder Equipment Inc. has provided excellent service this past year and staff is confident that they can supply all items specified in a timely manner.
- The equipment is provided with varying lengths of warrantee periods, but all carry a minimum of one (1) year.
- Funding for the equipment is provided in the 2020/2021 Automotive & Auto Equipment Fund.

#### RECOMMENDATION

In view of the above, it is recommended that City Council waive the formal bid requirements and authorize the City Manager to issue a purchase order for Police Vehicle Equipment in the amount of \$29,843.45 to Winder Police Equipment with all the terms and conditions of previously awarded bid from Oakland County contract.

SUBJECT: Award of Contract for the City Hall Electrical Modifications Project

#### **Administrative Summary**

- During times of electrical power outages, the Farmington Hills City Hall building is backed up by a generator.
- The building's current configuration however only allows portions of the electrical loads to be transferred to the generator during an outage.
- An assessment of the building's demands was completed by the City's electrical consultant, Matrix Consulting Engineers, Inc., and it was determined that the existing generator is sufficient to handle the entire City Hall building however modifications need to be made.
- These modifications were identified as a priority from the City's facilities condition assessment.
- The project was publicly bid and advertised on the Michigan Inter-Governmental Trade Network (MITN) with bids opened on August 10, 2021. A total of three (3) bids were received.
- It is recommended, the contract be awarded to Allied Building Service Company of Detroit, Inc., for their total bid amount of \$131,326.00, with a small contingency for unforeseen issues.
- Allied Building Service Company of Detroit, Inc. has successfully completed projects for the Macomb Correctional Facility, Ann Arbor Federal Building and United States Postal Service.
- Funding is available in the Public Facilities budget of the City's Capital Improvement Plan and the project is withing the budgeted amount.

#### RECOMMENDATION

IT IS RESOLVED, the City Hall Electrical Modifications Project be awarded to Allied Building Service Company of Detroit, Inc., in the amount of \$145,000.00; and

IT IS FURTHER RESOLVED, the City Manager and the City Clerk to be authorized to execute the contract on behalf of the City.

#### **Support Documentation**

The Farmington Hills City Hall building is currently serviced by a backup generator during times of power outages. The current electrical configuration of the building only allows the transfer of power for certain services, areas/offices and outlets. As a part of the City-wide facilities condition assessment, upgrading the electrical configuration was identified as a priority and the project was budgeted in the public facilities section of the City's Capital Improvement Plan. A review of the building's existing electrical layout, DTE demand records, and emergency power system was performed by Matrix Consulting Engineers, Inc. They determined the current generator is

sufficient to supply power to the entire building during power outages however electrical modifications and upgrades will need to be completed.

# MINUTES CITY OF FARMINGTON HILLS CITY COUNCIL STUDY SESSION MEETING COMMUNITY ROOM AUGUST 23, 2021 – 6:00PM

The study session meeting of the Farmington Hills City Council was called to order by Mayor Barnett at 6:00pm.

#### **UPDATE ON PUBLIC ART**

City Manager Mekjian stated that the direction from Council at their meeting when this topic was last discussed was for staff to meet and provide an update at this meeting. Staff met last week and discussed public art on public vs. private property and areas where a private property owner wants to work with an artist to fund art on a private building and use of grant money in specific areas such as the Grand River Corridor.

City Attorney Joppich added that discussion of staff also included the following:

- Using the CIA district as a test or starting site and potential permanent site for public art displays and use of grant funding for that district
- Advertising vs. art and potential amendments to ordinances, specifically special exceptions for murals with a definition and size limitations
- Reviewing other community ordinances to review more options, which they are in the process of gathering and will review at the next meeting of the group

Discussion was held on the possibility of businesses requesting a variance through the Zoning Board of Appeals. Staff commented that it would be preferred this is handled administratively, potentially through requesting ordinance amendments.

It was mentioned that Sterling Heights uses public grants for placing public art on private property and that this is one ordinance that staff mentioned and planned to review.

Other forms of art were discussed such as sculptures and projection mapping. Director Gardiner confirmed current ordinances allow for sculptures.

Mayor Barnett mentioned that member appointments are needed for the Corridor Improvement Authority (CIA) so that staff can include this committee in on conversations for that area.

City Attorney Joppich summarized that staff has identified ordinances from other cities and will meet to review those ordinances and will also review use of projection mapping based on discussions this evening. Once staff meets to review these ordinances, they will work on options to bring forth to City Council.

<u>DISCUSSION ON RECONSTITUTING THE COMMISSION ON ENERGY AND ENVIRONMENTAL SUSTAINABILITY (CEES)</u>

Mayor Barnett stated that she wants to make sure the city is doing all it can to encourage sustainability and to include business members as part of any new committee. The thought is to discuss sustainability and innovation with input from businesses such as Beaumont Farmington Hills, Bosch, etc. and to start with a 2 to 3 year commitment.

City Attorney Joppich stated that if this would not be a permanent committee, he would suggest establishing a committee or task force by resolution and not by ordinance.

The following suggestions were made by Council members:

- Forming a committee or task force for a 2-3 year period
- Membership to include 11 members to be consistent with all other boards/commissions and to include business members of the community, members of the Broadband Task Force and a liaison from the EDC
- For this to be a joint committee with the City of Farmington if they are interested
- The purpose to include innovation (technology and funding) but to narrow the purpose to 2-3 specific topics

It was determined that Attorney Joppich would draft the resolution forming the committee as discussed this evening and bring that back to City Council at a future study session.
