CABLE ACCESS COMMITTEE UPDATE

Brian Belesky, Vice-Chair, provided an update on the various programs offered on Cable Access Channel 12 and workshops offered through the Public Access University. Mr. Belesky also mentioned that Channel 12 has a new agreement with the Battle Creek Area Access Channel allowing their programming to be seen here and our programming to be shown in that area. In June the Farmington Hills Emergency Preparedness Commission is urging all our businesses to have an emergency preparedness plan in place for their individual workplaces.

An emergency is any unplanned event that can cause deaths or significant injuries to employees, customers, or the public; or that can shut down your business, disrupt operations, cause physical or environmental damage, or threaten the facility's financial standing or public image. There are some things

and events that might be manageable for a large company, and yet constitute a true disaster for a small business.

For instance, statistics show that more than 30 to 40 percent of small businesses that close in the wake of a natural disaster never reopen. They either lose their capital or their margins are so thin that they cannot survive the loss of cash flow while they repair.

Small and medium size business owners have often invested everything – all their time and resources – into making their business work. The Emergency Preparedness Commission urges business owners to give appropriate attention to protecting their investment. Consider and develop plans to protect your most important resources – human and physical - and your business continuity. A small investment of time will go a long way toward averting serious damage to your business, should an emergency event occur. Lists of appropriate preparation actions can be found on numerous websites, including <u>www.ibhs.org</u>, the Institute for Business and Home Safety site, which also includes their complete booklet, *Getting Back to Business, a Guide for the Small Business Owner Following Disaster*. CITY MANAGER UPDATE

City Manager Brock provided the following update:

- The Xempler Club is hosting the 10th Annual Jon Grant Signature Golf Classic on June 25, 2014.
- The City is working with Mr. Schwartz, who attended a recent City Council meeting citing an issue regarding the flooding of his basement due to a nearby development. The City is close to a resolution on this issue. The berm in this area has been re-established and there has been a stop work order issued to make sure that everything is built according to the consent agreement entered into with City Council.
- Center for Michigan hosted several input sessions at City Hall and at the Farmington Public Schools and the final report is complete. Results are on line at <u>www.thecenterformichigan.net</u>.
- Discussed the details of Proposal #1 dealing with Personal Property Tax that will be on the August 5th Primary ballot.
- Displayed the T-shirt designed by a Farmington Hills resident for the Rouge River Clean Up.

City Clerk Smith provided information on the deadlines for applying for an absent voter ballot and time frame for when ballots will be mailed.

PUBLIC HEARING

PUBLIC HEARING AND CONSIDERATION OF ADOPTION OF THE 2014/15 FISCAL YEAR BUDGET RESOLUTION AND PROPERTY TAX RATES

City Manager Brock explained the budget preparation process and thanked Finance Director Gajda and Controller Lin for their work again this year on the budget. From a Property Tax standpoint the revenues are flat this year. He noted that the City has had to budget for an \$180,000 reduction in Personnel Property Taxes based on the legislature requiring that those businesses that have \$40,000 and less in Personnel Property Taxes not be taxed. He further explained that there could be a \$2.6 million decrease to the budget if the Personnel Property Taxes are eliminated. He encouraged voters to educate themselves on Proposal 1 that will be on the August 5th Primary ballot regarding the Personal Property Tax issue.

City Manager Brock indicated that the proposed budget includes:

- A 2% wage increase for general employees. Employees have not received any increases since 2009 and while there was no reduction in pay at that time there was a reduction in staffing, resulting in the remaining staff being asked to take on more responsibility.
- Four (4) positions that had been eliminated.
- \$150,000 added into the local and major road funds for preventative maintenance. He explained the need for additional funding and conditions of the roads.

City Manager Brock mentioned that the City made a \$600,000 investment in the Police Department Building using mostly state and federal forfeiture funding; no tax money was used. He stated that the building is 30 years old and the benefits will be both energy and operational efficiency. Director Gajda stated that the taxable value is increasing for the first time in 7 years. He noted that the increase in Real Property taxable value is the result of a 2.06% increase in residential values, partially offset by a 4.15% decrease in commercial values and a 1.05% decrease in industrial values. Personal Property taxable values in 2014 decreased by \$11,554,590 compared to the original 2013 assessment roll. Personal Property taxable value would have increased by \$3,025,780 or 1.97% in 2014 without the impact of the 2012 Personal Property Tax Reform Legislation.

Mr. Gajda explained that while the FY 2014/15 General Fund Revenue Budget is relatively flat compared to the FY 2013/14 year-end projection, the proposed budget maintains City services, makes operational improvements in areas where previous budget cuts made if difficult to keep up with work load demands and/or new mandated work requirements, and increases support for the City's Capital Improvement Program. Property taxes and State Shared Revenue comprise 2/3's of the General Fund's \$51.6 million Revenue Budget. The remaining 1/3 is comprised of licenses and permits, service charges, fines and forfeitures, grants, investment income, miscellaneous revenue, and contributions from other funds.

Mr. Gajda stated that the FY 2014/15 General Fund Expenditure Budget is 2% higher than the FY 2013/14 year-end projection. The increase results primarily from increased contributions to the Capital Improvement Program; increased contributions for Road Maintenance, and increases in City-wide Support Services.

He noted that the FY 2014/15 General Fund Unassigned Fund Balance at June 30, 2015 is estimated to be \$10.5 million or 20% of the General Fund Expenditures. The Assigned Fund Balance at June 20, 2015 is estimated to be \$11.6 million. Assignments are made primarily for future Capital Improvements and future contributions to other city funds and Employees' Pension and Retiree Healthcare Systems.

Mr. Gajda mentioned that among the County's cities and major townships, the City of Farmington Hills had the 9th lowest tax rate in 2013. The total proposed tax rate for FY 2014/15 is increasing by 0.0268 mills due to an increase in the Refuse Removal Millage, (with no increase in the Recycling Fee). All the other city millages are proposed to remain at the FY 2013/14 level.

Director Gajda reviewed the following charts:

- History of State shared Revenue
- Revenues Dollars by Source (including inter-fund transfers) \$84,297,120
- Revenues Dollars by Fund (including inter-fund transfers) \$84,297,120
- Expenditures Dollars by Fund (including inter-fund transfers) \$90,234,063
- City-Wide Capital Expenditures \$12,064,206

Councilmember Bridges thanked Director Gajda and City Manager Brock for their work on the budget. He inquired what the largest concern is going forward.

City Manager Brock responded that the largest concern is the condition of the roads. He stated that it is going to take commitment at all levels of government to get some resolution to this problem going forward. He added that on the revenue side he is concerned about the potential impact of the Personal Property Tax Reform Legislation. He also expressed the importance for the Planning Commission and the City Council to guide the City towards redevelopment of major corridors such as Grand River and Orchard Lake Road.

Councilmember Steckloff expressed a concern with the credit card fees that are part of the Parks and Recreation Budget. She inquired if staff has reviewed other options in order to reduce or eliminate those fees such as Electronic Check Transfers.

Director Gajda responded that he and other staff have been actively investigating less expensive alternatives to accept credit card payments city wide. He has met with vendors and feels there are opportunities to either have the fee passed on or to reduce the fee. He expects to be able to address this concern within the next couple of months.

Councilmember Lerner stated commented that due to on-line registrations, the City is able to have one less person at the front counter at the Costick Center, which saves money.

Mayor Brickner opened the Public Hearing. He closed the Public Hearing as there was nobody present wishing to speak.

BUDGET RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, the appropriate City Officers have submitted to the City Manager an itemized estimate of expenditures for FY 2014/15 for the respective departments and/or activities under his/her direction; and,

WHEREAS, the City Manager has prepared a complete itemized budget proposal for FY 2014/15 including the General Fund, Special Revenue Funds, Debt Service Funds, Capital Projects Funds and the Component Units, and has submitted the same to the City Council pursuant to Article VI of the City Charter; and,

WHEREAS, a Public Hearing was held on the combined budgets for FY 2014/15 on June 9, 2014 and the property tax millage rate to be levied to support the FY 2014/15 budget; and,

WHEREAS, an appropriate public notice was published on May 29 and June 1, 2014, notifying citizens of the Public Hearing on the proposed FY 2014/15 Budget and the proposed property tax levy to support these budgets and the City Council's intention to adopt the budgets and establish the property tax rates on June 9, 2014 after the Public Hearing; and,

WHEREAS, all necessary proceedings have been taken by the City of Farmington Hills, Oakland County, Michigan, for the adoption of its Budget for the FY 2014/15;

THEREFORE, be it resolved by the City Council as follows:

- 1) That the City Council for the City of Farmington Hills hereby adopts the General Fund Budget for FY 2014/15 in the aggregate amount of \$52,711,431 for expenditures and transfers-out funded by \$51,620,187 in revenues and transfers-in.
- 2) That the City Council for the City of Farmington Hills hereby appropriates the sum of \$52,711,431 in expenditures and transfers-out for FY 2014/15 for General Fund purposes on a departmental and activity total basis as follows:

3) That the City of Farmington Hills shall levy 6.5206 mills ad valorem tax on the Taxable Value of all Real and Personal Property subject to taxation in the City of Farmington Hills for the FY 2014/15 for general operating purposes.

- 4) That the City of Farmington Hills shall levy 0.6368 mills ad valorem tax on the Taxable Value of all Real and Personal Property subject to taxation in the City of Farmington Hills for the FY 2014/15 for general debt service requirements (all 0.6368 mills are from within the City Charter Limit) and to adopt the 2014/15 Debt Service Fund Budgets schedule as attached below.
- 5) That the City of Farmington Hills shall levy 1.2868 mills ad valorem tax on the Taxable Value of all Real and Personal Property subject to taxation in the City of Farmington Hills for the FY 2014/15 for Capital Improvements of which 0.4882 mills will be dedicated to Parks Development as approved by voters in November 2007 and to adopt the 2014/15 Capital Improvement Fund Budget and Parks & Recreation Capital Development Funds Budget as attached below.
- 6) That the City of Farmington Hills shall levy 3.1764 mills ad valorem (1.4764 mills approved by the electorate for 10 years on November 4, 2003 and 1.7000 mills approved by the electorate for 10 years on November 8, 2011) on the taxable value of all real and personal property subject to taxation in the City of Farmington Hills for the FY 2014/15 for the purposes of public safety.
- 7) That the City of Farmington Hills shall levy 0.7436 mills ad valorem tax on the Taxable Value of all Real and Personal Property subject to taxation in the City of Farmington Hills for the FY 2014/15 for refuse removal and disposal.
- 8) That the City of Farmington Hills shall levy 0.0164 mills ad valorem tax on the Taxable Value of all Real and Personal Property subject to taxation in the City of Farmington Hills for the FY 2014/15 for economic development and public information.
- 9) That of the City of Farmington Hills shall levy a total of 12.3806 mills ad valorem on the taxable value of all real and personal property subject to taxation in the City of Farmington Hills for FY 2014/15.

PUBLIC HEARING AND CONSIDERATION OF AN INTRODUCTION OF AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND CHAPTER 34, "ZONING," ARTICLE 2.0, "DEFINITIONS,"; ARTICLE 3.0, "ZONING DISTRICTS," TO ADD MEDICAL MARIJUANA CAREGIVING AS AN ACCESSORY USE IN THE RA DISTRICTS; AND ARTICLE 4.0, "USE STANDARDS," TO ADD A NEW SUBSECTION 34-4.57 TO ESTABLISH REGULATIONS APPLICABLE TO MEDICAL MARIJUANA CAREGIVING; ZONING TEXT AMENDMENT 2, 2014.

Planning and Community Development Director Gardiner stated that this would amend the zoning ordinance by adding a new section regulating Medical Marihuana Caregiving as an Accessory use within Residential Districts. This amendment is being considered due to the November 4, 2008 statewide initiative creating the Michigan Medical Marihuana Act ("MMMA") which allows the possession, use, and cultivation of marihuana for the treatment of specific illnesses or conditions under certain circumstances. City Council adopted a moratorium on this issue as they felt there needed to be more direction provided by either the legislature or the courts. After reviewing the latest court decisions at the April 21st Study Session, City Council requested the Planning Commission to review an ordinance that had been prepared. The Planning Commission reviewed the proposed ordinance and held the public hearing on May 22, 2014, at which time they recommended approval to City Council.

There was discussion regarding the square footage restriction and the regulation that requires that all marihuana shall be contained within the main building in an enclosed, locked facility inaccessible on all sides. Director Gardiner stated that it was evaluated and he feels that the square footage is adequate and that the requirement for marihuana to be grown only within the main building is for security.

Mayor Brickner opened the Public Hearing. He closed the Public Hearing as there was nobody present wishing to speak.

MOTION by Bruce, support by Knol, that the City Council of Farmington Hills hereby approves the INTRODUCTION of an Ordinance to amend Chapter 34, "Zoning," Article 2.0, "Definitions,"; Article 3.0, "Zoning Districts," to add Medical Marijuana Caregiving as an Accessory Use in the RA Districts; and Article 4.0, "Use Standards," to add a new Subsection 34-4.57 to establish regulations applicable to Medical Marijuana Caregiving; Zoning Text Amendment 2, 2014.

CONSIDERATION OF ADOPTION OF RESOLUTION ESTABLISHING WATER CONSUMPTION RATES FOR THE FISCAL YEAR 2014/15 CMR 6-14-53

Department of Public Services Director Mekjian explained that these rates will become effective July 1, 2014. The Water and Sewer Rates were previously discussed at the May 12, 2014 Study Session. He noted that the Water Rates are proposed to increase by approximately 2% which correlates to \$11.32 annual increase on the average water bill. The impact to a minimum consumer is will be an increase of \$4.68 per year. Sanitary sewerage transport and treatment fees are proposed to increase approximately 3.62%, which would be a \$15.84 annual increase to the average customer. The impact to the minimum user will be an increase of \$1.59 per quarter or \$4.36 per year. He mentioned that Oakland County

In response to Councilmember Lerner, Mr. Mekjian stated that the City is on schedule to meet the deadline for completion of the Tower, and the target date to fill the tank is June 18th.

Discussion was held on the proposed savings due to the Water Tower.

<u>CONSIDERATION OF APPROVAL OF AN INTERGOVERNMENTAL AGREEMENT WITH</u> <u>THE MICHIGAN DEPARTMENT OF COMMUNITY HEALTH FOR USE OF THE MICHIGAN</u> <u>CENTRALIZED BIRTH CERTIFICATION SYSTEM</u>

City Clerk Smith stated that the Michigan Department of Community Health has been using a Birth Registry System since 2003 that they have now made available to local offices through the Centralized Birth Certification System (MiCBCS). The MiCBCS would provide one system of vital records data where all local offices that issue records would be using the same data, resulting in only one version of each record.

The centralized system allows communities to provide State certified birth records for persons born in their community, including records filed at the State level; track requests and historical changes of a record and make copies of records corrected by the State for issuance at the local level.

The State developed the MiCBCS as Federal agencies are pushing states to have a centralized system so they are able to verify a birth record electronically and it is expected that there may come a time when Federal agencies may stop accepting birth records not issued from a centralized system. Some states will not accept a birth record copy issued by a local office, which the City Clerk's Office has experienced.

MOTION by Massey, support by Lerner, that the City Council of Farmington Hills hereby recommends approval of entering into an Intergovernmental Agreement with the Michigan Department of Community Health for use of the Michigan Centralized Birth Certification System (MiCBCS); and authorizes for the City Clerk to be named as the Intergovernmental Agreement Manager for the City of Farmington Hills (Local Registrar) and to sign the agreement on behalf of the City.

City Clerk Smith stated that this Revised Fee Schedule establishes fees for the Birth Registry System and also removes the fee for the Massage Therapist since the State of Michigan has taken over that licensing. She added that the City will continue to license Massage Therapy establishments and as part of those requirements, the owner is required to provide information, including a copy of a State license, for all employees.
