Detroiters Maliek Thomas Williams, 20; Jamir Dmarco Brown-Gray, 22 and Steven Doinelle Davis, 19 were charged in the slaying death of Alex Ward, 22.

Ward shot to death at the Retreat at Farmington Hills Apartments, located on 12 Mile west of Middle Belt. Another man was also shot, according to police.

Brown-Gray and Davis have been charged with eight counts: Open murder, assault with intent to murder; possession of a firearm in the commission of a felony; possession of a firearm; discharge of a weapon in or at a building causing injury; discharge of a weapon in or at a building causing death against Brown-Gray and Davis.

Williams was charged the same charges plus possession of a firearm by a felon

Summary of Events

January 29, 2022, at 2:10 AM



 Suspect # 2 (S2) and Suspect 1# (S1) were inside Vibe Hookah.

- Victim #1 (V1) entered and had his back turned.
- S2 provided S1 a Handgun. S1 then sucker punched V1. Victim #2 (V2) intervened and attempted to break up the fight.
- S1 discharged at least two rounds. One struck V1 in the groin the other struck V2 in the thigh. S1 then gave the gun back to S2 and both left.
- The staff at Vibe mopped up all blood and picked up the shell casings and then left with the evidence.
- Both victims drove themselves to an area hospital where they were untruthful about the incident.
- Both were treated and released within hours.

SUBJECT: RESOLUTION TO CONTINUE TO PROVIDE INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY SERVICES FOR THE CITY OF FARMINGTON

ADMINISTRATIVE SUMMARY

- In 2012 the cities of Farmington & Farmington Hills applied jointly for an Economic Vitality Incentive Program (EVIP) grant to assist in funding the consolidation of Information Technology systems. Since that time the Department of Central Services has been providing miscellaneous Technology Services.
- For the purposes of the agreement "Information Technology Services" is defined as professional services to manage, maintain, assist, train, consult, repair, update and install software and hardware devices connected to the Farmington Hills network and contained within Farmington buildings. It does not include hard cost for infrastructure, equipment, and software licensing (other than network security & maintenance related licensing). Farmington is responsible for these hard costs. Additionally, specific service exemptions to the agreement include: non-networked devices, non-networked copiers & printers, CLEMIS network, mobile phones, and items not currently supported by Farmington Hills I.T. staff.
- Over the past ten(10) years Farmington has seen a dramatic improvement in their computing & communication environment. The Central Services staff has assisted in replacing outdated and obsolete infrastructure & equipment, implemented advanced security measures, managed the upgrade to the police in-car video system, transitioned (along with the Farmington Hills) to Microsoft Windows 10, Office 365 & Outlook and is currently assisting with the implementation of a new VoIP telephone system.
- Over the life of this agreement both cities learned that flexibility of resources and standardization of software & equipment has been the key to the success of this interlocal arrangement. Farmington implemented an Information Technology policy document consistent with the City of Farmington Hills which helps to keep our network secure, they agreed to a standardized desktop for user support, and they minimized the amount of unique systems so that Farmington Hills staff can remain capably trained on all network components.
- The current agreement expires at the end of March, 2022. The new agreement includes a first short term of term is April 1, 2022 through June 30, 2022 and then five (5)years July 1, 2022 through June 20, 2027 (in order to align with both cities fiscal years). In addition, the attached agreement allows for additional yearly extensions at the rate of the Consumer Price Index (CPI) or 3% whichever is less. Please note fees listed on the attached agreement include optional GIS support if Farmington decides to implement that support model during the life of the agreement.
- Farmington Hills staff is fully in support of this agreement, noting that the service level to Farmington Hills staff has not be affected and this agreement provides a modest revenue stream for the City. Staff recommends the City Council adopt the resolution herein, authorizing the City Manager & City Clerk to execute the attached Interlocal Agreement.

RECOMMENDATION

IT IS RESOLVED, the City Council authorize the City Manager and City Clerk to execute the attached Interlocal agreement to provide Information Technology Support to the City of Farmington from April 1, 2022 through June 20, 2027 for the fees listed in the agreement with possible additional extensions at the rate of the Consumer Price Index (CPI) or 3% whichever is less.

INTERGOVERNMENTAL AGREEMENT FOR INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY SERVICES

BETWEEN

<u>CITY OF FARMINGTON HILLS</u> <u>AND</u> <u>CITY OF FARMINGTON</u>

This Agreement ("Agreement") is entered into as of the date of the last signature below and is between the City of Farmington ("Farmington"), whose address is 23600 Liberty Street, Farmington, MI 48335, and the City of Farmington Hills ("Farmington Hills") whose address is 31555 West Eleven Mile Road, Farmington Hills, MI 48336, for the purpose of having Farmington Hills provide Information Technology ("I.T.") Services to Farmington.

RECITALS:

- A. Farmington Hills maintains and operates an I.T. Division within the Central Services Department with staffing capable of performing such services for Farmington.
- B. Farmington currently contracts with the City of Farmington Hills for I.T. Services and wishes to continue this practice.
- C. Farmington Hills agrees to provide I.T. Services under the terms and conditions of this Agreement.
- D. This Agreement is authorized by the charters of Farmington and Farmington Hills, MCL 41.806, and the Urban Cooperation Act of 1967, MCL 124.501 124.512.

IT IS THEREFORE AGREED:

- 1. <u>Information Technology Services Defined</u>. The terms "Information Technology Services" and "I.T. Services" shall mean professional services to manage, maintain, assist, train, consult, repair, update and install software and hardware devices connected to the Farmington Hills network and contained within Farmington buildings.
- <u>I.T. Services to be Provided by Farmington Hills.</u> Farmington Hills will provide to Farmington I.T. Services, as described in this Agreement, on a routine work hour schedule of 7:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. Monday – Friday, except designated City of Farmington Hills holidays. Exceptions to these hours will be special projects, upgrades, downed systems, or any unforeseen circumstance. All laws, ordinances,

and policies of the City of Farmington Hills applicable to the provision of I.T. Services shall apply to the I.T. Services provided to Farmington under this Agreement.

- 3. <u>No Additional Services.</u> Except for other services expressly approved by other Agreements, Farmington Hills shall not be obligated under this Agreement to provide or assist Farmington or any Farmington personnel with any other direct, indirect, backup, or supplemental support of City of Farmington Hills related service, of any kind or nature. This provision is not intended to alter or amend any exiting mutual aid arrangement or intergovernmental agreement.
- 4. <u>Standardization.</u> This Agreement does not, and is not intended to, obligate, or require Farmington Hills to change, alter, modify, or develop any different procedures for I.T. services and the products/services/application that it maintains. Farmington understands the need for standardization for support and will at all times endeavor to accept the same products/services/application as used by Farmington Hills unless there is a specific business related reason to use something different, in which case it will then be the option of Farmington Hills, in its discretion, to support or not support the new product/service/application.
- 5. <u>I.T. Policies and Procedures.</u> Farmington will adopt the Farmington Hills Information Technology Policies and Procedures as attached and updated from time to time. This will allow Farmington Hills I.T. to standardize its support procedures and assist with network and data security.
- 6. <u>Term.</u> This Agreement shall be from April 1, 2022 through June 30, 2027. If this Agreement is not terminated as provided below, it shall automatically renew annually for a Renewal Term of one (1) year, subject to the terms and conditions below. The Renewal Terms possible under this Section are not limited.
- 7. *Fee for Services.* In consideration of the I.T. Services described herein, Farmington shall pay Farmington Hills an annual fee as follows:

| July 1, 2025-June 30, 2026 | \$50,638 | ; | \$62,694 with GIS |
| July 1, 2026-June 30, 2027 | \$52,157 | ; | \$64,575 with GIS |

For additional, Renewal Terms, the fee shall increase from the previous year by the rate of the Consumer Price Index (CPI) or 3% whichever is less.

The fees from April 1, 2022-June 30, 2022 shall be payable on or before May 1, 2022. Beginning July 1, 2022 fees shall be payable in quarterly installments, with the

first such quarterly payment being made on or before July 31, 2022, and the subsequent quarterly payments being made and due on each October 1st, January 1st, April 1st and July 1st thereafter. Interest at the rate of 1% per month shall be paid by Farmington to Farmington Hills for any amounts not received by Farmington Hills by the payment due date.

- 8. <u>I.T. Equipment.</u> Farmington shall be solely and exclusively responsible for all costs, expenses, and liabilities associated with the purchase, lease, installation, operation, and/or use of any Farmington I.T. equipment. Farmington Hills shall not be obligated to provide Farmington with any equipment required. In the event data from either party's network is stored on the other party's network, there shall be no entitlement to ownership of that equipment.
- 9. <u>Data Ownership</u>. Data from Farmington and Farmington Hills will be solely owned by each entity. Farmington Hills will perform backups of data. Each entity is responsible for processing its own Freedom of Information Act requests, regardless of where data may be stored or maintained.
- 10. *Independent Contractor.* Farmington Hills shall provide I.T. Services to Farmington as an independent contractor, with Farmington Hills being responsible for all workers' compensation and other insurance, income tax, social security, and other withholding, and all other compensation or benefits for Farmington Hills employees involved in providing I.T. Services. At no time shall any Farmington Hills employee involved in providing services be considered or claimed be to be an employee or agent of Farmington, and Farmington shall not be deemed or allowed to control, supervise, or direct Farmington Hills' employees involved in providing I.T. Services.
- 11. <u>No Transfer of Farmington Legal Obligations to Farmington Hills.</u> This Agreement does not, and is not intended to, transfer, delegate, or assign to Farmington Hills or its employees, any constitutional, statutory, or other legal responsibility, duty, obligation, or liability of Farmington, for which Farmington shall remain solely liable. Farmington shall be solely and exclusively responsible, during the term of this Agreement, for: (a) guaranteeing that all Farmington existing software systems have been legally obtained, licensed, and maintained through appropriate support contracts: and (b) endeavoring to protect, maintain and support its I.T. infrastructure.
- 12. *Farmington Hills Staffing Responsibilities.* In providing I.T. Services pursuant to the terms and conditions of this Agreement, Farmington Hills further agrees to take all necessary actions required to support Farmington's I.T. hardware and software systems and that:
 - a. Its assigned Central Services/I.T. staff is adequately trained in the support of I.T. systems.
 - b. It will make available I.T. support staff to maintain a reliable, stable, and safe network environment.

- c. Its assigned personnel will respond to requests for service from Farmington staff members.
- d. Its assigned I.T. personnel and administrative personnel will take such actions as are necessary and appropriate to provide full and complete I.T. services as are commonly provided by one government entity to another.
- 13. <u>Network & Data Security-</u>Farmington Hills shall implement technical and organizational measures and safeguards that ensure the adequate protection of Farmington data, confidentiality, integrity, availability and resilience of processing systems and services and shall implement a process for regularly testing, assessing, and evaluating the effectiveness of technical and organizational measures for ensuring the security of the network
- 14. Security Breach Action. Farmington Hills will notify Farmington as promptly as possible under the circumstances and without unreasonable delay, of any Security Breach involving any network data, infrastructure, or application. As used herein, "Security Breach" is defined as any event involving a known, actual, or suspected compromise of the security, confidentiality or integrity of network data, infrastructure, or application. Farmington Hills will use commercially reasonable efforts to contain such a breach and provide Farmington with a detailed description of the Security Breach, the type of data that was the subject of the Security Breach and the identity of each affected department (or person, to the extent permitted by Law), promptly after such information can be collected or otherwise becomes available. Farmington Hills agrees to take action immediately, to investigate the Security Breach, to take all commercially reasonable actions to identify, prevent, and mitigate the effects of any such Security Breach, and to carry out any recovery or other action necessary to remedy the Security Breach. Farmington Hills shall make commercially reasonable efforts to give Farmington a reasonable opportunity to communicate to its citizens regarding security breaches, but Farmington Hills will have the final say on any technical explanation of the security breach.
- 15. <u>Control of I.T. Services</u>. I.T. Services shall be under the exclusive control and jurisdiction of the Director of Central Services for Farmington Hills. If the City Manager for Farmington objects to a policy or procedure utilized in the provision of delivering I.T. Services to Farmington, the Farmington Hills Director of Central Services or his designee shall respond to same in writing within 72 hours, providing such facts and opinions which support his determination of the issue. In the event that the matter is not resolved to Farmington's satisfaction, the City Managers of Farmington and Farmington Hills shall meet to review the matter.
 - a. Specific Exemptions include: non-networked devices, non-networked copiers & printers, CLEMIS network, mobile phones, and items not currently supported by Farmington Hills I.T. staff.
- 16. *Insurance*. Farmington Hills shall obtain and maintain in force during the term of this Agreement insurance coverage for general liability, motor vehicle liability, and worker's compensation in amounts it determines to be appropriate, with Farmington named as an additional insured on all liability policies and entitled to copies of Certificates of Insurance confirming the required insurance during the entire term of this Agreement.
- 17. Liability and Indemnification. To the fullest extent permitted by law, Farmington agrees to hold Farmington Hills harmless from any claims, suits, demands, judgments, or causes of action made against Farmington Hills, their elected or appointed officials, employees, agents, or volunteers for the actions of Farmington's elected or appointed officials, employees, agents, or volunteers arising from or in connection with the performance of this agreement. To the fullest extent permitted by law, Farmington Hills agrees to hold Farmington harmless from any and all claims, suits, demands, judgments, or causes of action made against Farmington, its elected or appointed officials, employees, agents, or volunteers, for the actions of Farmington Hills' elected or appointed officials, employees, agents, or volunteers arising from or in connection with performance of this agreement. Otherwise, each Party shall be responsible for the acts of its officials or employees in the performance of this Agreement and shall seek its own legal representation and bear the costs associated with such representation, including any attorneys' fees. Except as provided herein, neither Party shall have any right under any legal principle to be indemnified by the other party or any of its employees or agents in connection with any claim.
- 18. <u>Governmental Immunity and Authority Unaffected</u>. Nothing in this Agreement is intended, nor shall it operate, to diminish, delegate, divest, impair, or contravene any constitutional, statutory, and/or other legal right, privilege, power, obligation, duty, capacity, immunity, or character of office including, but not limited to, governmental immunity on behalf of either Party or any of its agents.

19. Termination.

- a. This Agreement may be terminated for any reason, and with or without cause, by the mutual written agreement of Farmington Hills and Farmington, approved by concurrent resolutions of the Farmington Hills City Council and the Farmington City Council.
- b. This Agreement may be terminated by Farmington Hills if Farmington fails to pay an amount owing under Section 7, including applicable late charges and interest, within 60 days of when the payment was due. Such termination by Farmington Hills shall be by written notice to Farmington that contains a clearly stated effective date of the termination that is at least 30 days after the date of the notice. If all amounts owing, including past due installments, late charges, interest, and any new installments coming due during that time are not paid, the termination shall be effective, relieving Farmington Hills from any obligation to provide any

further I.T. Services. Before Farmington Hills gives notice of termination under this provision, it shall first notify Farmington of its failure to timely pay the amount owed and allow a reasonable opportunity for Farmington to pay such amount.

- c. In addition to a termination under subsections (a) and (b), either Party may terminate this Agreement for any reason, and with or without cause, by written notice to the other Party. During the Initial Term, six (6) months' written notice shall be required before termination. During any Renewal Term, 90 days' written notice shall be required before termination.
- 20. <u>No Third Party Beneficiaries</u>. The sole and exclusive purpose of this Agreement is to provide I.T. Services for Farmington. This Agreement is not intended to, and does not create any special or other duty, obligation, promise, benefit or right to I.T. Services in favor or for the benefit of any person, entity, organization that is not a party to this Agreement.
- 21. <u>Assignments</u>. Farmington Hills's obligations under this Agreement may not be assigned except with the written approval of Farmington.
- 22. <u>Notices</u>. Notices under this Agreement shall be to the City Managers of the respective Parties at the addresses on Page 1.
- 23. <u>Amendments</u>. Amendments of this Agreement shall be in writing, approved by concurrent resolutions of Farmington Hills and Farmington City Councils, and be signed by authorized representatives of the Parties.
- 24. <u>Severability</u>. If a court of competent jurisdiction finds a term, or condition, of this Agreement to be illegal or invalid, then the term, or condition, shall be deemed severed from this Agreement. All other terms, conditions, and provisions of this Agreement shall remain in full force.
- 25. <u>Applicable Law</u>. This Agreement is made and entered into in the State of Michigan and shall in all respects be interpreted, enforced, and governed under the laws of the State of Michigan. The language of all parts of this Agreement is intended to and, in all cases, shall be construed as a whole, according to its fair meaning, and not construed strictly for or against any Party. As used in this Agreement, the singular or plural number, possessive, or non-possessive, shall be deemed to include the other whenever the context so suggests or requires.
- 26. <u>No Waiver</u>. Absent an express written waiver, the failure of any party to pursue any right granted under this Agreement shall not be deemed a waiver of that right regarding any existing or subsequent breach or default under this Agreement. No failure or delay on the part of any Party in exercising any right, power or privilege hereunder shall operate as a waiver thereof, nor shall a single or partial exercise of

any right, power or privilege preclude any other or further exercise of any other right, power, or privilege.

- 27. <u>Compliance with Laws</u>. Each Party shall comply with all federal, state, and local statutes, ordinances, regulations, administrative rules, and requirements applicable to its activities performed under this Agreement.
- 28. <u>Entire Agreement</u>. This Agreement contains the entire agreement of the parties with respect to the subject matter of this Agreement, and supersedes all prior negotiations, agreements, and understandings with respect thereto.
- 29. *Filing*. As provided in MCL 124.510, this Agreement and any amendments of it shall be filed with the Oakland County Clerk and Michigan Secretary of State.

REPORT FROM THE CITY MANAGER TO CITY COUNCIL March 28, 2022

SUBJECT: CITY HALL CAMPUS TOWER LEASE FIRST AMENDMENT WITH VERIZON WIRELESS

ADMINISTRATIVE SUMMARY

- In 2003 Oakland County constructed a 185 ft. monopole tower behind the Fire Department on the City Hall campus; to operate a County-wide public safety radio system. Once the tower was constructed Oakland County sold the tower to the City for \$1.00 in exchange for lease space on said tower.
- In March of 2012 the City signed a five-year lease agreement with four (4) automatic five (5) year extensions with New Par (Verizon Wireless) to lease vertical space on the City owned tower.
- A request was made by Verizon to update the location & equipment on the tower, as well as recognize Cellco Partnership d/b/a Verizon Wireless in place of New Par Delaware Partnership.
- City staff and the City Attorney's Office reviewed the request and have worked with the Verizon Wireless legal team to review the proposed equipment changes as well as the lease amendment (referenced as Lease Amendment #1). Except as specifically modified by this Amendment, all terms and conditions of the original Lease dated March 8, 2012 remain in full force and effect.
- Verizon has approved and signed the lease amendment.
- Attached is the first amendment to Lease Agreement that is presented for consideration.

RECOMMENDATION

In view of the above, it is recommended that City Council approve and authorize the City Manager and City Clerk to sign the First Amendment to Lease Agreement with Cellco Partnership d/b/a Verizon Wireless for the City Hall campus tower.

FIRST AMENDMENT TO LEASE AGREEMENT

This First Amendment of Lease Agreement ("Amendment") is made as of the date it has been fully signed and is by and between the City of Farmington Hills, a municipal corporation whose address is 31555 W. Eleven Mile Road, Farmington Hills, Michigan 48336 ("Landlord") and Celico Partnership, d/b/a Verizon Wireless (successor-in-Interest to New Par), whose office address is One Verizon Way, Mail Stop 4AW100, Basking Ridge, New Jersey, 07920 ("Tenant"). The Landlord and Tenant are at times collectively referred to hereinafter as the "Parties" or individually as the "Party."

- 1, RECITALS:
- A. Landlord and Tenant, or its predecessor-in-interest, entered into a Lease Agreement dated March 8, 2012, as amended by the Consent to Verizon Wireless Equipment Modifications dated February _____, 2022 (hereinafter collectively referred to as the "Agreement"), whereby Tenant utilizes space on the City's tower structure and in the City's equipment shelter located at 31555 W. Eleven Mile Road, Farmington Hills, Michigan for the purpose of operating and maintaining certain wireless telecommunications equipment.
- B. Landlord and Tenant desire to amend the Agreement to modify the leased space on the tower.
- C. Landlord and Tenant also desire to amend the Agreement to allow Tenant to modify its existing antenna facilities and tower equipment.
- D, Landlord and Tenant wish to further amend the Agreement to modify the notice section of the Agreement.

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the foregoing and for other good and valuable consideration, the receipt and sufficiency of which are hereby acknowledged, Landlord and Tenant agree as follows:

- <u>Use of Leased Premises.</u> The Leased Premises presently set forth in the Agreement is amended to provide that Tenant is permitted to install, maintain, and operate antennae and related equipment at 116 feet to 124 feet above ground level on the tower, with the top of the antennae to be no higher than 124 feet above ground level.
- <u>Tenant's Equipment</u>. Exhibit B of the Agreement is hereby amended to replace sheets T1, T2, C1, C2, and C3 with the amended sheets T1, T2 C1, C2, and C3 attached to this Agreement, which shall be referred to as Amended Exhibit B.

SUBJECT: Award of Proposal for Solid Waste, Yard Waste, and Recycling Collection and Disposal

Administrative Summary

- The City's collection and disposal contract with Waste Management of Michigan expires in June 2022. This contract has been in place since October 1, 2008, with a 10-year contract amendment approved in March of 2012.
- In 2021, City Staff and RRRASOC began evaluating options for extension proposals from Waste Management and determined that it was appropriate to seek competitive proposals.
- A request for proposals was issued by the City on January 3, 2022, for curbside collection and disposal services as well as municipal facility collection and disposal services. The solicitation was posted on the MITN e-procurement system and responses were opened on January 28, 2022 and read aloud. Notification was sent to over two hundred (200+) contractors. We received three (3) responses and one (1) "No-Bid."
- It has been determined that Green for Life Environmental (GFL) is qualified to perform the service and their proposal also provides the lowest pricing for the City. It is the recommendation of City staff and RRRASOC to enter into a new contract for collection and disposal with Green for Life Environmental (GFL).
- GFL provides similar services for many local communities including Novi, Southfield, Walled Lake, Milford, Milford Township, and South Lyon. References from RRRASOC are favorable.

RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that City Council approve and authorize the City Manager to sign a contract with Green for Life Environmental for Solid Waste, Yard Waste, and Recycling Collection and Disposal services on behalf of the City of Farmington Hills for a period of five (5) years with one or more administration-approved extensions not to exceed a total of three (3) additional years, under the pricing, terms & conditions set forth in the agreement.

REPORT FROM THE CITY MANAGER TO CITY COUNCIL – March 28, 2022

SUBJECT: Award of Contract - Clean and Paint the Interior Garage Area of the DPW facility

ADMINISTRATIVE SUMMARY

- A project to clean and paint the interior walls and ceiling of the DPW facility was publicly advertised and competitively bid on the Michigan Inter-governmental Trade Network (MITN) e-procurement system and opened on February 8, 2022.
- The garage area of the DPW Facility was last painted 25 years ago in 1997. Cleaning, surface rust removal and repainting of the steel surfaces will protect the building from deterioration and add new lift to the structure.
- Due to some areas of more substantial corrosion, a 10% contingency has been included to cover any unknown conditions identified during the project.
- Funding for this project is provided in the Building Maintenance account. The recommended bid and contingency are within budget.
- The low bidder did not provide references for bid evaluation and therefore was not considered.
- The recommended vendor, Du-All Cleaning, Inc. of Sterling Heights, Michigan has provided similar services for the cities of Troy, Port Huron and Bloomfield Township and has shown to be professional and reliable. They have provided a 5-year warranty of their work. They have also offered to include the two exceptions to their bid into the project at no additional cost.

RECOMMENDATION

IT IS RESOLVED that the City Council of Farmington Hills authorize the City Manager to sign a contract with Du-All Cleaning in an amount not to exceed \$149,220 which includes a 10% contingency for the cleaning restoration and painting of the walls and ceiling of the DPW's garage area.

SUPPORT DOCUMENTATION

The City's DPW facility was re-built and expanded in 1997. The garage area is continually exposed to diesel exhaust soot and corrosive salt dust which has darkened the interior of the building and caused some areas to have heavy surface rust. The rusted areas have been inspected by one of the City's as-needed consultants who recommended a deep cleaning, rust removal and re-painting as a preventative maintenance measure. The recommended contractor is able to complete this project without interruption of the DPW's daily operations. The contractor has also offered a 5-year warranty above the 1-year warranty specified.

SUBJECT: Consideration of Award for the Pasadena Park Fire Hydrant Extensions CDBG

Administrative Summary

- This project includes the construction of new water main and fire hydrants in three locations in the Pasadena Park Subdivision.
- The project was publicly bid and advertised on the Michigan Inter-Governmental Trade Network (MITN) with bids opened on March 18, 2022.
- The lowest bidder who has demonstrated the ability to complete the work is Springline Excavating, LLC of Farmington Hills, Michigan. Their bid was in the amount of \$482,738.94.
- Project information will be mailed to residents prior to the start of construction. Phone or in person consultation meetings with residents will also be available upon request.
- The contractor will be allowed to start construction immediately after award and the signing of the contract. The final completion is expected by midsummer.
- The 2021/2022 Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Program appropriated funding for fire hydrant extensions within the Pasadena Park Subdivision. This was approved during the review of 2021/2022 CDBG allocation at the City Council meeting April 12, 2021.

RECOMMENDATION

IT IS RESOLVED, the Pasadena Park Fire Hydrant Extensions CDBG be awarded to the lowest competent bidder, Springline Excavating, LLC, in the amount of \$482,738.94.

IT IS FURTHER RESOLVED, the City Manager and the City Clerk be authorized to execute the contract on behalf of the City.

Support Documentation

The City of Farmington Hills has designed and bid this project for the purpose of extending fire hydrants, as shown on the attached map, to provide fire protection coverage in an area which currently has none. Funds for the construction are provided from the 2021/22 Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Program and in the City Budget. This project will include the installation of both high-density polyethylene pipe (HDPE) by a directional drill construction technique that minimizes impact to the area and ductile iron pipe by open cutting the existing gravel road.

On March 18, 2022, four (4) bids were received for the above referenced project (see Bid Summary). The low bid, provided by Springline Excavating is competitive with current prices in today's market. Springline Excavating has successfully completed similar projects for local municipalities in the Metropolitan Detroit areas including for the City of Farmington Hills. It is our opinion they can adequately perform the work as outlined in the contract.

MINUTES CITY OF FARMINGTON HILLS JOINT STUDY SESSION MEETING FARMINGTON HILLS CITY COUNCIL FARMINGTON HILLS PLANNING COMMISSION COMMUNITY ROOM MARCH 21, 2022 – 6:00PM

WASTE HAULING CONTRACT

Karen Mondora, Director of Public Services, explained that the city's waste hauler contract expires the end of June of this year so staff has been reviewing options with Mark Csapo from Resource, Recovery and Recycling Authority of Southwest Oakland County (RRRASOC) who is present to discuss those options with Council.

Mr. Csapo, RRRASOC, explained that the contract that expires the end of June was initially awarded in 2007 and extended several times in the past. He stated that he reviewed with staff the options of further extending the contract or seeking competitive proposals and it was agreed that it was time to seek competitive proposals. Mr. Csapo stated that proposals were accepted and he reviewed with Council the current and proposed pricing for curbside services as is and then also with recycling and trash carts included as well as a review of those costs over the term of the contract for the proposals received. He noted that Green For Life (GFL) was the low bid. He stated that the contract would be for 5 years with an option for a 3-year extension if approved by both parties. Mr. Csapo discussed GFL's corporate profile and additional background on the company from other communities that utilize their services. He added that GFL has some known team members to Farmington Hills staff and that he feels they would ensure quality service for the city.

Questions were raised by Council regarding the size of trash carts if provided, large item pick-up, clothing pick-up and issues other communities have experienced with GFL.

Mr. Csapo explained that he is not recommending that the city distribute trash carts right away but to wait a year into the contract to make that transition. He is recommending a default size cart of 64 gallons for every household based on past experience with the recycling carts and trying to distribute different sizes right away. He said that adjustments could be made on case-by-case basis if the city agreed. Mr. Csapo noted that the there would be no change in services provided with the exception of an additional two weeks of yard waste pick-up. He added that the clothing pick-up was done by a different company completely and is no longer curbside service but by appointment only.

Mr. Csapo addressed the concerns of Council regarding consistent and quality service for the residents, and he was confident that GFL could provide that to the city.

City Manager Mekjian stated that the contract would be on the next regular meeting agenda, March 28 2022 for consideration.

Mayor Barnett expressed the desire for more recycling opportunities for residents and Mr. Csapo stated that they are working on that.

MASTER PLAN PROCESS UPDATE (THIS ITEM WILL BE A JOINT MEETING WITH THE PLANNING COMMISSION)

Ed Gardiner, Director of Planning and Community Development, stated that several months ago City Council and the Planning Commission held a joint meeting and from that meeting there were 3 items that City Council asked for follow-up information. They included:

- **Update on previous initiatives of the Planning Commission**. This has been provided to City Council for this meeting and if there is time staff can review that with Council.
- Develop a study group consisting of 3 members of the City Council and 3 members of the Planning Commission. Those members have been identified and it was recommended that they meet periodically to receive updates and provide guidance throughout the master plan process. One member from the Planning Commission has since resigned so the Planning Commission will appoint that 3rd person at an upcoming meeting.
- Request for the Planning Consultant to provide a framework for the master plan process.

Rod Arroyo, Giffels Webster, outlined the master plan process that he and staff proposed that included the following:

- A document that is easy to read and understand conveys the vision
- Economic snapshot including market analysis
- Robust community engagement
- A plan that supports local policies and land use, set-up for implementation and contains historic context and graphics

Mr. Arroyo discussed in more detail the market assessment and public input proposed. He added that this is roughly an 18-month process.

Council questioned when the subcommittee would start meeting and what the city could do for areas that require immediate attention such as 14 Mile/Orchard Lake Road/Northwestern area, 12 Mile Road office area and CIA identified areas.

Mr. Arroyo suggested that some areas could be addressed through changes in the zoning ordinance.

A social distance district was suggested for the 14 Mile/Orchard Lake Road/Northwestern area. Council acknowledged the construction in this area that potentially could affect more immediate changes.

Director Gardiner suggested that the city consider allowing for a new type of residential component that allows for higher density in certain areas, which was not permitted under current ordinances. Mr. Arroyo agreed and stated that such an ordinance could be developed parallel to the master plan process.

It was noted that the study committee would start meeting next month but a date and time was to be determined.

Mr. Arroyo reviewed the document prepared and submitted by the Planning Commission regarding initiatives that have and have not worked in the past.

Options for alternative funding for the Grand River Corridor were discussed including façade grants and tax abatements per PA 201 recently approved by City Council.

NATIONAL LEAGUE OF CITIES UPDATE

Overall, the council members that attended felt the sessions were worthwhile and that they would support city membership for NLC. A 3-year membership was suggested.

Mayor Barnett stated that this discussion could be included as part of next year's goals setting session.

PUBLIC COMMENT

There were no public comments.

ADJOURNMENT

The study session meeting adjourned at 7:26pm.

There is no standard menu as the menu is selected for each event. She introduced Mr. Sklar to speak about his business.

Mr. Sklar stated that he was a North Farmington High School graduate that grew up in Farmington Hills. He has 14 restaurants around the country and this would be his first business in Farmington Hills. He caters to high-end clients and businesses and is happy to be coming back to Farmington Hills to open up a business. He mentioned that the location was formerly Anna's House.
