SUBJECT: Liquor License Ordinance Review

Earlier this year, City Council requested that city administration work with the city attorney to review the referenced ordinance. Specifically, the intent of the review was to study the potential impacts for removing the requirement for an establishment to be a bona fide restaurant.

We have had an opportunity to complete our review and would like to discuss our thoughts/findings with City Council. In addition, we would also like to discuss our current liquor license policy, available quota licenses, and redevelopment liquor licenses.

CITY OF FARMINGTON HILLS LIQUOR LICENSE POLICY

- WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Farmington Hills has the authority to approve the issuance of new liquor licenses for consumption on the premises to certain parties, and
- WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Farmington Hills must endeavor to cause the greatest benefit to the community from the use of its approval powers in the matter of the issuance of such licenses;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the City Council shall consider the following guidelines in connection with the approval of the remaining licenses for use in the City of Farmington Hills:

- 1. Compatibility of proposed use with the surrounding land uses with attention to the effect the proposed location would have on the economic development of the area.
- 2. Compatibility of proposed use with abutting roadways with attention to the traffic circulation and traffic impact on the surrounding area.
- 3. The proximity of the proposed use to similar existing operations and establishments already serving alcohol will be taken in into consideration.
- 4. The proximity of the proposed use to office service and commercial enterprises so as to accommodate the tenants and their employees shall be taken into consideration.
- 5. Consideration shall be given to the proximity of the proposed use to residential, school, and church districts with reference to the possible adverse effect such use may have on such districts.
- 6. Consideration shall be given as to the effect in general the issuance of the license would have on the health, welfare, and safety of the general public.
- 7. Consideration will be given to the effect the proposed location would have in contributing to the economic stability or revitalization of areas within the City.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the City Council shall consider the following guidelines in connection with the applicant for a license:

- (1) The applicant's general management experience and business reputation in connection with the operation of similar facilities.
- (2) The applicant's moral character with special consideration being given to any past criminal convictions for crimes involving moral turpitude, violence, or alcoholic liquor violations by the applicant or those whom he intends to manage the proposed facility.
- (3) The existence of adequate financial resources for the establishment and operation of the proposed licensed business in proportion to the type and size of the proposed business.
- (4) If a corporation applies for the licenses, the word "applicant" used in this Resolution shall be considered to include the current corporate officers.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that prior to the hearing on all new applications for liquor licenses for consumption on the premises and transfers of location applications for such licenses, the applicant shall meet the following conditions within a stated period of time and submit to the City Council the following:

- (1) That a preliminary site plan showing the location of the proposed building, the architectural design, building elevations, and other pertinent physical features of the proposed building to be constructed on the premises be submitted to the City Clerk to be conveyed to the City's Planning/Building and Fire Departments for recommendation.
- (2) That the floor plans, seating arrangements, the interior design, and the type of furniture and fixtures to be used in the proposed restaurant facilities be submitted to the City Clerk to be conveyed to the City's Planning/Building and Fire Departments for recommendation.
- (3) If the building is already constructed, then in addition to the above the applicant shall furnish any proposed renovation to both the interior and exterior of the premises or any proposed building alterations, to meet and comply with all existing City Codes and Ordinances; with these plans to be submitted to the City Clerk and conveyed to the City's Planning/Building and Fire Departments for recommendation.
- (4) That the applicant's experience, financial capability, history of experience as a licensee, proposed food service menus and other facts or proposals pertinent to the operation of the proposed facility be submitted to the City Clerk for conveyance to the Police Department for recommendation.
- (5) A statement as to when applicant intends to commence construction or renovation of the proposed building or facility and when applicant expects to complete such construction and place such license into full operation.
- (6) The applicant shall also furnish such other material as it may deem pertinent to the consideration of the application by the Council.
- (7) That the findings and recommendations of the Planning/Building, Fire and Police Department are forwarded to the City Clerk and, following which, all such findings and recommendations are placed on the City Council Agenda by the City Clerk and that approval of such licenses shall be contingent upon the application for and receipt of site plan approval, building permits, zoning changes and other necessary approvals by the City of Farmington Hills within six (6) months after the approval.
- (8) That construction be started within six (6) months after the issuance of a license, unless specifically altered by the City Council, at which time the progress of the applicant in meeting all of the above stated conditions will be reported to the City Council.
- (9) That no floor plan, building elevation, site plan, seating arrangement, kitchen layout or other pertinent facts, drawings or documents submitted to the City of Farmington Hills at the time of their approval may be changed, unless it is a reasonable improvement in design or service function of the facility, at such time the applicant seeks approval at any of the other administrative divisions of the City, nor upon final construction of buildings or alterations of them.

(10) That the failure of any applicant to meet any of the above conditions may be reasons, but not necessarily the only reasons, for the City Council to deny the annual renewal of any of the licenses issued and further that a review of any license which has not been activated by the licensee will be conducted by the City Council and if satisfactory performance pursuant to the above conditions is not found, then the City Council reserves the right to withdraw its approval and deny the license at the time of review or at the time of annual renewal.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the aforesaid provisions are to be considered as only guidelines for the applicant and this City Council, and nothing in this Resolution shall be construed to prevent this City council from deleting or adding to such guidelines in its discretion, and no applicant shall be considered to have acquired any vested interest in the issuance of a license by complying with any of the guidelines until the approval for the issuance of the license is given by this City Council.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that all applications for a license shall be made to the City Council on forms which are to be obtained from the City Clerk's Office and upon completion of the information required on such forms to be filed with the City Clerk.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that any applicant who shall make any statement either orally or in writing to the City Council for the purpose of inducing this City Council to approve the issuance of a license, which statement is false or fraudulent, shall be deemed to have forfeited the right to such approval, and this City Council reserves the right to withdraw its approval or if a license has already been issued, to request the Michigan Liquor Control Commission to revoke such license or to request the Michigan Liquor Control Commission to deny the renewal of any license issued to such applicant. Any material deviation made by the applicant without the consent of this City Council in connection with the proposed construction or renovation of the building and the restaurant facilities shall be deemed to constitute such false and fraudulent statement.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that City Council shall conduct hearings on applications, if any are pending or available, three times each year, this being during the months of January, May and September at regularly scheduled Council meetings.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that nothing in this Resolution should be construed as a representation by this City Council that the issuance of the remaining licenses will be approved, and this City Council further reserves the right to withhold hearings on any applications until at some future time to be designated by this City Council.

REPORT FROM THE CITY MANAGER TO CITY COUNCIL - March 19, 2007

SUBJECT: Establishment of Redevelopment Project Area

ADMINISTRATIVE SUMMARY

- In an effort to assist cities with redevelopment, the Michigan Legislature recently adopted Public Act 501 of 2006 that creates liquor licenses that are not regulated by the Liquor Control Commission's (LCC) "Quota System."
- The new law allows the LCC to issue new public on-premise liquor licenses to businesses engaged in dining, entertainment or recreation that have a seating capacity of at least 50 people. The business seeking the license must be in a City Redevelopment Project Area that has been created by a resolution of the City Council.
- The amount of economic development investment in the Redevelopment Project Area determines the number of liquor licenses that can be issued by the LCC. For a City with a population of 50,000 or more, the total amount of investment in real and personal property in the Project Area must reach \$50 million in order to obtain one liquor license.
- In order to qualify for a license in the first cycle after the effective date of this legislation, a business in Farmington Hills must apply to the LCC by June 29, 2007. The LCC fee for the license is \$20,000.
- The first step is to adopt a resolution establishing the Redevelopment Project Area. A map has been prepared for your review that includes over \$50 million of investment. The Project Area is predominantly commercial property. Note: Public Act 501 allows the City of Farmington Hills during the first license cycle after adoption of the Act to include investment that occurred in the past seven years.

Attached for your review is a map of the proposed Redevelopment Project Area.

Recommendation: It is recommended that City Council adopt the attached resolution to establish the Redevelopment Project Area as outlined in Exhibit A.

MICHIGAN LIQUOR CONTROL CODE OF 1998 (EXCERPT) Act 58 of 1998

- 436.1521a Public on-premises licenses; issuance to businesses; conditions; commercial investment in redevelopment project area; time period; total investment; number of licenses; requirements; fee; transfer of license prohibited; attempt to secure on-premises escrowed license or quota license; definitions.
- Sec. 521a. (1) In order to allow cities, villages, and townships to enhance the quality of life for their residents and visitors to their communities, the commission may issue public on-premises licenses in addition to those quota licenses allowed in cities, villages, and townships under section 531(1). The commission may issue a license under this section to a business that meets either of the following conditions:
- (a) Is located in a redevelopment project area meeting the criteria described in subsections (3) and (4) and is engaged in activities determined by the commission to be related to dining, entertainment, or recreation.
 - (b) Is located in a development district or area that is any of the following:
- (i) An authority district established under part 3 of the recodified tax increment financing act, 2018 PA 57, MCL 125.4301 to 125.4329.
- (ii) A development area established under part 6 of the recodified tax increment financing act, 2018 PA 57, MCL 125.4602 to 125.4629.
- (iii) A downtown district established under part 2 of the recodified tax increment financing act, 2018 PA 57, MCL 125.4201 to 125.4230.
 - (iv) A principal shopping district established under 1961 PA 120, MCL 125.981 to 125.990n.
- (2) The commission shall not issue a license under subsection (1)(a) unless the applicant fulfills the following in relation to the licensed premises:
 - (a) Provides the activity described in subsection (1)(a) not less than 5 days per week.
 - (b) Is open to the public not less than 10 hours per day, 5 days per week.
- (c) Presents verification of redevelopment project area status to the commission that includes the following:
- (i) A resolution of the governing body of the city, village, or township establishing its status as a redevelopment project area.
- (ii) An affidavit from the assessor, as certified by the clerk of the city, village, or township, stating the total amount of investment in real and personal property within the redevelopment project area of the city, village, or township during the preceding 3 years.
- (iii) An affidavit from the assessor, as certified by the clerk of the city, village, or township, separately stating the amount of investment money expended for manufacturing, industrial, residential, and commercial development within the redevelopment project area of the city, village, or township during the preceding 3 years.
- (3) Relative to the licenses issued under subsection (1)(a), the amount of commercial investment in the redevelopment project area within the city, village, or township must constitute not less than 25% of the total investment in real and personal property in that redevelopment project area as evidenced by an affidavit of the assessor of the city, village, or township. This subsection does not prevent the city, village, or township from realigning the redevelopment project area in the presentment of verification provided for under subsection (2)(c).
- (4) In relation to a license issued under subsection (1)(a), an applicant must be located in a city, village, or township that meets at least 1 of the investment requirements of subsection (1)(a) during the 3 years preceding the submission of its application. The total investment in real and personal property in the redevelopment project area within the city, village, or township over the appropriate time period described in this subsection must be at least 1 of the following:
 - (a) Not less than \$50,000,000.00 in cities, villages, or townships having a population of 50,000 or more.
- (b) Not less than an amount reflecting \$1,000,000.00 per 1,000 people in cities, villages, or townships having a population of less than 50,000.
- (5) The commission may issue a license under subsection (1)(a) for each monetary threshold described in subsection (4)(a) and (b), and, after reaching the initial threshold, 1 additional license for each major fraction of the monetary threshold above that original threshold.
 - (6) The following apply to a license issued under subsection (1)(b):
- (a) The amount expended for new construction, or to rehabilitate or restore the building that housed the licensed premises, must be not less than \$75,000.00 over a period of the preceding 5 years or a commitment for a capital investment of at least that amount in the building that houses or will house the licensed premises, that must be expended before the issuance of the license.

- (b) The total amount of public and private investment in real and personal property within the development district or area must not be less than \$200,000.00 over a period of the preceding 5 years as verified to the commission by means of an affidavit from the assessor, as certified by the clerk of the city, village, or township.
- (c) The licensed business is engaged in dining, entertainment, or recreation, is open to the general public, and has a seating capacity of not less than 25 persons.
- (7) The commission may issue 1 license under subsection (1)(b) for each monetary threshold described in subsections (6)(a) and (6)(b), or for each major fraction of the monetary threshold. The initial enhanced license fee for a license issued under this section is \$20,000.00.
- (8) The commission shall not transfer a license issued under this section to another location. If the licensee goes out of business, the licensee shall surrender the license to the commission. The governing body of the city, village, or township may approve another applicant within a redevelopment project area described in subsection (1)(a) or development district or area described in subsection (1)(b) to replace a licensee who has surrendered the license issued under this section provided the new applicant's business meets the requirements of this section but without regard to subsections (2)(c), (3), and (4) or subsection (6)(b).
- (9) The individual signing the application for the license shall state and demonstrate that the applicant attempted to secure an appropriate on-premises escrowed license or quota license issued under section 531 and that, to the best of his or her knowledge, an on-premises escrowed license or quota license issued under section 531 is not readily available within the county in which the applicant proposes to operate.
 - (10) As used in this section:
- (a) "Escrowed license" means a license in which the rights of the licensee in the license or to the renewal of the license are still in existence and are subject to renewal and activation in the manner provided for in R 436.1107 of the Michigan Administrative Code.
- (b) "Readily available" means available under a standard of economic feasibility, as applied to the specific circumstances of the applicant, that includes, but is not limited to, the following:
 - (i) The fair market value of the license based on where the applicant will be located, if determinable.
 - (ii) The size and scope of the proposed operation.
 - (iii) The existence of mandatory contractual restrictions or inclusions attached to the sale of the license.

MICHIGAN LIQUOR CONTROL CODE OF 1998 (EXCERPT) Act 58 of 1998

436.1521 Limitation on tavern or class C licenses; renewal of license; conditions; revocation; transfer of license; "development district" defined.

Sec. 521. (1) Beginning December 29, 2006, the commission shall not issue a tavern or class C licenses under this section. However, those licenses issued under this section before December 29, 2006 remain valid and may be renewed if in compliance with this section. The commission shall renew licenses issued under this section before December 29, 2006 for persons who operate businesses that meet all of the following conditions:

- (a) The business is a full service restaurant, is open to the public, and prepares food on the premises.
- (b) The business is open for food service not less than 10 hours per day, 5 days a week.
- (c) At least 50% of the gross receipts of the business are derived from the sale of food for consumption on the premises. For purposes of this subdivision, food does not include beer and wine.
 - (d) The business has dining facilities to seat not less than 25 persons.
- (e) The business is located in a development district with a population of not more than 50,000, in which the district, after a public hearing, has found that the issuance of the license would prevent further deterioration within the development district and promote economic growth within the development district.
- (2) If in any licensing year the sale of food for consumption on the premises of the business represents less than 50% of the gross receipts for the business, the commission, after due notice and proper hearing, shall revoke the license issued under subsection (1).
- (3) A license issued under this section is transferable as to ownership or location only within the development district.
 - (4) As used in this section, "development district" means any of the following:
- (a) An authority district established under part 3 of the recodified tax increment financing act, 2018 PA 57, MCL 125.4301 to 125.4329.
- (b) An authority district established under part 4 of the recodified tax increment financing act, 2018 PA 57, MCL 125.4401 to 125.4420.
- (c) A downtown district established under part 2 of the recodified tax increment financing act, 2018 PA 57, MCL 125.4201 to 125.4230.
- (d) A principal shopping district established under 1961 PA 120, MCL 125.981 to 125.990n, before January 1, 1996.

Liquor Licenses for Redevelopment

PA 501 of 2006 (SB 162)

- The Liquor Control Commission (LCC) may issue new public on-premises liquor licenses to local units of government.
- Businesses must meet one of the following conditions:
 - 1. Development Districts
 - 2. City Redevelopment Project Areas
- These licenses are not transferable to another location, and if the business with a license goes out of business, the license is surrendered to the LCC.
- If a license is surrendered back to the LCC from a business, the local unit of government may approve another applicant in that same development district or city redevelopment project area to replace the licensee as long as the new business meets the same requirements.
- Licensed businesses must:
 - 1. Be engaged in dining, entertainment or recreation
 - 2. Be open to the general public
 - 3. Have a seating capacity of at least 50 people
 - 4. Demonstrate they attempted to purchase a readily available license within the municipality that they want to operate, and that one was not available
 - 5. Pay a \$20,000 fee for the license

Development Districts

- Licenses may be issued to businesses in one of the following development districts:
 - 1. Tax Increment Finance Authority (TIFA)
 - 2. Corridor Improvement Authority

- 3. Downtown Development Authority (DDA)
- 4. Principal Shopping District (PSD)
- These business must do one of the following to receive a license:
 - Expend at least \$75,000 for the rehabilitation or restoration of the building over a period of the preceding five years
 - 2. Commit capital investment of at least \$75,000 that will be expended for the building before the license is issued.
- The total amount of private and public investment in real and personal property in the development district must be at least \$200,000 for the preceding 5 years.
- Licenses will be issued for each of the above (\$200,000) monetary thresholds reached, and for each major fraction thereof after the initial threshold is reached.

City Redevelopment Project Areas

- A City Redevelopment Project Area is created by resolution of the city governing body.
- Licenses may be issued to businesses located in a City Redevelopment Project Area which:
 - 1. Are engaged in dining, entertainment, or recreation activities at least 5 days per week
 - 2. Are open to the public at least 10 hours per day, 5 days per week

Cities must:

- 1. Pass a resolution of the governing body of the city establishing a Redevelopment Project Area
- Have commercial investment in the Redevelopment Project Area within the city be 25% or more of the total investment in real and personal property in the redevelopment property area.
- City Redevelopment Project Area licenses will only be issued to cities that have total investment over the last 3 years (or last 5 years for the first licenses issued) in real and personal property in the
- redevelopment area of:
- 1. At least \$50 million in cities having a population of 50,000 or more, or
- 2. At least \$1 million per 1,000 people in cities of less than 50.000
- City Redevelopment Project Areas may receive one license for each of the above monetary threshold reached, and for each major fraction thereof after the initial threshold is reached.
- These investment requirements are for the three years preceding the application for the license (or five years for the first licenses issued).

PA 502 of 2006 (SB 163)

- Prohibits any further new DDA-specific liquor licenses from being issued if SB 162 is approved (these are the 50 licenses that were previously allowed for under law – most of which have already been issued – and will be replaced by the new redevelopment licenses in SB 162).
- Allows the current DDA licenses to continue and be renewed.

July 11, 2022

SUBJECT: PURCHASE OF STRYKER POWER LOAD STRETCHER SYSTEM & RELATED EQUIPMENT

ADMINISTRATIVE SUMMARY:

- The Farmington Hills Fire Department would like to purchase the Power Load Stretcher System from Stryker Medical. The Power Load cot fastener improves operator and patient safety by supporting the cot throughout the loading and unloading process. This system will help minimize the danger of patient drops due to a missed hook, by supporting the cot until the wheels are on the ground. Missed hooks can result in severe injury or death to patients. Stryker guarantees "no-missed hooks," when utilize the full Powered System. In addition, some patients are excessive in weight and this system will lift the patients up to 700 lb. which will reduce the strain on first responders when loading the patients. The Stryker Powered System is dynamically crash tested for increased first responder and patient safety during transport.
- This system has become the industry standard across the nation and throughout Metro Detroit for EMS Transporting agencies. FHFD was approved and have utilized two (2) power load systems since last fiscal year with great success. All other members of Western Wayne Fire Association and OAKWAY utilize the system.
- The City Charter requires sealed competitive bidding of commodities that individually or aggregately exceed \$10,000 in one fiscal year. The Charter also requires a waiver if it is in the best interest of the City to not competitively bid a product or service. Stryker Powered Systems is the manufacturer of this equipment which is designed and manufactured in Michigan and results in localized support and service, as well as supporting the local Michigan economy.
- FHFD is requesting to purchase of three (3) new Power Load Stretcher system including the cot in the amount of \$145,248.00. Stryker will also provide annual onsite preventive maintenance inspection and unlimited repairs including parts, labor, and travel with battery coverage for the system for six (6) years and the cots for five (5) years for the amount of \$38,140.20. Installation for the three (3) systems will be \$4,650.00 installed by Kodiak Emergency Vehicles (Stryker approved installer). Shipping cost is \$1,067.73. Stryker will give a credit of \$15,000.00 for the trade-in value of the two (3) Ferno manual cot and fastener.
- Funding for this expense is budgeted in the capital account.

RECOMMENDATION:

In view of the above, it is recommended that City Council waive the sealed bid process & authorize the City Manager to issue a purchase order to Stryker Medical in the amount of \$169,455.93 to purchase the Power Load Stretcher Systems & related equipment and a purchase order to Kodiak Emergency Vehicle in the amount of \$4,650 to install the Powerload Stretcher Systems & related equipment.

MINUTES CITY OF FARMINGTON HILLS FARMINGTON HILLS CITY COUNCIL CITY HALL - COMMUNITY ROOM JUNE 27, 2022 – 6:00PM

The study session meeting of the Farmington Hills City Council was called to order by Mayor Barnett at 6:01pm.

Council Members Present: Barnett, Boleware, Bridges, Bruce, Knol Massey and

Newlin (arrived at 6:05pm)

PRESENTATION ON INVESTING IN MICHIGAN'S BROADBAND FUTURE

Gary Mekjian, City Manager, explained that the city has had some issues with Spectrum related to internet outages and reliability and staff asked representatives to come in to discuss those with Council.

Karen Coronado, Manager of State Government Affairs, discussed the company Charter Spectrum and its network outreach noting that it is the 2nd largest operator in the United States with over 32 million customers in 41 states.

Council expressed some concerns they were experiencing with speed and reliability and she mentioned that in some cases it could be an issue with the lines in that area and if addresses were provided, she could have those areas reviewed.

Ms. Coronado pointed out that \$153 million dollars was recently spent in Michigan. She stated that the standard download speed is proposed to increase from 200 to 300 and from 300 to 400 but the upload speed will remain at 10. She confirmed that the standard download speed is only guaranteed if the device is hard wired and stated that many things can affect speed such as the number of devices in the home.

She explained that the Rural Digital Opportunity Fund (RDOF) is adding 115,000 miles of network throughout the country. She commented on the substantial gap in people not using the service and noted that Charter Spectrum has several assistance programs for residents. She discussed other funding that is expected or could be used to expand broadband with Charter.

Council requested obtaining the amount of money spent in Farmington Hills. Ms. Coronado responded that the data they have is not broken down to each city.

Discussion was held on the cost of cable services and Ms. Coronado explained that those costs are related to the cost of programming, which is passed along to the customers.

In response to Council regarding competition, she explained that the Michigan Uniform Franchise Agreement is not exclusive and the city can have as many franchise agreements and cable companies in their city as they want. The issue is that there is a significant cost to build the infrastructure for a company if that is not already in place.

It was suggested that the assistance programs are promoted for residents and a link included on the city's website.

Council inquired about a battery-operated unit within subdivisions so when power goes out there is battery back-up in those locations. Ms. Coronado was not aware of any battery back-up unit and commented that all of their equipment runs off power and if there is an outage and the area is safe, they would bring out a generator. She noted that the battery back-up may be possible and that option could be reviewed, but she is not aware that the company is looking into utilizing these at this time.

Additional concerns were expressed with service and discussion was held on checking modem speeds and if that is done by Charter Spectrum on a proactive basis. Ms. Coronado stated that there is a program in place to send messages to residents but she would be happy to inquire about proactive testing of modems.

She confirmed with council that there was a full digital upgrade in Farmington Hills in 2019 but no upgrades since that time. The plan is to replace infrastructure as needed but there are no plans in place for specific infrastructure replacement.

Ms. Coronado stated that residents should not have to pay more for the speed increase and that change should be automatic but there may be some scenarios where older equipment would have to be upgraded to handle the higher speeds. There was a recent rate increase in cable so she does not expect that to increase in the near future.

Council suggested offering more packages that could reduce the cost for some users or even help to attract new users. Ms. Coronado responded that they have limits and restrictions on programing but the industry as a whole is talking ala cart services due to the use of streaming services.

Council requested that the company look into the roll out of 5G modems and providing technology updates to the city.

PUBLIC QUESTIONS AND COMMENTS

Mayor Barnett explained that there was an incident last week that involved the targets used for training by the Police Department. After concerns were brought to the city's attention, the targets have since been removed pending a legal review of the department along with other department trainings and how these targets are used to ensure the city is following procedures.

The following persons spoke during public questions and comments regarding the use of the targets at the Police Department and images taken and posted to social media:

Jamie Neufeld, Glenwild, spoke in support of the Police Department.

Cameron Blunt, Pontiac, MI representing Oakland Forward, inquired about city plans to address the issue.

Mayor Barnett reiterated the city's plans to hold a legal review and noted that the images have since been removed pending that review.

Sheila Hughes, Winterset Circle, expressed concern with images of black men being used as targets and suggested the use of silhouettes.

Michael Sweeney, Mulberry Drive, spoke in favor of the Police Department and their professionalism.

Dr. Webster-Jackson suggested that if images are used, that images of all races are utilized for training as she understands the need for this type of training but to avoid targeting one group of people.

Danielle Ohm, Foxgrove Ct., spoke of the history of institutional racism and feels not all are respected equally as proven by the use of the targets in question. She expressed concern with the use of life-like targets and requested that the legal review is an independent review and shared with the public by Council in its entirety.

Kermit Williams, Founder of Oakland Forward, thanked the city for removing the targets and acknowledged other members of Oakland Forward in the audience. He suggested additional diversity training and offered assistance from Oakland Forward. He expressed the need to create a feeling of safety for all and asked the Council to help change systematic racism and create policies and procedures that are reviewed periodically.

James McQueen, Pontiac, MI and member of Oakland Forward, expressed concern with the use of these types of targets that he at no time used even during his training for Desert Storm.

Kevin Clark, Farmington Hills Police Officer, stated that he is proud of the department and training he has received in Farmington Hills and he has never been trained to shoot at any particular race, age or gender and the reason various targets are used is to work through any explicit bias towards any particular demographic. He expressed concern with the divisiveness this has caused as the officers have worked hard to be equitable in dealing with all people.

Mayor Barnett expressed concern that nobody called a City Council member, staff or the Police Chief regarding these concerns before a press conference was held with the media.

Councilmember Bridges stated that he would like to see data that shows these targets are widely used. He asked Officer Clark about the use of targets and bias against a certain demographic and if he ever trained shooting at a black target.

Officer Clark explained the targets used and stated that if any officer has a bias, they have to work through this and the targets and training are used for this purpose. He answered that he had not trained shooting at a black target but has used the Milo training which depicts various actors of all demographics and situations.

Councilmember Bruce inquired if the targets teach restraint as some targets are holding a cell phone and not a gun. Officer Clark agreed they teach restraint and reiterated that the targets help officers work through explicit bias and to deal with the issue and not the color, gender, etc. of the individual.

Councilmember Massey stated that he researched the images used and of the 2,300 images, 185 have an image of a black person so the photos taken and posted he believes were selective. All of the images

varied in holding a weapon versus a cell phone or other item for training purposes. He stated that the numbers do not reflect certain individuals are being targeted.

Latricia Hemphill, resident, stated that the images she saw in the news posted by a parent were of black men in hoodies holding guns and she asked that the City be honest and transparent and if this is true to own it so the community can trust the city and move forward.

Joseph Williams, Winterset, spoke of importance of social imaging and messaging and in today's culture the need for people to be more conscious of their actions and words.

Tula Kabone, Real Talk Radio, stated that the black community respects the police. He spoke of the racism he has seen first-hand living in the south and commented that explicit bias exists in all people and it is not black against white but right against wrong. He thanked the Mayor for this opportunity to speak but to not forget the children that saw those images.

Mark Fancher, Staff Attorney for the Racial Justice Project for ACLU of MI, suggested ending the use of targets with any racial characteristics. He spoke of social conditioning and stated that racial violence still exists. He feels the targets promote black men as criminal and dangerous. He strongly urged the following:

- An investigation into whether such targets were used as reported
- Identify the individuals responsible and let the public know
- Commit to using only bullseye or silhouette targets going forward
- Arrange for appropriately credentialed professionals to conduct interviews with officers on the force about racial attitude and why there were no objections to use of the targets in the department at any level
- Require officers receive training to understand why there is concern about this matter and any Officers that demonstrate they "don't get it" re removed from the police force.

Dr. Patricia Coleman-Burns, resident, thanked the community for coming out this evening and stated there should be listening and not speaking by those being challenged. She agreed a diversity officer is needed in the city and commented on systemic racism that must change and need to change the standards by which we operate. The people speaking feel something real and it should not be wiped away by common standards.

Milton Moore, Nottingwood, stated that he was a victim of racial profiling growing up in Detroit and to all of the people who were not of color to picture their family members on those targets as that is how black people feel. To say it is a practice throughout the nation is not the point. Whoever is responsible should be held accountable.

Steven Kennedy, former Farmington Hills resident and current Pontiac resident, stated that this issue is bigger than Farmington Hills and one good he feels will come of this is that other communities will now review their targets and practices. He expressed concern with the Council challenging comments made by the public and feels they should just listen and hear the pain from the community with no rebuttal. He commended Council for this forum and the police for their service.

Angie Smith, Farmington School Board Vice President, thanked the Mayor and Council for their service and for dealing with the difficult issues. She commented on the open door policy of Council and stated that the situation is hurtful and was never brought to anyone's attention in the city. She thanked Officer Clark for his service and the Police Departments' service to the schools. She acknowledged the Police

Academy for civilians initiated by Chief King and stated that both City Councils and the School Board is working hard to help the community.

Mayor Barnett acknowledged that the comments and feelings of all that spoke are real and Council has heard them and are addressing the situation.

City Manager Gary Mekjian introduced himself and his background and spoke of the programs and efforts of the city for diversity, equity and inclusion but acknowledged there is more work to be done.

Police Chief Jeff King apologized to the community, Council, Police Department and staff but feels that the city will come out better for having these conversations. He stated that the city values the citizens that came out tonight to speak and ask questions about procedures and he encourages residents to bring concerns forward in the future but asks simply that they do so by bringing concerns to the city directly so staff can gather information and address the concern in a comprehensive and transparent fashion and provide context and critical information about the procedures and process, which he plans to do this evening. Chief King explained the use of targets by the Department and procedures used for training. He noted the steps immediately taken once the Department was made aware of the concern and steps that will be taken going forward to investigate the incident that will be shared.

Councilmember Bridges thanked Chief King for acknowledging the sensitivity of this matter and stated that the city has a great Police Department and that this is not meant to indict the entire Department. He does not believe it was the right decision to display those targets as there are other options and would like to see them permanently removed. He added that he has expressed concern over the racial disparity with regard to citations issued according to the city's dashboard statistics and asked for an explanation several weeks ago and still has not received any update. He wants to see a more diverse work force and for all to be aware of the fact we are a racially diverse community.

Councilmember Bruce agreed that there is systemic racism and racial profiling today, but he has always been about fairness and for all to be treated equally. As a clinical, neuropsychologist, he considers himself an expert in human performance and that includes explicit bias. The goal of the Police Department training is to train the explicit bias out of officers by using targets of different races. He explained that you change behavioral expectation through these trainings that include use of targets of all races, not by using silhouettes. He is concerned that if the targets are removed permanently, those explicit biases will remain making the city less safe. He asked the Police Chief if he believes the targets used keep people from being shot.

Police Chief King responded that he does believe the training provided keeps people from being shot and mentioned that the Farmington Hills training is known as the gold standard in Oakland County.

Councilmember Bruce agreed all of the people should be heard but that cannot happen if they do not come to the city and he is upset that this issue was brought to the press for people to make assumptions and that the city was not provided that opportunity to be heard. He feels this type of training is important and that it works.

Mable Fox, resident, thanked Councilmember Bridges for information he brought forth regarding the dashboard statistics and spoke about tolerance and the fact that she wants to feel like she belongs and not just tolerated.

Mayor Barnett commented that more information is needed on the statistics from the dashboard to provide context around those statistics and staff is working on that as well.

Councilmember Knol stated that she wants to be part of a community that respects everyone and has the best trained police department in the United States as she does not want an accidental shooting of anyone of any color. She asked Chief King to explain how the photos of people in the targets are used versus using silhouettes and how that best trains the officers.

In response to Council, Police Chief King discussed how the use of targets with photos or video training versus just using silhouette targets better equip officers to react. He stated that regardless of the event, officers are trained to react to behavior through use of the targets and not an individual.

Councilmember Boleware spoke of the different experiences of black people versus white and the fact that there may be certain triggers that would not necessarily affect white people. Council suggested a Diversity, Equity and Inclusion (DEI) Officer and as a result of those conversations hired a consultant. She stated the time for consulting should be done and that hiring of a DEI Officer on staff is critical and that person could continue to work with the consultant to get practices in place.

Darlene King, DEI Consultant, spoke of the work and progress the city has made in its DEI efforts and the journey staff has taken to date and work they have yet to accomplish. She suggested that best practice is to hire this person from within as that person would already have a greater understanding of the culture.

Mayor Barnett suggested that Ms. King attend a future study session to discuss the progress made to date.

Mayor Pro-Tem Newlin stated that she was upset by some of the comments on social media suggesting that she did not care because she had not replied to the comments. She stated that while she may not have replied on social media, she listens and cares and has empathy as she has had exposure to these racial concerns expressed in her own family.

Councilmember Massey stated there were selective images that were taken and posted to social media but he recognized that the topic was an emotional one that has brought a lot of people out to speak, which is a good thing because racism is wrong. The city is working towards further diversity and has made progress and embraces diversity. He commented that the images are part of an educational process to make officers better and the officers go through fair and impartial training to explain how racial bias can impact decision making. Dr. Massey stated that the dashboard shows statistics of arrests but not where they were arrested or if the person was a resident so staff is working on that information. He added that the Farmington Hills Police Department is one of the best policing agencies in the State and he hopes this issue will be resolved.

Darlene King, DEI Consultant, added that the city has a DEI Advisory Board comprised of department leaders and an Advisory Council comprised of individuals working for the city including two Police Sergeants and one Detective.

There were no further public comments. City Council took a short break at this time.

COUNCIL MEMBERS COMMENTS AND ANNOUNCEMENTS

City Manager Mekjian provided the following update:

CONSIDERATION OF APPOINTMENT TO FARMINGTON AREA COMMISSION ON AGING.

MOTION by Knol, support by Bruce, that the City Council of Farmington Hills hereby confirms the Mayor's recommendation to appoint Marian Schulte to the Farmington Area Commission on Aging with a term ending February 1, 2023.

CONSIDERATION OF ADOPTION OF A RESOLUTION ESTABLISHING WATER RATES FOR FISCAL YEAR 2022/2023. CMR 6-22-57

Tammy Gushard, Deputy Director for Department of Public Works, explained that the Great Lakes Water Authority (GLWA) voted to remove the bad debt of Highland Park so the rates are slightly lower than those previously presented at the City Council study session. She reviewed the proposed water rates and noted that the water tower has represented an overall savings of \$20 million for the city.

Council commented that this still does not reflect what High Park owes for past years and that discussions should continue on how the city could recoup that money.

CITY OF FARMINGTON HILLS AMENDED WATER SUPPLY RATES

RESOLUTION NO. R-114-22

WHEREAS, the Oakland County Water Resources Commissioner (WRC) has performed a review of the finances for the City of Farmington Hills water supply system including the cost to purchase water from the Great Lakes Water Authority, the cost for WRC to operate and maintain the water supply system, and reserve funds including a capital improvement reserve, an emergency maintenance reserve, and a major maintenance reserve; and

WHEREAS, in a letter dated June 14, 2022, the Oakland County Water Resources Commissioner has recommended that water supply rates be established for the next fiscal year effective July 1, 2022; and

WHEREAS, the water consumption charge has increased \$1.59 from \$43.62 per Mcf to \$45.21 per Mcf; and

WHEREAS, the minimum quarterly charge has been established at \$72.34 plus a meter maintenance fee based upon an assigned use of 1.6 Mcf; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the rates of \$45.21 per Mcf for water consumption, and \$72.34 for a minimum quarterly charge for the City of Farmington Hills Water Supply System be established effective July 1, 2022 for all users of the City of Farmington Hills Water Supply System.

WHEREAS, the County of Oakland, through its Oakland County Water Resources Commissioner, under the Michigan Constitution of 1963, Article 7, § 28, and the Urban Cooperation Act of 1967, on September 27, 2018, entered into contract with the City of Farmington Hills for the construction, operation, and maintenance of the Farmington Sewage Disposal System; and

WHEREAS, the City shall provide, by proper ordinance or resolution for the sewage disposal rate to be charged to all premises within the City connected to the Farmington Sewage Disposal System; and

WHEREAS, the City of Farmington Hills was notified by the Oakland County Water Resources Commissioner, that sewage disposal charges for the Evergreen-Farmington Sanitary Drain Drainage District would increase effective for use on and after July 1, 2022 and the Gross Pollutant Surcharge and the Industrial Waste Control (IWC) charges approved the Great Lakes Water Authority (GLWA) would also go into effect on July 1, 2022; and

WHEREAS, the Oakland County Water Resources Commissioner (WRC) has performed a review of the finances for the Farmington Hills Sewage Disposal System including the cost for disposal to the Great Lakes Water Authority, the charges for operation and maintenance of the Evergreen – Farmington Sewage Disposal System, the cost for WRC to operate and maintain the City's sewage disposal system, and reserve funds including an emergency reserve, capital improvement reserve, and a major maintenance reserve; and

WHEREAS, in a letter dated June 14, 2022, the Oakland County Water Resources Commissioner, as operating agency for the City, recommended that sewage disposal rates be established effective July 1, 2022; and

WHEREAS, the sewage disposal charge has increased \$2.87 from \$44.25 per Mcf to \$47.12 per Mcf; and

WHEREAS, the minimum quarterly charge has been established at \$75.39 based upon an assigned use of 1.6 Mcf; and

WHEREAS, the flat rate quarterly charge has been established at \$188.48 for sewer users that do not have a water meter based upon an assigned use of 4.0 Mcf; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the rates of \$47.12 per Mcf for sewage disposal, \$75.39 for a minimum quarterly charge and \$188.48 for the flat rate quarterly charge for the Farmington Hills Sewage Disposal System be established effective July 1, 2022 for all users of the Farmington Hills Sewage Disposal System and the Great Lakes Water Authority (GLWA) gross Pollutant Surcharge and the IWC charges be established in accordance with the following until further notification from GLWA on the net charges:

1. **Pollutant Surcharge**

A Pollutant Surcharge shall be levied against industrial and commercial customers contributing sewage to the system with concentrations of pollutants exceeding the levels described as follows:

- A. 275 milligrams per liter (mg/l) of Biochemical Oxygen Demand (BOD).
- B. 350 milligrams per liter (mg/l) of Total Suspended Solids (TSS).
- C. 12 milligrams per liter (mg/l) of Phosphorus (P).
- D. 100 milligrams per liter (mg/l) of Fats, Oils & Grease (FOG).

It is assumed that normal domestic customers do not contribute sewage with concentrations of pollutants exceeding the above levels, therefore, the Pollutant Surcharge will not apply to domestic customers. Further, restaurants shall be exempt from Pollutant Surcharge per Federal Court Order, "Second Interim Order," dated July 10, 1981.

2. **Industrial Waste Control**

Based on the size of the water meter, actual or assigned, each non-residential user of the system shall pay a monthly Non-residential Surcharge in accordance with the following schedule:
