		increase, suicides are up and heroin deaths have	
		increased. On the crime prevention front, officers	
		will carry"Narcan," which is a generic spray that reverses drug overdoses. It is a opioid blocker.	
		Crime is down, but they are seeing "car hopping"	
		which includes vandalism and theft. Residents need	
		to lock their cars and remove valuables. There have	
		been no civil rights complaints against the	
		Department.

		<b>DEMERS:</b> They are also seeing an increase in	
		heroin overdoses as well as overdoses of prescription drugs. There are openings in the	
		department and new officers are being sworn in.	
		3. SCHOOL BOARD: JESSICA CUMMINGS:	
		There are recommendations to close and re-purpose	
		some schools. Residents should go to the meetings	
		and ask questions. There will be 4 Community	
		Forums with the first being at Harrison High	
		School. There were 2 School Board resignations	
		and interviews are being done with 4 finalists.  There is a Community Forum on 9/16 and a vote	
		for an increase in school millage renewal in on	
		11/3.

		over prescribing and insurance, Medicaid and Medicare fraud. The Attorneys Office is available	
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		to come to any senior center or any interested group to provide comprehensive and educational information. There was a Federal Strike Force that came to crack down on Medicare fraud. They are still here, they never left.
