SUBJECT: Proposed Vendor for Independent Review of Police Situational Awareness Training and Analysis of Police Transparency Dashboard

Introduction

City Council last discussed this item at its July 25, 2022 study session. Please recall that this item includes 3 phases:

- 1 An Independent Analysis of Police Situational Awareness Training
- 2 Traffic Stops and Citation Analysis
- 3 Arrest Analysis

In addition, City Council has already authorized city administration to conduct an independent legal review of the police situational awareness training as well

Items 1, 2 and 3 will compare our police department to model policies, guidelines, and best management practices from nationally recognized organizations.

Background

City Council Concerns and suggestions from the July 25, 2022 study session included:

- The cost of all reviews
- That the county should provide further data points as the entity collecting this data for communities.
- The city is not required to have a transparency dashboard but is providing this information to be more transparent but the raw data without context could put communities at risk
- Suggested researching grant opportunities to help fund the analysis of the data
- Suggested building the city's own database and potentially using ARP funding and having a third-party audit of the data
- The fact that it was not just about the data and perceived perception of the data but the need to remove that disparity of what the data appears to show

- Concern that every time DEI efforts are discussed, the budget or costs are a concern
- Unsure that Winbourne has the expertise with regard to situational awareness training
- Comment that this is an investment in the city and if the city needs to house its own data to get the data points they need, then the city should find the funding to do so and then make that information available to the public

Discussion

Staff has reviewed City Councils concerns and offers the following information for City Councils consideration.

The cost to perform Phases I, II, and II are \$13,200, \$56,100 and \$51,810 respectively. As of the writing of this report staff is still researching grant opportunities to help offset the potential costs.

The source of the data being displayed on the transparency dashboard is taken directly and automatically from the information that our police officers are entering into the CAD computer system, when a citation is issued. The database is held within the CLEMIS system at Oakland County. Staff is strongly recommending that the city not create its own database as it would be duplicitous and would require the additional expense of hiring someone (either in house or contracted services) with the expertise to analyze the data.

As City Council knows, the problem is that the transparency dashboard only shows raw data with no context, leaving the public to draw their own conclusion of the data. If City Council decides to move forward with Phase II and III of the proposal, Winbourne will assist the City in providing data filters that match industry best management practices, generating meaningful and actionable information as well as providing our police department training to ensure filters are accurately enabled at all levels. In addition, Winborne will provide data, analysis and context on a variety of other items included in the proposal. These data filters will be requested of the County and CLEMIS to be included, where available, in our transparency dashboard on an ongoing basis, eliminating the need to pay a consultant for ongoing annual updates of the dashboard. City staff would work with CLEMIS on the development of these filters, if City Council decides to move forward with the Winbourne proposal.

Staff also looked further into the qualifications of Winbourne to confirm their qualifications and ability to provide the scope of services. We offer the following information:

- Winbourne is a minority owned and operated business that has served more the 600 public safety organizations in the United States and 20 foreign countries over the past 22 years on similar projects.
- They have a 97% highly satisfied rating from their clients over the past 14 years
- Their project team is made up of highly skilled and experienced subject matter expert with diverse experience in law enforcement and police operations, training, data analysis, emergency communications, strategic planning and implementation.

• Members of their team have held leadership positions in a wide variety of federal, state, county and local public safety agencies and/or government organizations.

Based on the information provided above, City Council may want to consider the following options in its deliberations on this topic:

- 1. Do no more than the legal review already in process.
- 2. Authorize the City Manager to move forward utilizing Winbourne Consulting LLC with all or a combination of Phases I, II, and II.
- 3. Direct the City Manager to have staff draft a request for proposal (RFP) for these services that will be publicly advertised.

Recommendation

Although there are options for City Council to consider, staff recommends moving forward with Winbourne LLC for this professional service. Winbourne has the demonstrated experience and skills necessary for the scope of work being request. In addition, Winbourne came highly recommended by one of the City's well respected consultants, Plante Moran, as being highly knowledgeable and unbiased in such matters. Lastly, if the City did publicly advertised for these services, it's uncertain if there is a more qualified proponent than Winbourne.

PROCLAMATION Breast Cancer Awareness Month October 2022

- WHEREAS, since approximately 1 in 8 U.S. women (about 13%) will develop invasive breast cancer over the course of their lifetime, National Breast Cancer Awareness Month is dedicated to increasing public knowledge about the importance of early detection; and
- WHEREAS, breast cancer is the most common cancer in women in the U.S., except for skin cancer, and breast cancer death rates are higher than those for any other cancer except for lung cancer; and
- WHEREAS, in 2022, there will be an estimated 287,850 new cases of invasive breast cancer diagnosed in women, 2,710 cases diagnosed in men, and an additional 51,400 cases of cases of non-invasive (in situ) breast cancer diagnosed in women, with an estimated 43,250 women and 530 men dying from breast cancer this year alone; and
- WHEREAS,
 the overall five-year relative survival rate is 99% for localized disease, 85% for regional disease, and 27% for distant-stage disease, with overall mortality rates declining due to increased awareness, treatment advances, and earlier detection through mammography screening, which is the single most effective method of detecting breast changes that may be cancerous long before physical symptoms become apparent; and
- WHEREAS, there are over 3.8 million women living in the U.S. today with a history of breast cancer including women currently being treated and those who have finished undergoing treatment.

Subject: Approval to execute the 2023 Oakland County Auto Theft Prevention Act (ATPA) Subrecipient Agreement between the City of Farmington Hills and the Oakland County Sheriff's Office.

ADMINISTRATIVE SUMMARY

- The City's Police Department participates in the Oakland County Auto Theft Program (OCAT), a multijurisdictional task force operating under the direction of the Oakland County Sheriff's Office (OCSO).
- Oakland County has entered into a Grant agreement with the State of Michigan where it is eligible to receive reimbursement for ATPA related expenses, including partial reimbursement of salary, wages, and overtime.
- Oakland County intends to use Grant Funds to reimburse the City's Police Department up to 50% of the total, for qualifying ATPA-related costs including ATPA officers' salaries, fringe benefits, overtime, vehicle usage, cell phone, MAATI and IAATI dues, as described in the Grant agreement.
- To receive reimbursement, the City must execute the 2023 Oakland County Auto Theft Prevention Program Subrecipient Agreement with Oakland County.
- City Attorney Steve Joppich's staff has reviewed the agreement.

RECOMMENDATION

• IT IS RESOLVED THAT the City Council approve that the City be authorized to execute the Oakland County Auto Theft Program Subrecipient Agreement and any associated documents or agreements.

REPORT FROM THE CITY MANAGER TO CITY COUNCIL—September 19, 2022

SUBJECT: Award of Bid—Wheel Loader

ADMINISTRATIVE SUMMARY:

- The purchase of a wheel loader (front-end loader) was publicly advertised and competitively bid on the Michigan Inter-Governmental Trade Network (MITN) e-procurement system and opened on August 31, 2022. Notification was sent to seventy-two (72) vendors (including sixteen (16) vendors that hold the classification of minority owned, woman owned, veteran owned, disabled, disadvantaged or service disabled).
- Funding for this equipment purchase is provided in Capital Improvements Program-Equipment account. This piece of equipment replaces vehicle #259, a 2016 John Deere wheel loader.
- DPW staff evaluated all bids that were submitted for price, adherence/deviation to the bid specifications, warranty, and vendor experience.
- The recommended unit complies with the City's specifications and is within budget. Note the other unit did not meet all the specifications.
- The recommended vendor is providing a current production model with a five-year powertrain warranty and a full three-year manufacturer's warranty on parts and labor as specified.
- The lowest, most qualified bid was received by AIS Construction Equipment of New Hudson, Michigan. AIS has provided equipment repair service and sold equipment and parts to the City in the past, proving to be reliable and knowledgeable with the unique intricacies of this piece of equipment.

RECOMMENDATION:

IT IS RESOLVED that the City Council of Farmington Hills authorize the City Manager to issue a purchase order to AIS Construction Equipment of New Hudson, Michigan, in the amount of \$217,156, which reflects the trade-in of vehicle #259 for \$120,000 and paving equipment for \$29,000.

SUPPORT DOCUMENTATION:

The DPW currently has a six-year-old wheel loader which is critical to our daily and emergency operations. For most of its life, it remains at the DPW facility. It is used for loading salt and other road maintenance materials into the dump truck fleet, moving and stockpiling of road maintenance materials, and it is also used as a forklift for off-loading deliveries of pipe and equipment. Additionally, during emergency situations, it is used out on the City's roadways for tree/brush removal, snow removal, and debris cleanup.

Award of Bid—Wheel Loader Page 2

Since the wheel loader is so critical to DPW's daily operations, replacement before it experiences more frequent breakdowns and costly repairs is necessary.

The bid includes a manufacturer's five-year powertrain and three-year manufacturer's warranties on all parts and labor. Additionally, on-site operator training is included with the purchase.

SUBJECT: AWARD OF HOSPITALITY LINENS - RENTAL & CLEANING SERVICES FOR VARIOUS CITY BUILDINGS

ADMINISTRATIVE SUMMARY

- An invitation to bid (ITB) was advertised, distributed on the MITN e-procurement site, publicly opened, and read aloud on Wednesday, September 7, 2022 for Hospitality Linens Rental & Cleaning Service for various city owned buildings. Notification was sent to twenty-three (23) vendors (including three (3) vendors that hold the classification of minority owned, woman owned, veteran owned, disabled, disadvantaged or service disabled) with three (3) responding: Maurer's Textile Rental Services, Inc., Sohn Linen Services and Head to Heels Safety Supplies. (Head to Heels Safety Supplies ultimately rescinded their bid because of a bidding error.)
- The bid includes providing the aforementioned linen rental and services to the following locations: William Costick Activities Center, Farmington Hills Community Center (HAWK) and Longacre House.
- The services includes hospitality linens: bar towels, bid aprons, multiple sizes of linen tablecloths and linen napkins. This service will provide these items multiple times a month for various events in the city buildings. Staff from Department of Central Services and Special Services reviewed all responses and checked references and is recommending Sohn Linen Services for this service.
- The low bid was disqualified after references were checked.
- The bid provides pricing for one (1) year with the option to extend the pricing for three (3) additional one (1) year terms upon mutual consent between the City and the vendors. Sohn Linen Services will have a 5% increase beginning in year two (2).
- The hospitality linens rental and service will be funded out of the kitchen and food supply fund.
