REPORT TO THE CITY COUNCIL FROM THE CITY CLERK - MAY 8, 2023

SUBJECT: Consideration of request from Motorcity Jam JV, LLC For a NEW Class C Liquor License to be used at 37611 W. 12 Mile Road, Farmington Hills, MI

ADMINISTRATIVE SUMMARY:

- The City has received a request from Anthony Ansara, representing Motorcity Jam JV, LLC for a NEW Class C Liquor License for Daily Jam. This location is on the south side of 12 Mile Road just west of Halsted Road (former Panera Bread building).
- The City is issued Class C quota licenses based on population. Farmington Hills has been allocated 56 liquor licenses in total. Of those licenses, 52 have been issued, three have been placed under a moratorium by action of City Council through September 8, 2023, which leaves one available quota license to be issued at this time.
- Daily Jam will be a breakfast and lunch restaurant with dine in and carryout available, and the city application
 and menu are provided with this report. It is anticipated that construction would begin the first of April, 2023
 with a proposed completion date of July 1, 2023 per the application received.
- The applicant has provided their policy regarding the sale of alcoholic beverages, pursuant to Michigan Liquor Control Commission Rules, which is also included with this report.
- An agreement for return of the license to the City of Farmington Hills if the business ceases to operate has been submitted with their application.
- The application was routed to all applicable departments and there were no objections with regard to the issuance of a new Class C liquor license for this location with the understanding that the applicant will need to apply for necessary building permits to accomplish the renovations proposed and the facility will be required to comply with and maintain all applicable Code requirements and the City's standard C of O approval process.

RECOMMENDATION:

That the City Council hereby adopts the resolution for APPROVAL/DENIAL to the Michigan Liquor Control Commission for the request from Motorcity Jam JV, LLC. For a NEW Class C Liquor License to be used at 37611 W. 12 Mile Road, to be issued from the City's quota licenses available.

ADMINISTRATIVE SUMMARY

- Sealed bids were solicited, posted on the MITN e-procurement system, opened, and read aloud on April 25, 2023, for the removal and replacement of the roofs for Founders Park North and South Concessions, Pioneer Park Concessions, and Heritage Park North Shelter. Bid notification was sent to over two hundred fifteen (215) vendors (including fifty-eight (58) vendors that hold the classification of minority owned, woman owned, veteran owned, disabled, disadvantaged or service disabled) with five (5) responding. We received zero "No Bids."
- The bid includes removal and replacement of the existing roofing, replacing roof decking as needed, replacing fascia boards as needed, and flashing. A 15 year no leak guarantee for all locations was required as part of the specifications.

ADMINISTRATIVE UPDATE

- Sealed bids were solicited, posted on the MITN e-procurement system, opened and read aloud on September 15, 2022, for the purchase of a Ride-On Turf Sprayer for the Parks & Golf Division of the Department of Special Services. Bid notification was sent to ninety-three (93) vendors (including sixty-nine (69) vendors that hold the classification of minority owned, woman owned, veteran owned, disabled, disadvantaged or service disabled) with three (3) responding & and zero (0) "No-Bids".
- The bid was awarded to the Revels Turf & Tractor, Brighton, MI on October 10, 2023, CMR 9-22-95 in the amount of \$42,423.33.
- Due to the unforeseen challenges in obtaining the awarded equipment, the sprayer will not be available until Fall of 2024. However, there is a similar make and model currently available for immediate delivery from the same awarded vendor. The price of the Ride on Turf Sprayer in stock is \$47,423.33 which is \$4,789.75 more than the awarded bid in October 2022.
- Given the above information and the critical nature of this specialized piece of equipment, Special Services Parks & Golf Division is respectfully requesting City Council authorize the City Manager to forgo the need of additional bids on this piece of equipment and award the purchase of the Smithco 1200 Sprayer currently available to Revels Turf & Tractor, Brighton, MI in the amount of \$47423.33.

ADMINISTRATIVE SUMMARY

- Sealed bids were solicited, posted on the MITN e-procurement system, opened and read aloud on September 15, 2022, for the purchase of a Ride-On Turf Sprayer for the Parks & Golf Division of the Department of Special Services. Bid notification was sent to ninety-three (93) vendors (including sixty-nine (69) vendors that hold the classification of minority owned, woman owned, veteran owned, disabled, disadvantaged or service disabled) with three (3) responding & and zero (0) "No-Bids".
- The ride-on turf sprayer will be utilized to apply pesticides to the golf course grounds. With the new technologies we will be able to treat the turf with better accuracy and agitation of the product while reducing the overall pesticide use.

MINUTES CITY OF FARMINGTON HILLS FARMINGTON HILLS CITY COUNCIL CITY HALL - COMMUNITY ROOM APRIL 24, 2023 – 5:30PM

The study session meeting of the Farmington Hills City Council was called to order by Mayor Barnett at 5:35pm

PRESENTATION ON 2024 WATER AND SEWER RATES

Karen Mondora, Director of Public Services, stated that before City Council are the 2023/24 water and sewer rate recommendations. She introduced Raphael Chirolla, Drew Sandahl and Amy Ploof from WRC who were present to discuss the proposed rates.

Mr. Chirolla reviewed the basic rate calculation used to determine the rates. He reviewed the projected sewer and water sales for the city's system and noted that for FY 2024 they are estimating an average quarterly increase of \$22.93 in sewer rates and an average quarterly increase of \$14.86 in water rates per the average residential customer.

Director Mondora reviewed the major capital expenses for the water and sewer systems planned over the next 5 years.

Council inquired about minimum billing for those residents who are on a well and currently receive a flat rate water bill rather than a bill based on usage.

Director Mondora stated that staff discussed this issue and included in the resolution that will be coming to City Council in June for consideration will be the option for those residents to purchase a water meter so that their bill could be based upon usage rather than a flat rate. The cost for the water meter and for installation will be the responsibility of the homeowner. She cautioned that while it could reduce the costs for some residents, others may be surprised by their actual usage.

It was noted that there were 717 such properties in the city and discussion was held on potential assistant programs that residents may qualify for to assist them with their water bill or potentially the purchase and installation of the meter.

In response to Council, Mr. Chirolla stated that the proposed rates are for Farmington Hills only and do not include any costs or subsidies for other communities.

Discussion was held on potential state or federal funding to assist with infrastructure upgrades. Director Mondora explained the Farmington-Evergreen sanitary sewer system and how that works and explained that the city and or county is seeking funding where available.

Council inquired about the effectiveness of the Middlebelt Tunnel. Mr. Chirolla indicated that the Middlebelt Tunnel project is working effectively to reduce sanitary sewer overflows for which it was designed.

Council suggested educating the 717 customers on wells about their options for purchasing the meter. Director Mondora suggested that a letter could be included with the next bill.

DISCUSSION ON SHORT TERM RENTALS IN FARMINGTON HILLS

City Manager Mekjian stated that this issue was discussed with City Council at a previous study session and staff was asked to report back to Council on options for addressing the issues with illegal short term rentals of property.

Charmaine Kettler-Schmult, Director of Planning and Community Development discussed the tools being used to address these issues. She noted that short-term rentals are not a permitted use currently in residential areas and are only permitted in hotels or motels. Council will see a suggested amendment to the ordinance and definition of hotels/motels as another tool for the city to utilize as enforcement. She stated that some residents are not only renting out their homes, but pools, basketball hoops, parking areas, etc.

Information had been distributed to Council regarding the issues experienced over the past year and an example letter of how the city has addressed the concerns. She stated that in discussing this matter with the City Attorney's Office and 47th District Court, staff is suggesting that residents who receive a ticket for these violations will have to appear in person in court and will not be able to simply pay a fine. The issue was that a simple fine has not been enough to deter continued violations by residents.

City Attorney Joppich further clarified that municipal civil infractions can allow for injunctive relief and that is how the city and 47th District Court is proposing to handle future violations of this nature.

Director Kettler-Schmult and City Attorney Joppich explained the procedures that would be followed once a ticket was issued that included the courts flagging the ticket for a formal hearing and the city requesting injunctive relief. If found guilty by the court, the Judge would issue an order as such and if further violation continued the person could be found in contempt of court, which would be determined by a Judge in District Court. There is potential for jail time or if they failed to show at a hearing, a bench warrant may be issued.

Council inquired if the Police Department upon being called for a disturbance or other violation could shut down a party. Attorney Joppich responded that each call would continue to be handled on a case-by-case basis and it may not be shut down or even known that evening if violations for short term rentals are occurring but may be handled later through code enforcement.

City Manager Mekjian explained the need for more communication between departments for residences with known complaints and issues.

Council inquired if cars could be towed from Heritage Park if they are parked there after hours and if so, is there a sign to that effect. Staff confirmed there was a sign for no parking in Heritage Park after the park closes; however, they would check into the exact language and review strengthening that if needed to allow for towing of vehicles.

Director Kettler-Schmult pointed out that Council also received a proposed amendment to the ordinance for the definition of hotels/motels to provide staff another tool in dealing with these issues and this is where

this type of short-term rental is currently permitted. There is also the option of reviewing no parking signs on public streets in certain locations, but that is typically requested by the neighborhood.

Discussion was held on short-term rentals that included overnight or weekly rentals versus monthly or longer that would fall under the city's home rental inspection program.

Council requested staff to look into Meridian as there have been many complaints on social media from Novi residents that this Farmington Hills business has been causing a lot of noise for their area.

Council also expressed concern with the increase in issues at the area hotels and motels and the challenge to keep up with those incidents.

It was mentioned that the city would be addressing any issues on a complaint basis or addressing concerns already known by the city and that it has not been past practice for the city to investigate or search for these rentals in order to issue violations.

DISCUSSION ON LIQUOR LICENSE POLICY/PROCESS

City Clerk Smith explained that the city currently has one quota liquor license available and 3 quota licenses still under a moratorium. Recently, City Council amended their liquor license policy to view applications as they were received and further clarification is needed as the Clerk's Office has received three applications, two of which have completed the review process and are ready to come before Council for consideration and another that is in the process but could be ready before the next meeting as well. Clerk Smith stated that she is seeking direction on whether Council wants all applications through the review process to come before them at the same meeting or if they want one at a time as the applications were submitted and completed the review process.

Considerable discussion was held on whether the Council should lift the moratorium on the other 3 quota licenses, the master plan process and potential for redevelopment licenses or development licenses through a Corridor Improvement Authority (CIA) district.

Attorney Joppich cautioned that the process of establishing additional CIA districts involves other entities and their approval.

The majority of Council agreed that the moratorium on the 3 quota licenses should be lifted earlier than fall to allow other applicants to pursue the licenses. Some members of council requested more information on the potential for redevelopment and CIA licenses prior to lifting the moratorium and the opportunity to vet the businesses requesting a license because once that license is issued, it essentially belongs to that business owner and could be placed in escrow or sold to be used outside of the city. Once issued, it is very difficult for the city to get the license back.

Clerk Smith indicated that as applications are brought to Council some of that information being requested such as investment in the community and financial stability will be provided or could be answered by the applicant at that time.

The consensus of Council was to bring the one application for a quota liquor license that was submitted and through the review process first to the next City Council meeting of May 8, 2023. Receive more information from staff on the redevelopment and CIA licenses and master plan process and consider lifting the moratorium earlier than fall.

It was noted that if the last available quota license is issued at the May 8th meeting, the Clerk will notify the other two applicants but mention that Council is considering lifting the moratorium earlier than anticipated and once that is done, their applications may be submitted to City Council for consideration.

MOTION by Massey, support by Bruce, to approve the agenda as amended with the addition of Item #21 - Recommended adoption of a resolution authorizing the Special Services staff to submit an application to the Michigan Liquor Control Commission for a special one-day liquor license for the City's 50th Anniversary Celebration scheduled for July 6, 2023.

MOTION CARRIED 6-0.

INTRODUCTION OF STATE REPRESENTATIVE JASON HOSKINS

State Representative for the 18th District, Jason Hoskins introduced himself to City Council and reported on the various committees on which he serves.

City Council requested support from Representative Hoskins on the following:

- Protecting local control and, in particular, allowing short-term rentals in communities
- Unfunded mandates due to Proposal 2
- Smart zones or other designations and funding opportunities to support small businesses, including the proposed business incubator at the HAWK
- Funding for capital infrastructure needs

Representative Hoskins stated that his emphasis is on housing and short-term rentals can take away from housing in communities so he agrees that there should be local control as it doesn't make sense to have those types of rentals in all communities. Legislators are also currently working on funding as a whole for communities including a housing trust fund, Proposal 2 and road funding. The legislature has also considered additional funding for smart zones and is working with Lawrence Technological University regarding future area designations specifically for medical technology. Mr. Hoskins agreed that water infrastructure is important for the entire state but particularly for aging communities and he is working along with Representative Steckloff on funding these efforts.

PUBLIC OUESTIONS AND COMMENTS

Pat Hanson, resident, spoke in support of keeping the Costick Center to allow for the senior activities, particularly pickleball when courts are already full at both the Costick Center and HAWK and it is the fastest growing sport.

Anne Echols, Member of the Emergency Preparedness Commission, provided the Emergency Preparedness Tip of the Month

Thomas Hull, representing Farmington African American Parent Network, explained that his organization supplies Farmington area parents and students with resources such as tutoring sessions at Farmington High School every Saturday from 9am-11am and on April 29th following the tutoring session at the high school, they will be hosting a Career Technical Education seminar to expose students to various career paths. The organization is all volunteers and he invited City Council and others to volunteer their time to help tutor these students. Mr. Hull stated that the resources and events they host are not just for African Americans but any students who needs assistance.

Pam Gerald, resident, thanked the Farmington Hills and Southfield Police Chiefs for their collaboration and discussion the importance of drivers slowing down and obeying school bus signs. She requested Council to encourage Governor Whitmer's office to require schools in all counties in Michigan to require school bus cameras. While Governor Whitmer signed a bill to allow for the cameras and some districts have installed them, she did not require them.

PUBLIC HEARING

PUBLIC HEARING AND CONSIDERATION OF AMENDMENT TO PLANNED UNIT DEVELOPMENT PLAN 6, 1993 LOCATED AT 27604 MIDDLEBELT ROAD.

Erik Perdonik, City Planner, explained that this is an amendment to a current Planned Unit Development (PUD) to allow for a drive-thru restaurant at the southerly outbuilding. He stated that the existing PUD agreement does not allow for drive-thru units.

Jill Bahm, Giffels Webster Planning Consultant, explained what a PUD is and the purpose. She stated that the Planning Commission approved this amendment to the PUD plan at their March meeting and site plan review will be required by the Planning Commission as part of the process. In exchange for the PUD amendment, the Planning Commission requested sidewalk and crosswalks and changes to parking and traffic circulation on site and also suggested pedestrian improvement on the site. Consultant Bahm noted that an updated PUD agreement will be required.

Masroor Ahmed, applicant, explained that he plans to open a coffee shop at this location and the majority of those types of businesses include a drive-thru. He stated that he had to close his coffee shop located at 9 Mile and Middlebelt as they had no drive-thru at that location and could not sustain the business. He added that this building was originally planned for a bank with drive-thru service so he is requesting to modify the plan for his own business. Mr. Ahmed stated that he will provide the crosswalk improvements as requested by the Planning Commission and the benefit to the community would be creating 30+additional jobs. They are also a Michigan based company and this will be the first one in Farmington Hills.

Mayor Barnett opened the public hearing.

Pam Gerald, resident, stated that she heard during the presentation that youth and residents would be employed and questioned how the city can ensure that this happens. She also inquired the distance from the frontage on Middlebelt to the existing drive-thru traffic.

Steve Joppich, City Attorney, explained that a PUD agreement is required but typically includes conditions tied to the land use or zoning.

Mayor Barnett added that the request is a land use amendment and the city would not typically get into managing a company's work force. She stated that the building in question is an existing building and they are not seeking any changes to setbacks.

Thomas Hull, Skye Drive, expressed concern with traffic in that area and questioned whether that was the best location for a drive-thru business.

Mayor Barnett acknowledged correspondence from the following who were opposed to the proposed PUD Plan amendment:

- Brenda Chen, Representing Farmington Hills Kumon Math and Reading Center, 27622
 Middlebelt Rd
- Yizhou Cao, Timbercrest resident.

There being no further comments, Mayor Barnett closed the public hearing.

The following comments were expressed by City Council members:

- Concern with a drive-thru at this location due to traffic and safety of children visiting other businesses in that complex
- Allowing for a drive-thru for this type of business is important so that the business can thrive
- Suggestion to request an outdoor seating area and upgrading the drainage ditch
- Suggestion to restrict the business to a coffee shop in order to eliminate the potential of a fast-food restaurant going into that location at a later date

Staff indicated that the drainage and traffic circulation would be part of the site plan review and traffic review by the Engineering Division. Attorney Joppich suggested that any specific conditions are made part of the motion to be included as part of the PUD agreement that will come back to City Council for approval.

MOTION by Bruce, support by Knol, that the City Council of Farmington Hills hereby approves the Amendment to Planned Unit Development Plan 6, 1993, dated January 17, 2023, subject to the following conditions:

- 1) Any conditions and requirements set forth in the Planning Commission's March 16, 2023 motion recommending approval of the Amendment to the PUD Plan to City Council shall be complied with or addressed to the satisfaction of the Planning and Community Development Department;
- 2) Any conditions and requirements stated in Giffels Webster's review shall be complied with or addressed to the satisfaction of the Planning and Community Development Department;
- 3) Limiting the restaurant to a coffee shop with no fryers;

Considerable discussion was held on the traffic circulation on site and some members of Council were not comfortable not having that information and a traffic study up front before they made their decision on whether to allow the drive-thru. Staff reiterated that the traffic study and circulation on site would be part of the site plan approval process. Consultant Bahm stated that the only issue before Council this evening is with regard to land use and allowing for the drive-thru a there is no detailed site plan at this point.

Attorney Joppich pointed out that the motion did not include the suggested language authorizing the City Attorney to prepare the PUD amended agreement with stipulations and authorizing the deviations to the zoning ordinance.

Further discussion was held by City Council on the traffic circulation, including outdoor seating area for the complex and a suggestion was made to close the southern entrance on Middlebelt to no left turns.

MOTION by Bruce, support by Knol, to amend the motion to include the following language:

IT IS FURTHER RESOLVED, that the City Council directs the City Attorney to prepare the appropriate PUD agreement stipulating the final PUD approval conditions and authorizing the identified zoning deviations for City Council consideration and final approval.

MOTION by Massey, support by Boleware, to postpone consideration of PUD Plan 6, 1993 to the next meeting in May to allow for the submission of a basic site plan for the proponent to show how they would incorporate the suggested changes.

MOTION FAILED 3-3 (Barnett, Bruce and Knol opposed)

Mayor Barnett called for a vote on the previous amendment to the motion made by Mayor Pro-Tem Bruce and supported by Councilmember Knol to include language authorizing the City Attorney to prepare the PUD amended agreement with stipulations and authorizing the deviations to the zoning ordinance.

MOTION FAILED 3-3 (Boleware, Massey and Newlin opposed)

Further discussion was held on having a traffic study, circulation of traffic on site and parking and pedestrian traffic with other businesses on site.

The proponent indicated that the amendment is already subject to a traffic study, which he is already paying \$12,000 to have completed.

Mayor Pro-Tem Bruce withdrew his motion on the table as it was incomplete at this time since the amendment failed.

MOTION by Bruce, support by Knol, that the City Council of Farmington Hills hereby approves the Amendment to Planned Unit Development Plan 6, 1993, dated January 17, 2023, subject to the following conditions:

- 1) Any conditions and requirements set forth in the Planning Commission's March 16, 2023 motion recommending approval of the Amendment to the PUD Plan to City Council shall be complied with or addressed to the satisfaction of the Planning and Community Development Department;
- 2) Any conditions and requirements stated in Giffels Webster's review shall be complied with or addressed to the satisfaction of the Planning and Community Development Department;
- 3) Limiting the restaurant to a coffee shop with no fryers;

IT IS FURTHER RESOLVED, that the City Council directs the City Attorney to prepare the appropriate PUD agreement stipulating the final PUD approval conditions and authorizing the identified zoning deviations for City Council consideration and final approval.

MOTION by Bruce, support by Knol, to amend the motion to include the following condition:

• Encouraging the traffic engineers to develop a traffic circulation plan that minimizes the impact on existing neighboring businesses.

Mayor Barnett called for a vote on the amendment only.

PUBLIC HEARING AND CONSIDERATION OF APPROVAL OF THE COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT BLOCK GRANT (CDBG) 2023/2024 PROJECTED USE OF FUNDS. CMR 4-23-52

Tracey Emmanuel, Community Development Coordinator, reviewed the projected use of Community Development Block Grant funds with Council.

Mayor Barnett opened the public hearing.

Pam Gerald, resident, inquired about the difference in funding provided to the special service groups such as CARES and Haven and what the administrative costs include.

Mayor Barnett responded that the funding provided is based upon the requests received by those organizations.

There being no further comments, Mayor Barnett closed the public hearing.

Charmaine Kettler-Schmult, Director of Planning and Community Development, confirmed that written requests for funding are received directly from the organizations for consideration and that is funded from the administrative costs. She added that HUD caps the administrative costs at 15% and they are also used for legal ads, recording of documents and salary for the housing rehabilitation specialist.

MOTION by Massey, support by Knol, that the City Council of Farmington Hills hereby approves the Third Annual Action Plan and PY2023-2024 Community Development Block Grant funds be allocated as follows:

IT IS FURTHER RESOLVED, that the City Council approves the Community Development Block Grant Program Year 2023/2024 budget to include: 1) \$349,332 for Housing Rehabilitation, 2) \$42,500 for Public Service Organizations and 3) \$60,000 for program administration. Any

change in funding amount will be reflected in an adjustment to the Housing Rehabilitation activity; and

IT IS FURTHER RESOLVED, that the City Council authorizes the City Manager to prepare and submit an application for Community Development Block Grant funds to the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) within sixty days of the date allocations are announced but no later than August 15, 2023.

MOTION CARRIED 6-0.
