




2021 was an amazing year, during which the men and women of the Farmington Hills Police Department continued to serve this community and its citizens with integrity and professionalism. As our nation began to return to pre-pandemic activities, our agency continued to pursue Department-wide improvements. A few of these improvements include our Cadet Program, Autism Sensory Response Program, Families Against Narcotics-Comeback Quick Response Team, Faith & Blue week, and our Transparency Dashboard. These programs serve as additional examples of our commitment to serving our citizens. 2021 marked two notable accomplishments: our department attaining the Michigan Association of Chiefs of Police (MACP) reaccreditation and renewal of our public safety millage. The Farmington Hills Police Department became the 8th and largest agency in Michigan to achieve MACP re-accreditation status, which approximately six percent of Michigan Police agencies have obtained. More importantly, our citizens overwhelmingly supported renewal of our public safety millage, garnering over 75% of voter support. Farmington Hills is routinely recognized as one of the safest areas in our state. Property and violent crime rates increased only slightly in 2021, but our community saw below national averages in these crime areas. Violent crime marginally increased 0.18%, compared to a more substantial increase nationally. For 2022, we plan to further elevate our agency's efficiency and effectiveness, in decreasing crime, enhanced police services and increase the safety of our community. First, is an aggressive and diverse recruitment strategy to supplement our Cadet Program, to reach full authorized staffing and prepare our agency for future staffing issues. Second, a first in the State, Michigan Economic Development Corporation grant funded advanced training program for all sworn and dispatch personnel, titled "Behavioral Health Emergency Partnership", which will further enhance our response protocols, safety procedures and services provided to individuals experiencing mental health crisis in our community. Third, a department-wide Diversity, Equity and Inclusion training course to supplement our annual Fair and Impartial Policing Program. Lastly, advancements in our crime prevention and investigative technologies, that include Text to 9-1-1 services, expansion of our digital forensics capabilities and vehicle and license plate identification system. This technology will assist with investigative and crime prevention strategies, improve emergency response and assist in identifying vehicles involved in felony and violent crimes, crash investigations and missing persons. The women and men of the Farmington Hills Police Department are honored to serve and protect this community and take great pride in delivering superior police services without prejudice and partiality in as in years prior. It was my privilege to serve with these officers and supervisors and lead this agency for my second year as Chief. For 2022, we are focused on another year of building on our record of accomplishments, strengthening community partnerships and improving our service to our community.


Staff and Command Graduation—Lieutenant Mark Rash
