PUBLIC HEARING

PUBLIC HEARING AND CONSIDERATION OF ADOPTION OF A RESOLUTION TO APPROVE THE APPLICATION FOR AN INDUSTRIAL FACILITIES EXEMPTION CERTIFICATE FROM NISSAN TECHNICAL CENTER NORTH AMERICA FOR A PERIOD OF 6 YEARS, UPON COMPLETION OF CONSTRUCTION, FOR 50% REAL PROPERTY; AND AUTHORIZATION OF ABATEMENT AGREEMENT, CMR 4-19-44

Councilmember Rich stated that she serves on the Board for the Oakland County Intermediate School District and confirmed with the City Attorney that this could be a conflict of interest so she will abstain from discussion and voting on this matter.

Samantha Seimer, Economic Development Director, briefly described the request for a 50% real property tax abatement for Nissan who has presented their plans for an expansion project to Council at their study session meeting of April 8, 2019. This investment would add 25 new jobs and retain 60 existing jobs within the city and the proposed project is in compliance the city's tax abatement policy.

Darryl Stolarczyk, representing Nissan, explained that Nissan has been in Farmington Hills since 1991 and they serve as research and development for Nissan in the Americas region and to date have invested over \$270 million in the facility that is operated by over 1200 employees. He mentioned how they have invested in the community and expressed their commitment to continue to look for opportunities to support the community. Mr. Stolarczyk explained that the new crash test facility is estimated to cost over \$40 million and will add an estimated 25 incremental jobs while supporting the existing 1200+ jobs. It will enhance their capability for research and development and ensure that they will remain Nissan's R & D hub for the Americas region going forward as well as protect and expand the high-paying, professional jobs.

Mayor Massey opened the public hearing. There being no comments, he closed the public hearing.

RESOLUTION APPROVING AN APPLICATION FOR AN INDUSTRIAL FACILITIES EXEMPTION CERTIFICATE RESOLUTION NO. R-74-19

At a regular meeting of the City Council of the City of Farmington Hills, Oakland County, Michigan, held at City Hall, 31555 Eleven Mile Road, Farmington Hills, Michigan on the 22nd day of April, 2019 at 7:30pm, with those present and absent as follows:

The following resolution was offered by <u>Councilmember Lerner</u> and supported by <u>Councilmember Bruce</u>.

WHEREAS, pursuant to PA 198 of 1974, as amended, after a duly noticed public hearing held on May 13, 2002 this City Council by Resolution established an Industrial Development District at 39001 Sunrise Drive, Farmington Hills, Michigan; and

WHEREAS, Nissan Technical Center North America has filed an application for an Industrial Facilities Exemption Certificate with respect to a new facility to be acquired and installed within the Industrial Development District at 39001 Sunrise Drive, Farmington Hills, Michigan; and

WHEREAS, before acting on said application, the City of Farmington Hills held a hearing on April 22, 2019 at City Hall, 31555 Eleven Mile Road, Farmington Hills, Michigan at 7:30pm, at which hearing the applicant, the Assessor and a representative for the affected taxing units were given written notice and were afforded an opportunity to be heard on said application; and

WHEREAS, construction of the facility had not begun earlier than six (6) months before April 22, 2019, the date of acceptance of the application of the Industrial Facilities Exemption Certificate; and

WHEREAS, completion of the facility is calculated to and will, at the time of issuance of the certificate, have the reasonable likelihood to retain, create or prevent the loss of employment in the City of Farmington Hills; and

WHEREAS, the aggregate SEV of real and personal property exempt from ad valorem taxes within the City of Farmington Hills, after granting this certificate, will not exceed 5% of an amount equal to the sum of the SEV of the unit, plus the SEV of personal and real property thus exempted.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, by the City Council of the City of Farmington Hills, Oakland County, Michigan, that:

- 1. The City Council of the City of Farmington Hills finds and determines that the granting of the Industrial Facilities Exemption Certificate considered together with the aggregate amount of the certificates previously granted and currently in force under PA 198 of 1974, as amended and PA 225 of 1978, as amended shall not have the effect of substantially impeding the operation of the City of Farmington Hills, or impairing the financial soundness of a taxing unit which levies ad valorem taxes in the City of Farmington Hills.
- 2. The application from Nissan Technical Center North America for an Industrial Facilities Exemption Certificate, with respect to a new facility on the following described parcel of real property situated within the Industrial Development District, to wit: Parcel ID #22-23-18-201-002, Farmington Hills, Michigan, is hereby approved.
- 3. The Industrial Facilities Exemption Certificate, when issued, shall be and remain in force for a period of six (6) years, for 50% of the real property to be acquired and proposed to be exempt in the Application, subject to the execution of the abatement agreement.
- 4. That the City Council of the City of Farmington Hills hereby authorizes the City Manager and City Clerk to execute the required Abatement Agreement.

RESOLUTION DECLARED ADOPTED.

PUBLIC HEARING AND CONSIDERATION OF APPROVAL OF THE INTRODUCTION OF AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND THE CITY OF FARMINGTON HILLS CODE OF ORDINANCES, CHAPTER 34, "ZONING," TO PROHIBIT MARIHUANA ESTABLISHMENTS WITHIN THE BOUNDARIES OF THE CITY OF FARMINGTON HILLS.

Ed Gardiner, Director of Planning and Community Development, explained that this ordinance came from a recent Michigan referendum that decriminalized the recreational use of marihuana where the State gave communities the option to either opt in or to opt out of allowing marihuana establishments. The proposed ordinance provides for opting out at this time and includes a definition of marihuana establishments and then prohibits these establishments within Farmington Hills. The Planning Commission held a public hearing on the proposed ordinance on March 21, 2019 and recommends approval of the ordinance. A public hearing is required prior to any action of Council. Mr. Gardiner clarified that this ordinance would amend the Zoning Chapter of the City Code and the following proposed ordinance on the agenda would amend the City Code.

Mayor Massey explained that the State has yet to establish their rules and regulations and if the City opts out at this time, the Council could revisit the matter and opt in at any time. Mr. Gardiner confirmed this statement and the fact that the ordinance would not infringe upon any persons right to use recreational marihuana under the law.

Mayor Massey opened the public hearing.

Jerry Griffin, President of G&G Public Affairs Consulting, indicated that his company consults for PinCanna, a medically-based marihuana company and requested that the city reconsider allowing medical establishments within the city. He offered to host an educational session for the public if provided the opportunity.

There being no further comments, Mayor Massey closed the public hearing.

Councilmember Steckloff expressed concern with having to wait on state regulations when voters voted in favor of recreational marihuana and the only reason she will be voting against the ordinance is to honor the wishes of the residents.

MOTION by Knol, support by Bridges, that the City Council of Farmington Hills hereby approves the INTRODUCTION of an ordinance to amend the City of Farmington Hills Code of Ordinances, Chapter 34, "Zoning," Article 2, "Definitions," Section 2.2, "Definitions," to add a new definition of the term "Marihuana Establishments," and to amend Article 4, "Use Standards," to retitle and amend Section 4.57, "Medical Marihuana Caregiving," to prohibit Marihuana Establishments within the boundaries of the City of Farmington Hills pursuant to Michigan Regulation and Taxation of Marihuana Act, Initiated Law 1 of 2018, MCL 333.27951, ET SEQ.

Councilmember Rich suggested a friendly amendment to include language that City Council intends to place this matter on a future agenda for further consideration within 90 days after the administrative rules required by the State of Michigan have been adopted.

Councilmember Knol did not agree with the suggested amendment and including a time line. She would prefer to have Council revisit the situation when that Council determines the time is right and once they know the implications of the State regulations.

The majority of Council supported opting out at this time to wait on the State regulations. Councilmember Steckloff felt it was important to include a time line for bringing the issue back for further consideration.

MOTION by Rich, support by Steckloff, to amend the motion to include language that City Council intends to place this matter on a future agenda for further consideration within 90 days after the administrative rules required by the State of Michigan have been adopted similar to the language included by the City of Farmington.

MOTION to amend the original motion failed 3-4 (Bridges, Bruce, Knol and Lerner opposed)

PUBLIC HEARING AND CONSIDERATION OF APPROVAL OF THE INTRODUCTION OF AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND THE CITY OF FARMINGTON HILLS CODE OF ORDINANCES, CHAPTER 18, TO PROHIBIT MARIHUANA ESTABLISHMENTS WITHIN THE BOUNDARIES OF THE CITY OF FARMINGTON HILLS AND TO PROVIDE PENALTIES FOR VIOLATION OF THIS ORDINANCE.

Director Gardiner explained that this is the companion ordinance amendment to the previous Zoning Ordinance amendment introduced by Council. This ordinance would amend Chapter 18 of the City Code to prohibit marihuana establishments within the city and provide for penalties for violation of the ordinance.

Mayor Massey opened the public hearing. There being no comments, Mayor Massey closed the public hearing.

MOTION by Bruce, support by Lerner, that the City Council of Farmington Hills hereby approves the INTRODUCTION of an ordinance to amend the City of Farmington Hills Code of Ordinances, Chapter 18 "Offenses," Article I, "In General" to add a new Section 18-9, "Marihuana Establishments Prohibited, "to prohibit Marihuana Establishments within the boundaries of the City of Farmington Hills pursuant to Michigan Regulation and Taxation of Marihuana Act, Initiated Law 1 of 2018, MCL 333.27951, ET SEQ; and to provide penalties for violation of this ordinance.

Discussion continued on bringing the issue back to City Council for further consideration once State regulations are in place. Councilmembers Steckloff and Rich felt that language should be included in the ordinances to ensure that the issue would be brought back before Council at a future date.

NEW BUSINESS

TRANSMITTAL AND ACCEPTANCE OF THE CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS PLAN (CIP) FOR FISCAL YEARS 2019/2020 – 2024/2025.

Mark Stec, City Planner, explained that the Capital Improvements Plan (CIP) is a planning document and a tool for Council to use during their budget process. Projects included total \$25,000 or more or a series of smaller projects that culminate to a larger project totaling \$25,000 or more. The purpose of the CIP is to prioritize the capital spending in a matter that would serve the greatest needs of the city. He explained the process used to develop the CIP and stated that the Planning Commission held a public hearing on March 21, 2019 and adopted the plan that is being transmitted to City Council this evening. Mr. Stec briefly reviewed the projects included in the plan.

Karen Mondora, Director of Public Services, explained that the city is required to mitigate sources of pollution to rivers, lakes and streams and have a regulatory mechanism in place to address illegal dumping and discharges to the city's storm water system. The recommended ordinance would establish legal authority and provide for clear enforcement and compliant language in the event of a violation and satisfy the State requirements.

MOTION by Rich, support by Steckloff, that the City Council of Farmington Hills hereby approves the INTRODUCTION of an ordinance to amend the Farmington Hills Code of Ordinances to amend Chapter 33, "Water and Sewer," to add Article IX "Stormwater Management," Division 1 "Illicit Discharge" which regulates illicit discharge in the City.

WHEREAS a recent inspection of the US-16 Drain, conducted via closed circuit television, revealed the need for maintenance, rehabilitation and repair in several segments of the drain beneath Shiawassee Road in the City of Farmington; and

WHEREAS necessary maintenance, rehabilitation and repair include grouting, pre-cleaning, cured-in-place pipe lining, lateral service trimming and reinstatement; and

WHEREAS the cost of the repairs is estimated to be \$213,307; and
