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Police Department

Don't make it easy for criminals during the warm weather months.

Criminals love it when garage doors are left open or parked cars have the windows down. They love it when no one is home and a screen can be easily pushed in through an open window. But what a criminal really loves is an empty house with an unlocked door - burglars found unlocked doors at 62 Farmington Hills homes last year.

Residents who practice crime prevention and act as eyes and ears to report suspicious events are the key ingredients to keeping the community safe. Serious crime in Farmington Hills decreased 6.2% last year and 21% during the past three years. Last year, 15 of the 20 most serious crime categories decreased or stayed the same. In 2011, serious Group A Crime was the lowest number recorded in the past 17 years. Farmington Hills earned recognition as Michigan's third safest city with a population of more than 75,000 people. (According to the 2010 census, the population of Farmington Hills is 79,740.)

Help eliminate crime this summer. Don't leave bicycles, tools, golf clubs, and other valuables unattended. Keep garage doors shut and home and car doors locked. Report suspicious events by calling the Police Department at 248-871-2700 and help us take another bite out of crime in 2012.

Fire Department - Tornado Safety - Planning Ahead is Vital!

Spring is a great time to brush up on your knowledge of tornadoes and severe weather and know what to do if a warning is issued.

Know the difference between a **tornado watch** and a **tornado warning**:

- A tornado watch is issued to alert people that weather conditions indicate that a tornado could develop in your area.
- A tornado warning is issued when a tornado has actually been sighted or is indicated by radar.

A funnel cloud is a column of violently rotating winds extending down from a thunderstorm-like cloud that does not touch the ground.

Michigan averages about 16 tornadoes per year, and since 1950 tornadoes have caused 239 deaths. Most tornadoes occur in April, May, June, and July most often between the hours of 3-7pm. They travel about five miles and are grounded for about 10 minutes. In extreme cases, they have been known to travel in excess of 100 miles. A typical tornado sustains winds between 71 and 125 miles per hour.

Clues a tornado may be forming — Watch for dark, often greenish skies. Look for what appears to be a dark wall cloud. Just before a tornado forms, there is a downpour of large hail. Also, listen for a loud roar, often referred to as the sound of a freight train. Remember, a tornado can strike anytime, anyplace, and more than once.

Where to take shelter — Head for the designated shelter area or a central area on the lowest level of your home or business. A basement offers the greatest safety. Seek shelter under sturdy furniture if possible. In homes without basements, take cover in the center part of your house, on the lowest floor in a small room such as a closet or bathroom. Stay away from all windows.

Mobile homes — Leave this home immediately and take shelter in a prearranged substantial shelter area. If there is no shelter nearby, leave your trailer and lie flat in a ditch or ravine. Do not seek shelter under your mobile home.

While driving — Get out of your vehicle and take shelter in a nearby ditch or ravine. Do not continue driving and do not take shelter under your vehicle once you've stopped.

At work or school — Follow advanced plans to move to interior hallways or small rooms on the lowest floors of the building. Avoid areas with glass and wide, free-span roofs.

Open country — Lie in a gully, ditch or low spot in the ground and hold onto something on the ground if possible. Do not seek shelter in a damaged building as it may collapse. Every tornado season, take time with your family to review your primary shelter area. Practice this by having everyone in the family go there in response to a tornado threat.

The Farmington/Farmington Hills Emergency Preparedness Commission (EPC) urges residents and businesses to have a 72-hour disaster "Go Kit" which should contain items such as: Flashlights • Extra batteries • Battery operated radio (AM 1650 for updates) • First aid kit • Can opener • Canned food • Bottled water • Extra clothing

After a tornado — Turn on the radio or television for the latest emergency information. Stay out of damaged buildings. Return home only if authorities say it's safe. Use the telephone only for emergency calls. Leave a building if you smell gas or chemical fumes. Clean up all spills involving medicines, bleaches, gasoline or other flammable liquids. Document the damage. Take pictures of damage to the house and its contents for insurance purposes. Watch out for debris, especially broken glass, and downed power lines and gas line breaks. Cooperate with local officials.

It's not a matter of if a disaster happens; it's a matter of when. Being prepared can greatly reduce the danger and distress you and your family may face. Go to www.fhready.com for more info.

Clerk's Office

Are you registered to vote? Don't wait until Election Day to find out — call the Clerk's Office at 248-871-2410. Election Law states that you must be registered to vote 30 days prior to Election Day in order to be eligible to cast a ballot.

Registered Voter Requirements: Citizen of the United States • Resident of the State of Michigan and will be at least a 30-day resident of your city or township by Election Day • At least 18 years of age by Election Day.

If you move to a new community, you must re-register under your new address in order to vote. You may register at the City Clerk's Office, County Office — Elections Division or any Secretary of State's Office. Forms are also available online.

Note: If you are under 60 years of age and register to vote by mail rather than at one of the offices listed, you are not eligible to vote by absentee ballot for your first Election and must vote in person at the polls. This is important information for students attending college outside their jurisdiction or out of state who need to vote by absentee ballot.

Absentee Voter Ballot Requirements: 60 years of age or older • Physically unable to attend the polls without assistance of another • Appointed as a precinct worker in a precinct other than your own • Expect to be absent from the community in which you are registered on Election Day • Cannot attend the polls because of the tenets of your religion • Cannot attend the polls because you are confined to jail awaiting arraignment or trial.

Michigan Election Law does not permit a ballot to be issued to anyone other than the person named on the application. Therefore, a ballot cannot be given to anyone for delivery to another, including husband/wife, member of the same family, etc.

Absentee Voter Ballot Applications: If you are on the City Clerk's permanent absentee voter ballot list, you will automatically receive a dual absentee voter ballot application by the first week of June 2012. This application will be used for both the August 7 election and the November 6 election. If you would like to be placed on the permanent list, e-mail permlist@fhgov.com or call 248-871-2410. Absentee voter

ballot applications will be available to all residents on the City website, www.fhgov.com, as of June 1, 2012.

Understanding Your August Primary Ballot: There are three sections on the ballot — Partisan Section, Nonpartisan Section, and Proposal Section. Within the Partisan Section there are two party sections on the ballot — Republican Party and Democratic Party. Select the party section of your choice. You may vote in one party section only, you cannot "split your ticket." If you vote in more than one party section, the partisan portion of your ballot will be rejected. Remember to vote for your choices in the Non-Partisan and Proposal sections of your ballot.

Election Inspectors Needed: Here's your chance to serve your community and earn extra money at the same time! If you, or someone you know, may be interested in working on Election Day, please call Diane Behrend in the City Clerk's Office at 248-871-2413 for an application. Training is provided. You must be a registered voter of Oakland County to work as an election inspector in Farmington Hills.

The City's website, www.fhgov.com, has detailed election information, precinct maps, and more.

Door-to-Door Soliciting/Peddling: Soliciting is defined as door-to-door requests for contributions/services for charitable, religious or political organizations. Each person or group must be registered with the City and each person soliciting must have appropriate paperwork with them at all times. Peddling is defined as door-to-door requests/sales for profit. Each person must be licensed with the City and have a license that includes photo ID on their person at all times.

Soliciting/peddling may occur only from 10am-8pm or sunset, whichever is earlier. Solicitors/peddlers are not permitted to solicit on property signed "No Soliciting or No Peddling." State Law dictates that soliciting/peddling cannot be prohibited in Farmington Hills, but licensed parties must adhere to City ordinance requirements.


Historic District Commission

The Historic District Commission (HDC) has worked to protect and preserve the architectural and cultural heritage of Farmington Hills since 1981. The HDC currently has 73 buildings and three cemeteries designated as historic districts; 28 of the local historic districts are registered with the State Historic Preservation Office and two others, The Royal Aldrich House and The Orville Bostford House, are listed on the National Register of Historic Places.

At the 2011 Beautification Awards Ceremony, the HDC presented Preservationist Awards to the owners of the Drake House and the Eli Stodgell House in recognition of their exemplary dedication to the preservation of their historic homes and properties. The HDC is now on the lookout for historic homes to honor at the 2012 awards ceremony.

The HDC holds regular meetings at 7:30pm on the second Wednesday of each month at City Hall, the Longacre House or the Spicer House.

City Offers Zero Interest Home Repair Loans to Qualified Homeowners

The City offers help to qualified homeowners who need to repair or improve their houses. Loans may be used for any repair that brings the home up to code. Eligible repairs include roofs, windows, furnaces, hot water tanks or insulation.

Funding for this program is provided by the U.S. Housing and Urban Development Office through the Community Development Block Grant. To qualify for the loan, applicants must have owned and occupied a home in Farmington Hills for at least one year. The family must also meet income guidelines set by the Federal government. The updated income guidelines go into effect June 1, 2012. Income guidelines, applications, and details of the program are available at www.fhgov.com. Zoning Division

Help Keep our City a Great Place to Live!

- Property owners are responsible for cutting grass, weeds, and noxious growth as often as necessary before it reaches eight inches in height.
- Outdoor storage of improperly licensed vehicles is prohibited.
- Pet owners must keep all outdoor areas free of animal waste.
- Trash containers are required to be watertight with handles and tight fitting lids. Trash must be put at the curb no earlier than 6 p.m. on the day before pickup. Empty trash containers must be removed from the curb within 12 hours after pickup.
- Trash and rubbish must be removed from the premises to prevent health and safety hazards.
- Shrubbery, trees or other vegetation cannot block a driver's view at intersections.
- Compost piles are regulated by size, location, and composition. No readily apparent odors may emanate to adjacent properties.
- No garage sale signs may be placed on poles or located on public property.
- Three inch high (or larger) property identification numbers must be posted on your house.

Building Division

Spring Maintenance Tips

- Even if home renovations aren't in your immediate future, routine maintenance will help your home function properly so that you can make the most out of your investment.
- Clean accumulated dust and dirt before it harms finishes on blinds, cabinets, countertops, floors, sinks, tubs, toilets, walls, tiles, and other items. Be sure to use a cleaning product that doesn't scratch or damage the finish.
- Change the filter on your heating and air conditioning system. A clean filter will help the system run more efficiently and remove more dirt and dust from the air.
- Clear out gutters and downspouts before they get clogged with leaves or other debris.
- The exterior of your house is built to withstand exposure to the elements, but regular cleanings will improve the appearance and prolong the life of siding and other exterior products.

If you do home improvement projects yourself, you are responsible for obtaining the required building permits. Not all home improvement projects require permits, but many do. A permit ensures minimum safety standards and allows code officials to protect the public by reducing the potential hazards of unsafe construction. Property insurers may not cover work done without permits and inspections, so the value of the property could be affected and problems may arise when the property is sold.

Summer property tax bills are mailed around July 1 and may be paid without penalty through August 31 • Tax bills are mailed to the address of record and not forwarded by the post office • Changes of mailing address should be filed with the Assessor's Office • By law, failure to receive a property tax bill does not waive the bill or any charges for late payment • Every property should receive a bill, even if the bill is to be paid via an escrow account • If you have questions about your taxes, call 248-871-2480.

Public Services Department

Voluntary Water Use Restrictions

The City is strongly encouraging all property owners with automated sprinkler systems to adhere to Voluntary Water Use Restrictions in an effort to control future water rate increases. Compliance with the new Voluntary Water Use Restrictions will result in less water usage during peak times and help hold down costs by increasing the efficiency of the water system.

Under the voluntary demand management system, water users are asked to:

- Water residential and commercial lawns/landscaping and subdivision common areas between the hours of midnight and 6am. Experts recommend that lawns be watered closer to the morning hours so the lawn will have moisture during the heat of the day. Restrictions are for automatic sprinkler systems, not hoses or sprinklers connected to hoses. Please adjust automatic sprinkler timers so that irrigation is completed by 6am.
- Water lawns and landscaping for properties with even-numbered addresses on Monday, Wednesday, Friday, and Sunday.
- Water lawns and landscaping for properties with odd-numbered addresses on Tuesday, Thursday, Saturday, and Sunday.

The City complies with these regulations and waters public areas in accordance with these restrictions. The Farmington Hills Golf Course and Founders Sports Park, however, are exempt from following these guidelines because they irrigate using water from drainage ponds that are not part of the City's water system.

Farmington Hills is a customer of the Detroit Water and Sewerage Department (DWSD), which determines rates to suburban communities based on various significant factors that include maximum day demand and peak hour demand. By shifting usage to non-peak hours and reducing spikes in the daily demand, water cost increases can be reduced.

Water System Improvements

The City is proposing water system improvements that will include the construction of a three million gallon elevated water storage tank. These improvements will minimize future water rate increases, improve system pressure distribution, increase fire flow capacity, and provide system pressure during power outages. The water storage tank will be located at the Division of Public Works on Halsted Road, just south of Twelve Mile. The project will include the design and construction of the water storage tank and the installation of new transmission water mains and pressure reducing valves. Construction of the foundation will begin this fall and the water tower is scheduled to be completed and in service by June 2014.

Fertilizer Education - Tips to maintain a more sustainable lawn:

- Mulch nitrogen-rich grass clippings when mowing to reduce fertilizer use.
- Rake in compost and increase the organic matter of the soil.
- Select pesticide-free, earth-friendly fertilizers with no phosporus, and 50% or more of the nitrogen in slow-release form. Look for the "Earth Friendly Fertilizer" label at participating retailers.
- Sweep up fertilizer on sidewalks and driveways. Put it back into the lawn to keep it from washing into storm drains.
- Request the Healthy Lawn Care Option if you use a lawn care company. For a list of companies endorsed through the Michigan Green Industry Association, visit www.landscape.org or call 248-646-4992.
- If you live on a lake or river, leave a "no fertilizer" 25-foot buffer zone planted with native grasses, shrubs or tall wildflowers to help trap pollutants and keep out geese.

Important Information for Rental Property Owners

If you are a landlord, it is your responsibility to verify that tenants are paying their quarterly water bills. Water service invoices are always sent to the address of the property that is receiving the service. Delinquent water invoices are then rolled onto property taxes if unpaid. If you own the property, you may request in writing that a duplicate bill be sent to your address as well as to the service address.

Wheeled Recycling Carts Coming Soon!

The City is switching to new recycling carts that will offer many benefits to residents. The carts will be easier and more convenient to take to the curb, which will encourage more recycling. The carts will also be more efficient to pick up and more cost effective.

New 64-gallon carts will be delivered to homes this summer, with specific delivery dates to be determined. The City is making two alternative sizes available free to residents.



64-gallon recycling carts will be delivered to homes. 35-gallon or 96-gallon carts are available as an alternative.

You can pre-order a smaller 35-gallon cart or a larger 96-gallon cart by calling the DPW at 248-871-2850. If you decide that you need a smaller or larger size, you will have until October 1 to switch sizes at no charge.

The carts will be for recycling only, with no need for sorting. Trash items should continue to go into garbage cans and yard waste should continue to be placed in yard waste containers. Existing recycling bins will no longer be accepted. You can keep the old bin for storage or place it in the new cart to be recycled.

Recycling collection will remain on the same day as your trash pickup. You may set the cart out every week or only when it is full. All recycling must go in the cart; bulky items set next to the cart will not be picked up.

West Nile Virus – Follow the Three R's

REDUCE areas where mosquitoes breed. Eliminate standing water on your property. This includes water in gutters, toys, buckets, tires, unused pools, birdbaths, and other containers. Creeks and retention areas that are healthy and running are not considered a prime area for mosquito breeding.

REPEL against mosquitoes. Use insect repellants. Follow manufacturers' guidelines and don't use on children younger than two. Wear protective clothing such as long sleeves and pants.

2012 Road Construction

14 Mile Rd from east of Haggerty Rd to Drake Rd — This section of roadway will be rehabilitated from June through September. The work includes the addition of a center turn lane, reconstruction, resurfacing, and sidewalk installation. 14 Mile Rd will remain open to traffic for the majority of the project.

Orchard Lake Rd from 13 Mile Rd to 14 Mile Rd — The Road Commission for Oakland County (RCOC) is responsible for all of Orchard Lake Road, including this section which will be resurfaced this summer. For questions or concerns, call RCOC Citizen Services at 248-858-4804.

Northwestern Hwy (M-10) from Orchard Lake Rd to Beck Rd (City of Southfield) — MDOT will be resurfacing this section of roadway this summer. MDOT's intent is to minimize road traffic delays and to focus most of the resurfacing work during night hours.

8 Mile Rd from Grand River Ave to Telegraph Rd — MDOT will be resurfacing this section of roadway starting this summer. 8 Mile Rd will remain open to traffic during construction; however there will be lane closures. Some night work may occur.

Independence Ave from Middlebelt Rd to Waldron — This capital improvement project consists of water main replacement, road rehabilitation, and installation of sidewalk. Construction will start in July.
