These communities have the potential to save more than \$1 billion in energy costs and cut millions of tons of CO2 emissions.

Participation from community members is essential during the competition. There are various ways you can play a role. For example – discover your own energy usage.

REPORTS BY OAKLAND COUNTY COMMISSIONERS DWYER AND JACKSON

County Commissioner Jackson stated that they are here to update residents on what is happening in Oakland County but also for the Public Hearing on the Grand River Corridor Project.

County Commissioner Dwyer apologized on behalf of Commissioner Gershenson who was unable to attend the meeting. He added that Farmington and Farmington Hills staff met with the Commissioners regarding the Grand River Corridor Improvement project and all three commissioners are in support and when this plan goes before the Board the TIFA Board, the cities will also have the support at that time.

Commissioner Dwyer added that the Commission approved the three year budget last week with no increases in taxes.

Commissioner Jackson added that at the last Commission meeting there was a presentation from city leaders throughout the County concerning the newly formed Great Lakes Water Authority. She stated that the Commission received a comprehensive report on what to expect and mentioned that there is a report and Frequently Asked Questions on the Oakland County website. She feels that the majority of the Commission is in favor of this Authority. The City of Detroit has already approved this plan and it will come before Oakland County at the next meeting of October 8, 2014. Commissioner Jackson stated that there will be a Town Hall meeting on this subject on October 1, 2014 at Farmington Hills City Hall.

Mayor Brickner clarified that this ordinance would not require a leash for animals when they are on their own property. He added that the requested change was to address some language in the ordinance that currently allows for animals to only be under the "oral control" of their owner while off of their own property.

PUBLIC HEARINGS

<u>PUBLIC HEARING AND CONSIDERATION OF THE GRAND RIVER CORRIDOR</u> <u>IMPROVEMENT AUTHORITY DEVELOPMENT AND TAX INCREMENT FINANCE PLAN</u> CMR 9-14-91

Assistant to the City Manager Geinzer provided the following history and summary of the Development and Tax Increment Finance Plan:

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In early 2010, the City of Farmington Hills and Farmington were awarded a grant through the Land Information Access Association's (LIAA) Partnerships for Change: Sustainable Communities Program to look at a joint Corridor Improvement Authority (CIA) along Grand River Avenue. The Grand River Corridor Improvement Authority was enacted October 10, 2011 and Tax Increment Financing was identified by the CIA Board as a preferred funding mechanism. The Grand River Vision Plan was assembled and adopted on August 22, 2013 to help shape the development and Tax Increment Finance Plan required by statute and was approved and forwarded to City Council, August 13, 2014.

Tax Increment Financing allows for the capture of the growth in taxable value above and beyond a base line once it is established. If all of the taxing units participate it is estimated the proposed Development and Tax Increment Finance Plan would raise \$11.7 million over the 30 year life of the plan. Funds would be used to invest in a number of economic development projects.

Public Notice was provided per the requirements of the Act. Following the Public Hearing affected taxing jurisdictions have 60 days to file a resolution to "opt out" and exempt the collection of the tax increment.

Councilmember Bridges inquired about the status of the Authorities and how it would impact the plan if they were to opt out.

Mr. Geinzer stated that his conversations with all of the taxing jurisdictions have been very positive. He noted that the Huron-Clinton MetroParks provided a letter indicating that they were going to opt out; however, even if they did that through the required resolution, it represents a very small percentage of the amount to be captured and would not have that great of an impact.

City Manager Brock commented that the Oakland County Public Transit Authority is taking no action, which means they can be included as part of the plan.

Councilmember Steckloff questioned how the new legislation regarding Tax Increment Financing (TIF) could affect the plan.

Mr. Geinzer responded that he has only seen early drafts of this legislation. He feels that the legislation as he read it would have more of an impact on older TIFS. He noted that most of the discussion involved around transparency and the cities have been very transparent about this project and proposed plan. He stated that the plan has been out on the website at www.fhgov.com\grandriver.

Mayor Brickner added that the plan proposes a 75% capture of funds, which is based on taxes already being paid. The plan would not affect individual's taxes, but only the taxing authorities.

Mayor Brickner opened the Public Hearing. He closed the Public Hearing as there was nobody present wishing to speak.

PUBLIC HEARING AND CONSIDERATION OF A RESOLUTION ESTABLISHING AN INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT DISTRICT FOR THE BUILDING LOCATED AT 23149 COMMERCE ROAD CMR 9-14-92

City Manager Brock stated that the Farmington Hills Economic Development Corporation (EDC), at a Special Meeting held on August 20, 2014, recommended that City Council approve the personal property tax abatement for 7 years for CEP BioCoat.

Mr. Keith Wasilenski, representative of Orchid Ortho Solutions, which is the parent company of CEP BioCoat, stated that they are one of the leading contract manufacturers in orthopedic implant devices. He

explained that they specialize in hips and knees and they are a full turn-key solution for orthopedic implants. The company is currently located in Southfield in three (3) facilities; and they are moving to the Farmington Hills location at 23149 Commerce Road, which represents approximately a 60% increase in manufacturing capabilities. Mr. Wasilenski stated that they are expecting 140 employees to be employed at this location. The work that will be performed at the Farmington Hills facility will be grinding, polishing, and adding some special coatings that allow the bone and muscle tissue to grow within the actual device. The work will also include sterilization, packaging, and shipping.

Councilmember Bridges asked about the \$2 million investment and if all of that equipment will be in Farmington Hills.

Mr. Wasilenski stated that there will be approximately \$5 million worth of equipment at the Farmington Hills facility, with \$2 million in new equipment under the abatement plus \$3 million of equipment that will be transferred from Southfield to the Farmington Hills facility.

Mayor Brickner opened the Public Hearing. He closed the Public Hearing as there was nobody present wishing to speak.

MOTION by Bruce, support by Lerner, that the City Council of the City of Farmington Hills hereby adopts a resolution that the following described parcel of land situated in the City of Farmington Hills, County of Oakland, and State of Michigan, to wit:

Parcel ID #22-23-30-401-043 - 23149 Commerce Road

is established as an Industrial Development District pursuant to the provisions of PA 198 of 1974, as amended.
